Resolution Voted At JC Convention Raps Communism

Resolutions opposing Communism were passed by delegates to the California Junior College Student Government Conference held last Thursday, Friday, and Saturday in Sacramento.

Fresno Junior College's voting delegates, Duke Potere and Bob Sani, voted for the first resolution, which was presented on Friday and passed by a vote of 61-40. Some colleges abstained from the roll-call vote.

A reporter from the Sacramento Union who asked the reason for the forty votes against the measure was told the schools felt the resolution was too general. Further measures were passed in sessions the following day.

John Mullins, who attended AMS meetings, reported an unsuccessful attempt to vote the organization out of existence by outlawing the stae constitution. Mullins voted to keep the organization as it now stands.

Efforts to establish a state constitution for AWS were also unsuccessful. Each school will continue to have its own organization, reported Rudeen Bruce, AWS representative.

Publications meetings, which were attended by Marie Lipscomb, gave school editors from all over the state an opportunity to discuss their newspapers and annuals.

Mr. Joe King, faculty representative at the Sacramento conference, said today that Fresno Junior College was "very ably represented at Sacramento."

"The turnout for the election was very good," said Wheeler, "and we hope to have the same kind of support at the revote, because we want to have the thirteenth year class do big things this year."

MID-TERMS SLATED FOR NINTH WEEK

Mid-term examinations may be expected in most classes during the ninth week, from Monday to Friday next week, Maurice Reetz, dean of instruction said yesterday.

Examinations are not mandatory, Reetz said, but are left to the discretion of the instructors. Mid-term grades will be entered on the registrar's grade sheets by Monday, November 14, following mid-term exam week.

Instructors will use whatever means they see fit to notify students of their standing following the ninth week, Reetz said.

A big bonfire rally tomorrow night will climax a day's activities for Fresno Junior College supporters. A serpentine through downtown Fresno is also planned.

Wood for the bonfire was donated by Taylor and Wheeler, local building contractors. Mrs. Geraldine Wheeler, wife of one of the partners, is a member of the Board of Education.

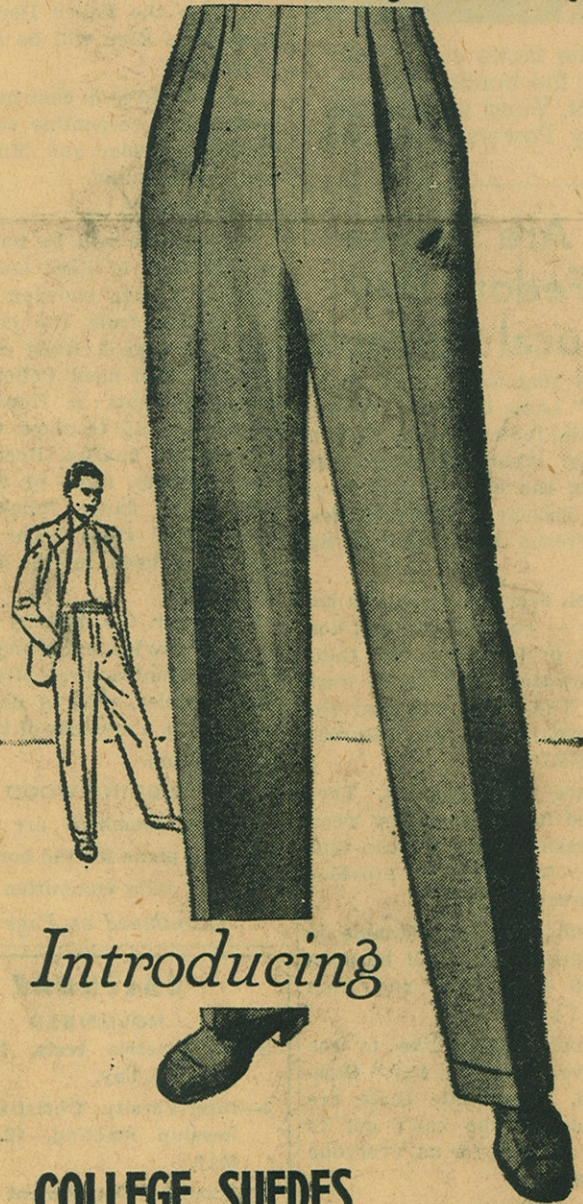
Few merchants these days are interested in "donating" ads, in giving money to obtain "good will" from our school; they have too many other places for their charity dollars.

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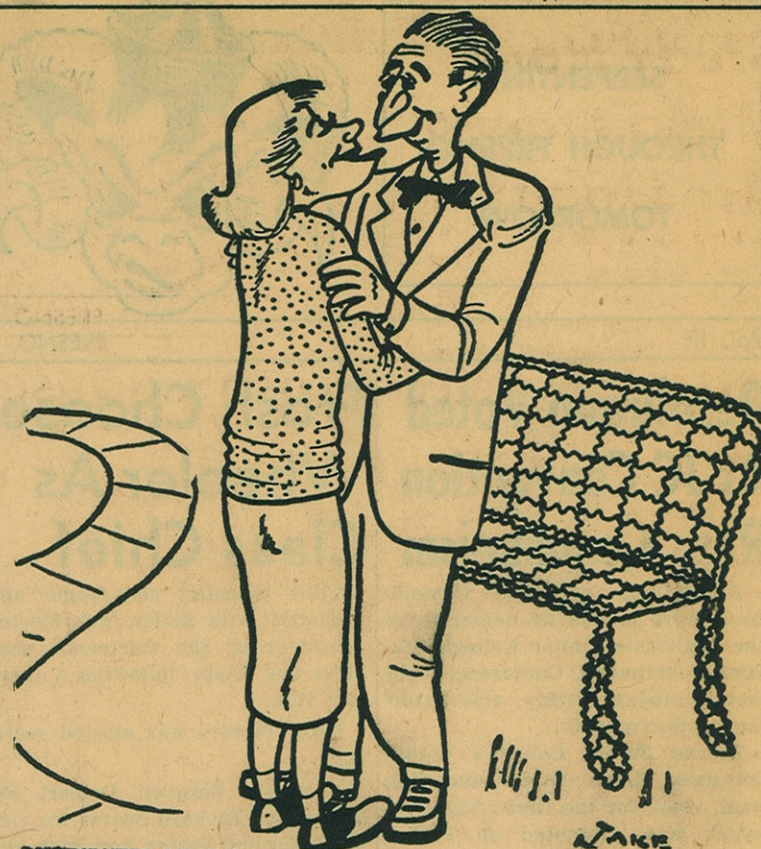

ROTC Information Offered FJC Men

Information about the Naval Reserve Training program will be offered Fresno Junior College students today at 3 p.m. in N14.

Commander Howard Bush, inspector-instructor in the Naval Reserve for the Fresno area, will answer questions and show a film of general interest.

The Commander will emphasize the Naval Reserve Officers Training Program available to qualified college students, whereby a college student may receive a commission in the Naval Reserve following his college graduation.

Acquisition of high rates in the enlisted grades through college work will also be discussed, along with physical and mental qualifications necessary in applicants.

MOBILE X-RAY UNIT OFFERS CHEST EXAM

Chester Byers, technician for the Fresno County Tuberculosis Mobile Unit, will be at Fresno Junior College November 9 and 10 to give free chest x-rays. Tests will be given from 8 to 3 on Thursday during gym classes and Friday for students who do not have gym in their schedule.

Any student who wishes to do so may have an X-ray made. If the X-ray discloses signs of any condition warranting further examination, the student will be notified and referred to his family doctor.

Rare Old Coin Found In Yard

An old coin accidentally found on the FJC grounds three years ago by gardener Ralph Trosi has become his cherished lucky piece. It is an 1809 half penny for which he has been offered \$15.

Trosi was raking leaves in the front yard, when the rake struck something that gave out a metallic ring. At first it was hard to tell what the object was. It was covered with caked dirt and corrosion. After cleaning it and discovering what was hidden under all the dirt, Trosi took it to the bank, where he was offered \$15 for it.

He refused the offer, and has carried it in his pocket ever since. If requested, he will show it to students, most of whom have never seen such a coin, which does not resemble any now in circulation.

The coin is made of copper, is larger and flatter than present-day pennies. It has the old liberty-head design on the front, and a laurel wreath on the reverse.

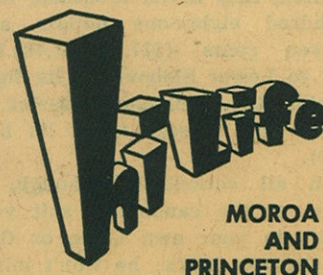

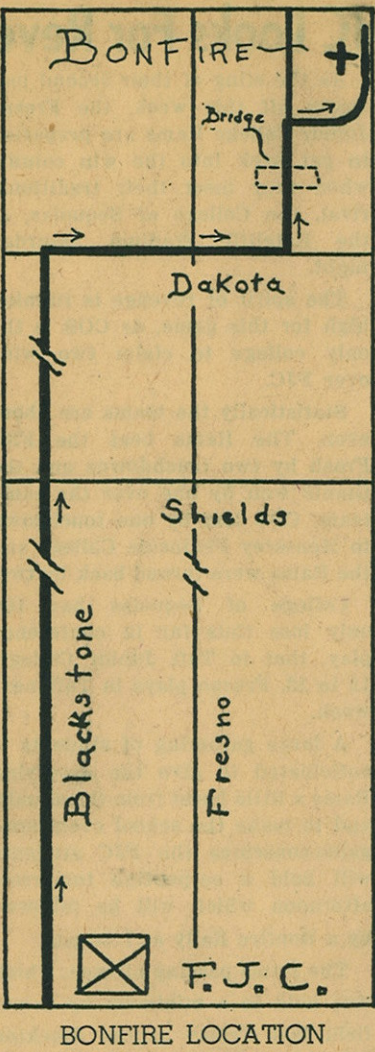

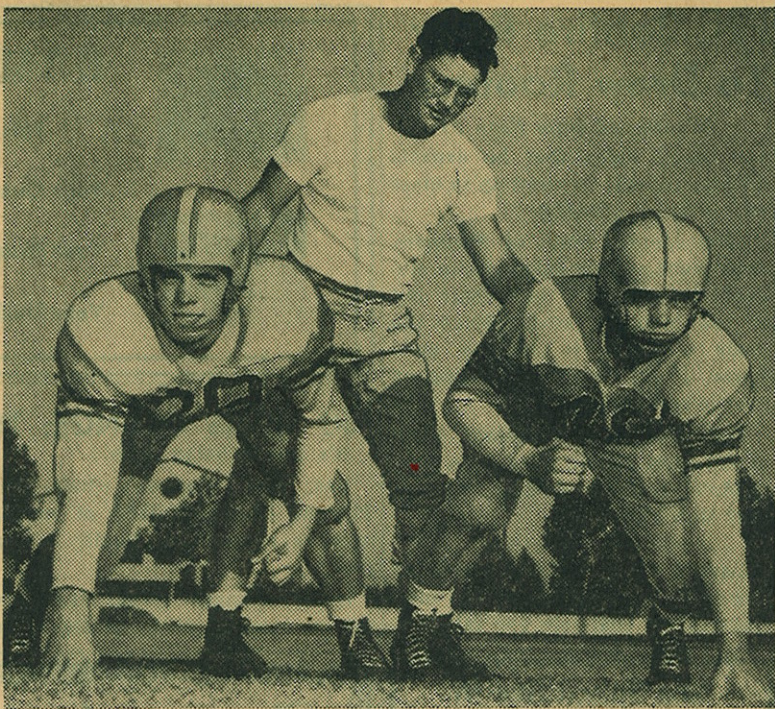

Mustangs End Ram Win Streak On Wet Stockton Turf, 37-14

A muddy and slippery field plus the powerful and speedy backs of the Stockton Mustangs proved too much for the Fresno Junior College Rams Friday night, as the Rams came out on the bottom end of a gruelling contest at Stockton, 37-14.

The Mustangs cut off Fresno's winning streak. The terrific ability of fullback Cecil Harp stood out as he made the first three "TD's" for the Stockton crew. Harp's drive seemed to just brush-off the clinging arms of the Ram's defensive eleven.

The fact that the rain-soaked field prevented the Rams from using their effective passing offense was the prominent handicap for Fresno. The mud prevented Bob Rodgers, quarterback, from going to the air until the last minutes of the game when he made a desperate attempt to reduce the Mustang lead.

The spirited work of the Ram defenses gave the Mustangs a scare in the second half, as Stockton was forced back for 10 and 15 yards time after time. Greater depth, weight, and experience showed in the second half as the Stocktonites ran over and through the Rams.

The single touchdown for the Rams in the first half came when Ron Chapanian went across from

College of Sequoias has the only loss thus far in conference play, that to Taft Junior College, 12 to 13. Fresno plays in Taft next week.

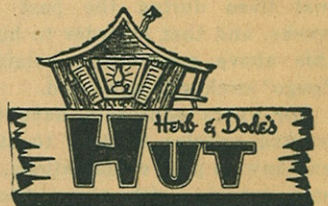

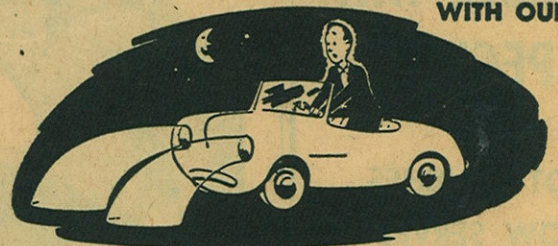
Just Around The Corner on Stanislaus
