Dean Compiles Information On Draft Postponement, Deferment, Enlistment

Dean of Men

During the past month there have been 30 to 40 Fresno Junior College men enter the service; consequently, I feel that all the information on selective service should be made available.

Many of you are arriving at a point now where it becomes necessary for you to make a decision concerning your educational and military future.

The junior college doesn't believe it is their business or the business of anyone else to tell you to stay out of the service as long as you can and wait to be drafted, to join the service, or what branch of the service to join; but we do believe that it is the responsibility of this office to know the answers to the questions that may come to your

With the above thought in mind, feel free to come in and

Listed below is some information which may aid you in the clarification of terms used by

POSTPONEMENT: Any student enrolled in the junior college who is carrying 12 units or more satisfactorily may request a postpone ment of induction. Such action will allow the student to remain in school until June 1951. Once a postponement has been received, a student may not request a deferment because of school reasons. but must be prepared to enter the service immediately after the close of school in June.

DEFERMENT: In order for a student to request a deferment, he have, during that time, carried a minimum load of 12 units with a mation.

50 per cent of his class. This deferment should be made within ten days after the student has received his I-A classification from the selective service board. Once a student is deferred, his classification is changed to II-A. Such classification will allow the student to volunteer for the Navy, Marines, or Coast Guard, but not the Army or the Army Air Force.

ENLISTMENT: In order for a student to enlist in any branch of the service that he desires, he must make the decision and enlist prior to the time the selective service board sends him the notice for his pre-induction physical examination. A student desiring to join the Naval Reserve must do so before he receives his I-A classification.

Qualifications for student body office candidacy are as follows:

- 1. Candidates must be members in good standing of the Associated Student Body organization.
- 2. Candidates must have attended at least one semester at Fresno Junior College on the date of taking office.
- 3. They shall have earned at least 12 units of credit at Fresno Junior College and have maintained at least a "C" average during their tenure at Fresno Junior
- 4. Candidates must obtain a petition from the registrar, Mrs. Irene Stewart, and have it signed by 35 student body card holders within one week of December 11.

In addition to the above requirements, presidential and vice-presidential candidates shall have attended Fresno Junior College for one year on the date of their taking office. All elective and appointive offi-

cers must carry at least 12 units of work during their tenure of office and shall maintain at least a "C" average during their tenure of

Offices open for candidacy are president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, and four representatives-

Commissioners are appointed by the president after he takes office. The student council is composed of all elective and appointive officers.

We all know now that America's armed forces will not be home for Christmas; let us remember them now and in the future. It would not be out of place for each and every one of us to take a moment of sober reflection and give a prayer for their speedy victory and safe return.

CRITICISM IS UNJUSTIFIED

Glass Working Class Teaches One Of World's Oldest Arts

The practical aspects of working with glass are presented to Fresno Junior College students in a course added to the science department this semester.

Glass Working, Physics 43, is a weekly, one-unit laboratory course that meets on Thursdays from 2-5. Richard Jones is the instructor in charge, and four stu-

dents are enrolled at present. Glass manufacturing is an extremely old art, established earlier than any recorded history. The first actual blowing of glass, as determined by historians, is thought to have been about 250

B. C.

Little emphasis was placed on the practical value of glass products at that time, but the decorative works of artistic glass blowers were elaborate masterpieces of great variety. Some of these original works are priceless collectors' items today.

Turquoise blue glass was found in the ancient Pharaohs' tombs and Egyptians are known to have worked with glass as early as 1500 B. C. Historians' concepts of their techniques are entirely speculative but the fact remains that glass was manufactured at that time.

Although modern methods produce in great volume glass of many different types, the basic principles of glass manufacturing have not changed. If sand is heated to a molten state and cooled, glass is produced. The type of glass depends on the type sand used, the temperature to which it is heated and the rate of cooling.

One type of glass contains lead and made the ringing, crystal stemware that graced our grandmothers' tables. A quite different type contains a quantity of silicon and forms the heat-resistant glass used in today's cookery.

Students in the glass working class are taught to repair laboratory equipment and to make small glass objects which are useful in laboratory work. Being able to make and repair such equipment is a definite asset to anyone who is lanning to continue any type of laboratory work, said Mr. Jones, whether the work be vocational or will cease with school.


