JC Student Leaders Will Attend Meet

Eight Fresno Junior College students will attend a sectional meeting of the California Junior College Student Government Conference Saturday at Bakersfield to discuss problems concerning JC's throughout the state.

Representing the student body at the conference will be Larry DeCarlo president; Gene Hambelton, vice president; Don Bischel, treasurer; Art Margosian, editor of the Fresno; and El Peart, rally commissioner.

AMS, AWS REPRESENTED

Milton Martin, president of the Associated Men Students, will represent his group, and Margaret Margossian and Alta Ruth Arnold will be representatives for the Associated Women Students.

Fresno Junior College joined the CJCSGC last year and students attended the state conference last May in Santa Rosa. At the conference Ross Eakles, vice president last semester, was elected state vice president; however, because Eakles is not in school this year the office automatically falls to DeCarlo.

FURTHER GOOD FEELINGS

The biggest job the conference will have is to further good feelings between the schools and to recommend legislation to the State Legislature that will be of most help to the majority of the schools.

The conference at Bakersfield will prepare a proposed agenda for the State Conference which will be held in San Bernardino later in November.

AMS and AWS officers will hold discussions in separate meetings at the same time that student officers are in conference. Gene Hambelton was elected state vice president of the AMS at last semester's conference.

The Rally Committee announced today that there are still reservations open on the bus for tomorrow night's game in Porterville.

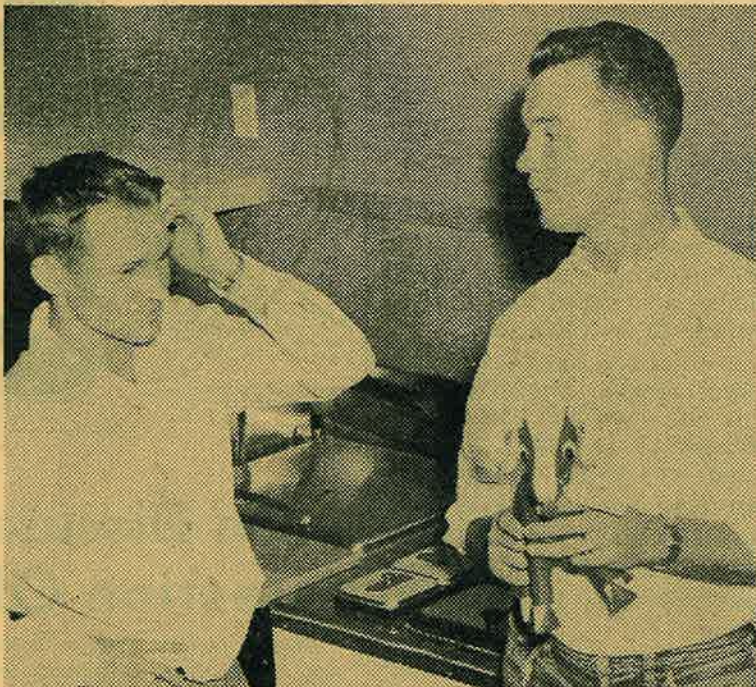
Everyone is urged to come out and support their team. The bus company is willing to stay after the game for the dance at no extra charge, declared Eddie Kashian, rally committee member.

Two Groups Get Money From Council

Two appropriations were made by the Student Council Tuesday evening at a budget session, and other requests for funds were discussed.

The athletic department was voted \$4,000 and the general fund, from which emergency expenditures will be taken, was allocated \$260.

Other figures were tentatively set at: Rally Committee, \$305; Student Welfare, \$65; Oral Arts, \$146; Scholarship, \$15; Publicity, \$20; Social Affairs, \$325.

The money for the scholarship society, listed above, is just being loaned and will be paid back by the organization at a later time.

SBC HOLDERS GET BARGAIN

Careful consideration was given to the privileges accorded holders of student body cards, with specific relation to the annual. The committee felt that those students who pay the maximum fee should receive the maximum benefits.

In the afternoon session Warren Johnston of the athletic staff asked that complimentary tickets be given athletes taking part in sports. Two tax-free complimentary tickets will be given to those taking part in sports, the council decided.

The council also assumed responsibility for floats from the rally committee to the student council.

BUDGET STILL INCOMPLETE

More details on the budget will be ironed out in the future by the council, Larry DeCarlo, student president said.

Monies to pay for the second semester's expenses will be forthcoming after student body card sales are made in February, Arch Bradshaw, Dean of Business Management, told the council members. Such costs as the yearbook and second semester issues of The Fresno can be met with this money, he said.

Yes, that player has one wonderful characteristic — good school spirit.

That player, although injured, played a wonderful game for his school — Fresno Junior College. He had the school spirit which a majority of the students here at FJC lack.

One need attend but one rally or one game to see the poor quality of school spirit the majority of our students possess.

Despite the poor spirit evident in the majority of the students, a handful are doing a commendable job in building up an enthusiasm for presentations of FJC. Orchids to our yell leaders, pep girls, the band, and our terrific rally committee.

Attendance Procedures

The Fresno Junior College administration recently expressed deep satisfaction with the way students are following out their attendance responsibilities, and hoped that the students would continue to do a fine job.

The method for obtaining slips to get back into classes is very simple. The attendance office is located in the main hall and is managed by the attendance secretary, Mrs. A. Wantland. One has only to go to that office anytime between 7:45 a.m. and 4:15 p.m., fill out an absence slip, have Mrs. Wantland sign it, and carry it to instructors to have it signed. The last instructor then keeps the slip.

Also pertaining to attendance is the faculty approach to it. Many of our new instructors have to come to us via colleges and universities, where attendance meant little. JC faculty members are asked to be very cautious in making out their attendance reports, in that they are very vital to the welfare of the Fresno Junior College.

Let's Have A College Paper

Students that comment that *The Fresnan* lacks the feel of their old high school newspaper had must realize that the members of the staff of a junior college newspaper are trying to prepare themselves for professional writing. Those high schoolish columns such as "Steady Lists" or "Whose Going Around the Hall Holding Her Hand" have been referred to in journalism as of a style of the 1890's.

At recent journalism conferences such columns as mentioned above were considered as a bad asset to a newspaper. At these conferences high critics say that such columns are "high school trash — and not even good trash."

Future issues of *THE FRESNAN* will contain feature columns, written for the enjoyment of FJC students and will not embarrass any students, as do some of the above mentioned type. Look to *THE FRESNAN* for future reading enjoyment.

Work of the class will be exhibited in February in the main hall. In addition to preparing prints for this display, students are doing extra-curricular work for *The Fresnan* and the yearbook.

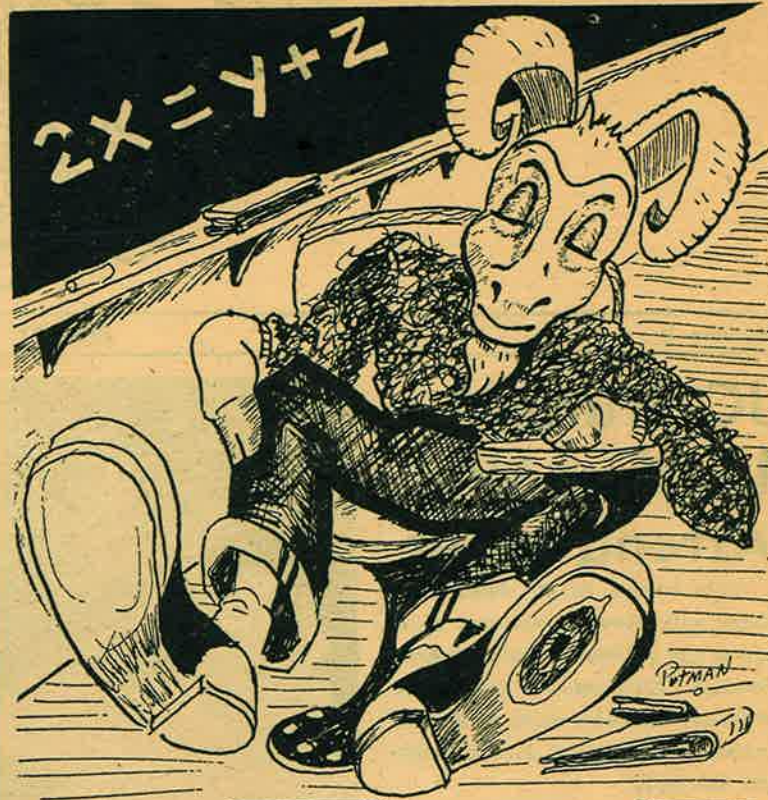

Dean Discusses Important Question Of Employment

Fresno Junior College maintains a part-time employment bureau in an effort to provide work for students who need financial help in working their way through college. The Fresnan has asked Harold Sanderson, assistant dean of Students and director of the employment bureau, to discuss a question in the minds of many students.

SHOULD I WORK WHILE GOING TO COLLEGE?

This question depends upon the type of student and the type of job. Some students have the ability to do college work easily, consequently these students have more time to work while completing their education; other students, however, must work hard and long on each subject to maintain an average good enough to meet college requirements. This type of student must have a job requiring but a few hours a week.

The student, after looking over his past high school and college record, his academic load for the semester, and the press of outside activities, should decide how much work he is capable of doing. The college advisor can give valuable assistance on these matters.

JOBS LISTED

After the student has analyzed himself and has pronounced himself capable of dividing his intellectual and physical capabilities, he may go on to consider the types of jobs to look for. In large cities, part time work may be secured in the sales, stock, or shipping departments of local stores. Jobs as cashiers or ushers in movies would not conflict with the college day. Many large companies also hire part time clerical workers, typists, and stenographers. Advertising and survey organizations employ part time market researchers—students who interview people and enter the replies on questionnaires.

BABY SITTING HAS POSSIBILITIES

Not a new field, baby sitting is becoming more popular with college students. Although the pay is not high here, such jobs usually permit the student to "hit the books" for part of the time.

Some students with a lot of thought and initiative have actually made jobs which pay well and put themselves in the category of the self-employed. An example: a student in one of the larger universities sold his car and bought an old station wagon. Now, every afternoon, he takes a group of young boys to the park and organizes activities for them. He delivers them home at 6 p.m. in time for their supper and his. The job pays his room, board, and tuition

During the coming school months we are going to try to keep you Guys and Gals posted on what's new — and how to wear it.

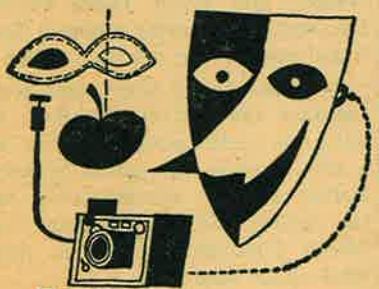
This week we will try to give you a brief resume of what the smart looking Guy and Gal at JC is wearing.

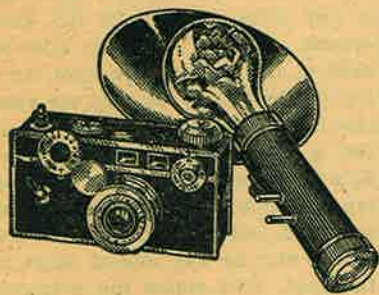

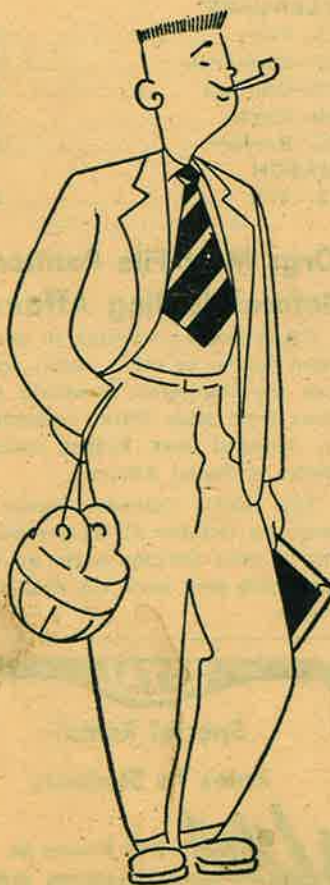
Enrollment Still Open In Home Economic Courses

Students, what is your opinion? WHAT DO YOU THINK OF THE IDEA OF CHANGING THE NAME OF THE FRESNO JUNIOR COLLEGE TO THE FRESNO CITY COLLEGE?

"I don't like the idea," said Juanita Dowland, twelfth grade commerce major. "I would rather have the school called Fresno Junior College. The name of this school has been changed so much that I don't think anyone knows what it really is called. Besides, all the books and stationery are already marked Fresno J.C."

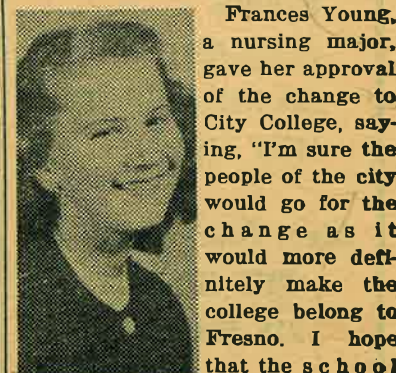
Harry Crawford class of '51 science major, had this to say about the proposed change: "I think it is a great idea. I think it would make the school sound bigger and would help put us on the map as far as educational institutions go."

The different name would add prestige to the educational reputation of a graduate, thinks John Tras, thirteenth year education major. "What's in a name?" he asks. "In this case, there is a lot in it."

"Fresno City College gives the school a lift, I think," says Gilbert Khachadourian, twelfth grade language major. "We shouldn't have to be called Junior to anyone, and I'm afraid some people do think we are junior to Fresno State."

Dick Rangel, thirteenth year Physical Education major is all for the change. "This is only Fresno JC's second year of operation, and I think by the time we are a little older everyone will recognize us as one of the best two year colleges in the United States. We need a good name to go with the school's potential reputation."

Frances Young, a nursing major, gave her approval of the change to City College, saying, "I'm sure the people of the city would go for the change as it would more definitely make the college belong to Fresno. I hope that the school upholds its name."

More Students In Chem Class Sought By King

A practical chemistry course, Industrial Analysis, is being offered this semester for students who are interested in preparing themselves for employment as chemists.

The course, taught by James King, includes study and experience in analyzing wine, cotton seed, fertilizers, and beverages, and inspecting water, sewage, and dairy facilities.

Over \$10,000 in new equipment has been obtained by the chemistry department for use by the wine analysis class and in the regular chemistry courses. The department offers a two year program in chemistry to Associate of Arts students.

A library of technical books and periodicals pertaining to chemical analysis is being collected by King for the use of chemistry students of the Junior College.

Although veteran enrollment is decreasing, over-all enrollment in colleges of the United States is increasing and will probably reach 2.7 million in 1950.

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Rams Will Seek 3rd Win Tomorrow At Porterville

Coach "Stoney" Johnston's Rams will be out for their third conference win tomorrow night when they meet the undermanned Porterville Pirates in Porterville at 8.

The Rams are in a three way tie for first place in the CCC while the Pirates are in the cellar.

The Porterville eleven, coached by Dick Handley, has been hampered by the small size of the squad. With only 25 men, the Pirates have been unable to do much in conference play thus far. In their first game the Porterville gridders bowed to Bakersfield College 54 to 0, and in their first conference tilt were dumped by the Coalinga Falcons 25 to 0.

INJURY RIDDEN

Having lost rugged Jay Hathaway for the season, the Rams will have to get a new kicker. Hathaway suffered a fractured leg in the Coalinga contest. Others injured and possibly unable to see action tomorrow are Bob Cobb, Larry DeCarlo, Ledio Fanucchi, and Joe Spino. DeCarlo and Fanucchi received facial injuries while Spino re-injured his ankle and Cobb suffered an arm injury.

The probable starting lineup for the Rams will be: ends, Lyman Ehrlich and Jim January; tackles, Jim Jayne and Boots Edmonson or Fanucchi; guards, George Bundy and Bob Bradford; center, Warren Wright; halfbacks John Savona and Larry DeCarlo or Pete Toomajian; quarterback, Mike Ryan; fullback, Bob Cobb or Al Mendoza.

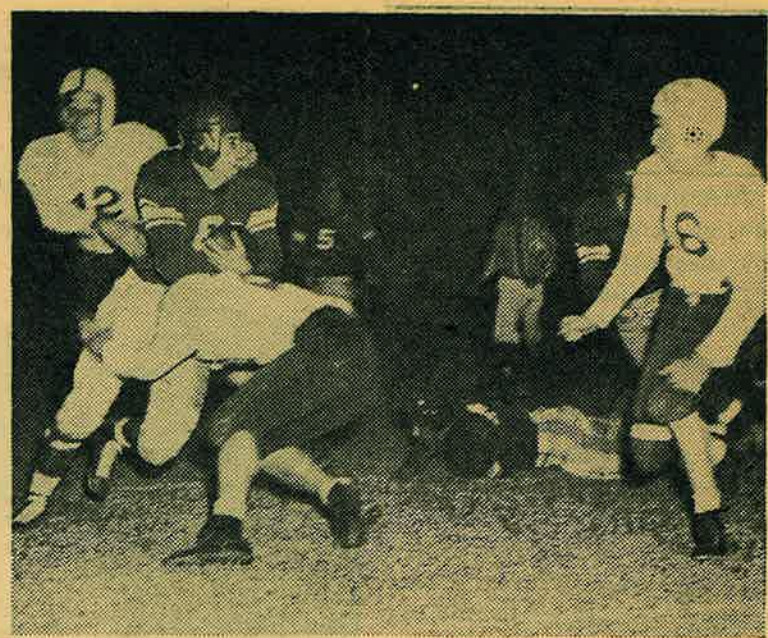
