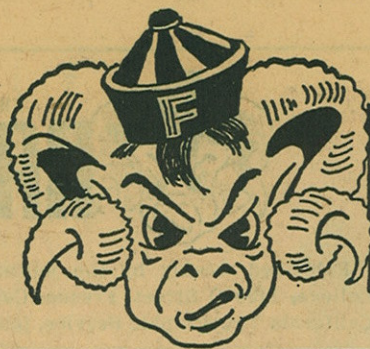

Election Chairman Sets Date, Time Petitions Are Due

The deadline for returning completed petitions for the spring election is 12 noon, Thursday, December 21, warns Bob Sani, student vice-president, who is in charge of the election. At 3 p.m. of the same day all candidates will meet in M24 to be briefed on eligibility and campaign procedures.

The nominations assembly will take place in the south gym at the regular assembly hour on Friday, January 5. Here the various candidates will be presented by their campaign managers and will be allowed time in which to state their platforms.

CANDIDATES CAMPAIGN

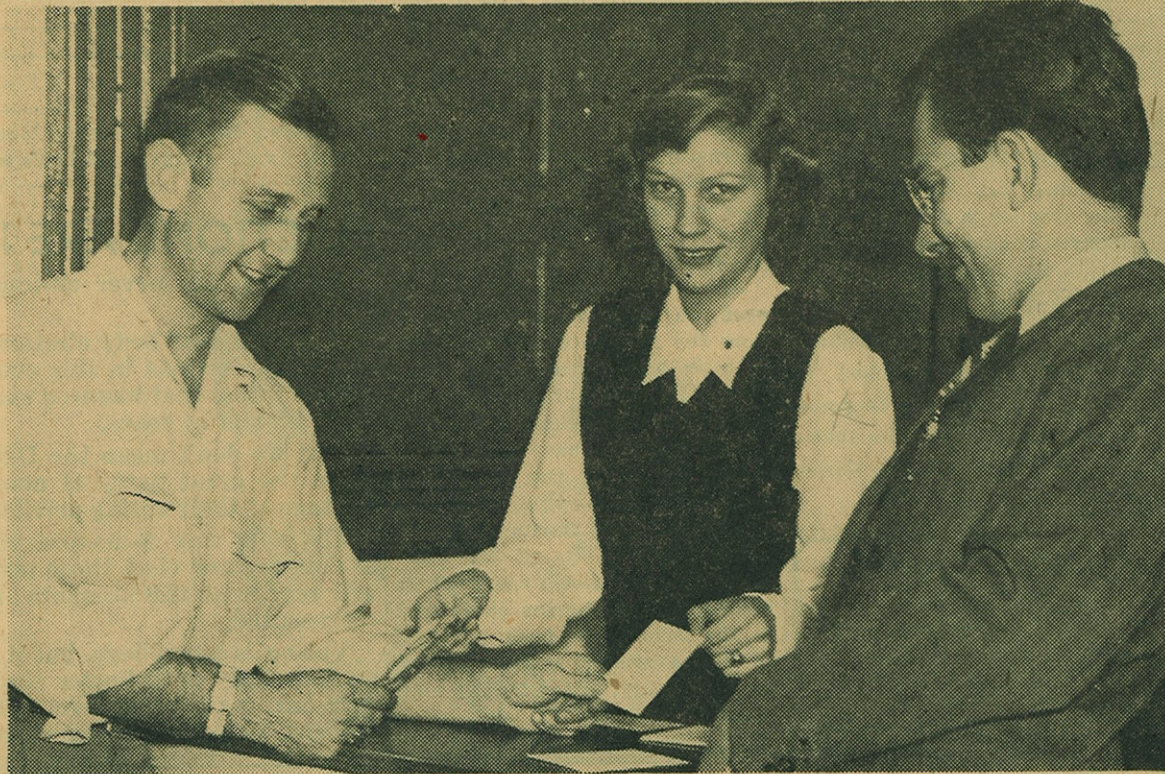
January 8 to 12, inclusive, is the time for campaigning and display of advertising materials throughout the school. In past campaigns candidates have staged informal get-togethers and have talked about what they would do if elected.

Election will be Tuesday and Wednesday, January 15 and 16; the polls will be open from 8 until 4. No one is permitted to vote unless he has a student body card, and lists of eligible voters will be available at each election booth.

OFFICERS TAKE OATH

Installation of the newly elected officers and representatives will take place on Friday, January 19. The student body president officially administers the oath of office to the incoming president and other officers.

"In past elections interest has run high and with the spirit that the students have shown this semester, we can make this a banner election," declared Sani today. "Get your friends out with you; pick the candidates you think will do the best job in representing your school and vote for them."

Army To Explain Reserve Plans At Assembly Tomorrow; Navy, Air Force Program Outlined

Naval and Air Force Reserve enlistment will exempt enlistees from being drafted and will offer, to qualified college-enrolled students, training programs that will not interfere with the student's academic program.

The Naval Reserve Officer Candidate program (ROC) was started in 1949 as a means of providing additional junior officers sufficient to keep the Naval Reserve at authorized strength. The plan is to give college students who join the Reserve two summers of indoctrinal study that would qualify them for commissions following graduation from college.

Candidates selected will receive pay of approximately \$95 per month for the basic course and approximately \$117 per month for the advanced course. Travel between home or the college address and the ROC school will be paid by the Navy. Food, lodging, and uniforms will be supplied by the Navy.

Candidates must have enlisted status in the Naval Reserve at the time of making application for enrollment in the ROC program, and agree to retain this status until commissioned or dis-enrolled.

Applicants must be enrolled, presently attending, and in good

standing in an accredited college, junior college, or university and must be able to complete the two summer training periods prior to graduation with a baccalaureate or higher degree. Students must be physically qualified; vision requirement is 20/22 uncorrected.

Requirements for enlistment in the Air Force Military Air Transport (MAT), on a reserve status are similar to requirements for Naval Reserve enlistment.

A primary difference is that anyone with a 1A classification is eligible for enlistment in the Air Force MAT, while those who are classified 1A are not eligible for Naval Reserve enlistment.

An additional requirement for MAT enlistment is experience in electricity or electronics. No one without this experience will be accepted.

Men Students Interested In Reserve Meet In Gym

The reserve unit program of the United States Army will be reviewed for interested Fresno Junior College men tomorrow at 10:15 in the north gym.

Dean of Men Harold Sanderson today said that three representatives of the local units of the reserve will discuss the five separate army reserve bodies which qualified men may join.

Enlistment in these units may be made at any time prior to the receipt by the enlistee of a notice to report for physical examination under the selective service draft process. Men classified as 1a or 2a are eligible for the program, according to information presented to Sanderson.

Local units into which men are able to enlist are the Combat Engineers, the Field Artillery, the Transportation Corps, the Army Postal Service, and the Army Hospital Unit.



According to plans, all students may join the party by buying a ticket from FBLA members for 25 cents and paying for the rental of skates at the rink. Money raised from the sale of tickets for the skating party will go to the FBLA treasury.

Mrs. Howard, who is majoring in a business course at FJC, entertained the group by discussing her varied experiences while on duty in Hiedelburg, Germany, and other over-seas posts. Mrs. Howard spent two "hitches" in the Army; one during the last World War, and another after a 10-month retirement into civilian life.

Army citations awarded to Mrs. Howard were shown, and other items of interest received the attention of all members present.

Pre-Registration Dates Set By Dean

Students currently enrolled in Fresno Junior College may pre-register for the spring semester between January 2 and January 19 inclusive, Maurice Reetz, Dean of Instruction, announced today.

Pre-registration is important, emphasized Mr. Reetz, for two reasons. First, it is the pre-registration which will enable the school to offer sections of courses for which there is a demand. Second, it will simplify the student's actual registration which takes place on February 1.

In order to take advantage of the pre-registration service, students must make appointments with their faculty advisers for counseling on courses. If students have classes during the adviser's regular office hours, other arrangements must be made.

Students who have pre-registered will not have to consult their advisers before final registration on February 1. They will present pre-registration forms for validation and proceed with their registration.

Decrease in veterans' enrollment is 33 per cent less than the 1949 enrollment. Last year 856,000 veterans were registered for college study. This year only 575,000 are enrolled. As a consequence the non-veteran male students now outnumber veterans by almost 3 to 1.

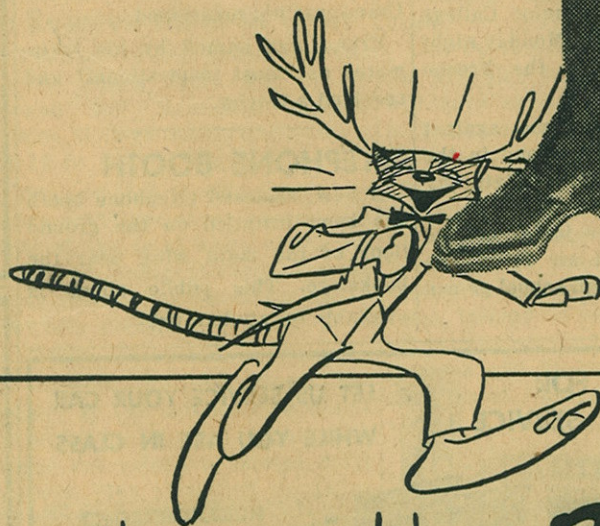

Open Season on the Stag at eve...

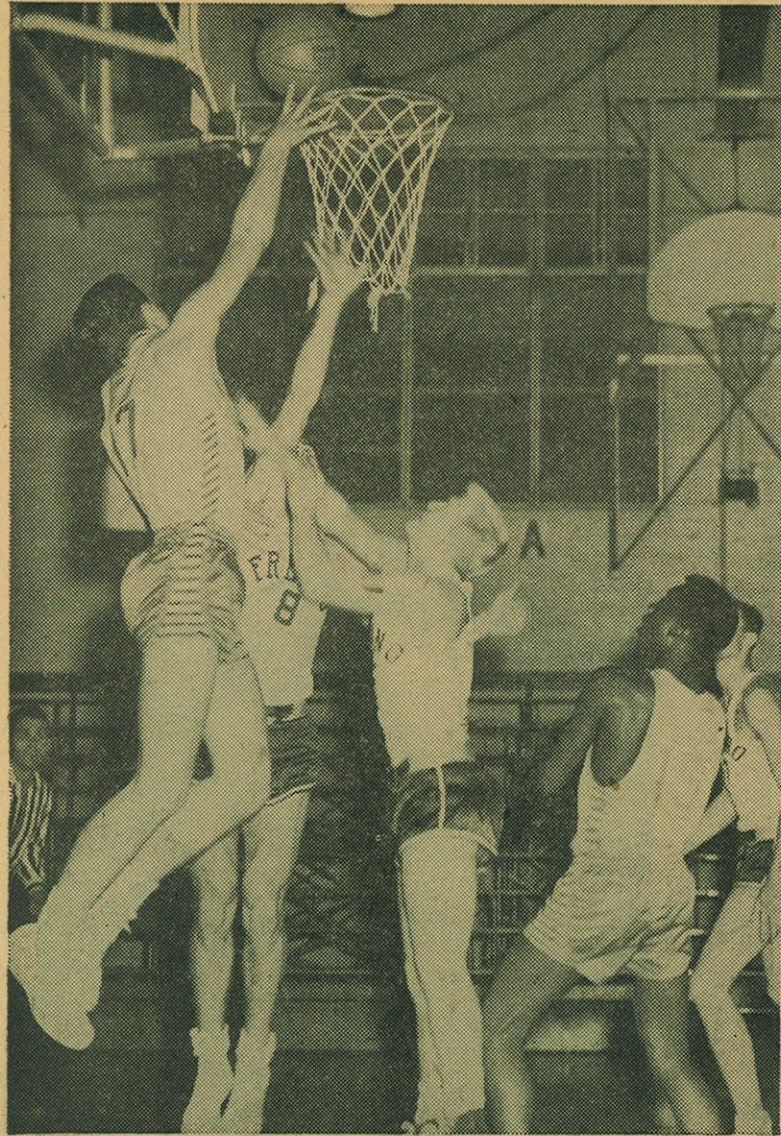

Fresno State Freshmen Defeat Rams 54-45, In Monday Tilt

The Fresno Junior College Rams were downed by a sharp Fresno State Frosh squad Monday night in a closely-matched basketball game, 45-54.

The Rams maintained a marginal lead during part of the first half, but a spirited drive by the Bullpup cagers closed the gap and they went on to tie the game all up 19-19. With four minutes of play remaining in the first half, the Frosh then moved ahead to lead at halftime, 23-19.

RAMS PULL UP

Only a few points separated the teams during most of the second half, and toward the latter part of the game, the JC cagers tied the score at 45-45.

Tough luck hit the Ram crew when forward Don Davis, and center John Nielsen, both high scorers, had to leave the game on fouls. With these two men out of the game, the Bullpups maintained their position and went on to run up a nine point lead; the game ended 54-45.
