The twice tried Fresno Junior College baseball nine will meet the Reedley College Tigers in their first CCJC tilt tomorrow night at the Fresno State College ballpark at 8.

The Rams have won one game and lost one so far this season while the Tigers will be fighting for win number one. Last year when the Rams were free lancing, they dumped the Tigers twice.

Head Coach Warren Johnston expects double trouble from the Reedleyans and is looking forward to a close game. The Rams bested Taft in their first effort this season showing some good pitching and featuring good use of the hard wood. In their battle with highly talented Fresno State College Frosh the Rams' fielding looked a bit shaky.

STARTING CHUCKER

The probable starting pitcher for the Rams tomorrow night will be Dick Choochajian, lanky southpaw. LaVerne Hughes, former Sanger High School star, might get the nod over Choochajian for the starters role. Hurlers Joe Boracino and Bob Hill will be on hand for relief assignments.

Rounding out the starting lineup for the Rams will be catcher, Len Anderson; first base, Jerry Anderson; second base, Lou Cocola; third base, Joe Spino; shortstop, Norm Britton; right field, Milton Martin; center field, Maurice Fitzpatrick; and left field, Jack Wilcher.

"Student body cards will be good for tomorrow's game," Mr. Arch Bradshaw stated. All students are urged to turnout for the first league game by rally chairman Ed Kashian, who said, "JC's new spirit should be carried through baseball season."

Next Tuesday the Rams will travel to Bakersfield for a non-conference tilt, and Friday FJC will move on to Porterville to meet the Pirates in a CCJC game.

State Regulation Clarified By Dean

State regulations regarding the presence of alcoholic beverages on school premises or at school-sponsored functions were recently published by the Dean of Instruction's office.

"State law prohibits the possession, consumption, giving or delivering of any alcoholic beverage, including beer, on school premises.

"When an athletic contest or other regularly scheduled school activity is held at the stadium, a city playground, the civic auditorium, or in any other similar place, that stadium, playground or auditorium is to be regarded as school premises for the purposes of this act."

US Air Force Recruit Team To Visit JC





The win gave the Fresnans a 16 win, 15 loss record for the year. The Rams closed the season in third place in the CCJC conference with 10 wins and four losses.

The Rams started slow in the Taft battle having to fight hard to outmaneuver a tight zone defense. Heavin was having a difficult time hitting the bucket in the first half. The Ram offense couldn't click and the Rams had to settle for a 22 to 20 halftime lead.

Perry scored 18 points for the Rams, while Don "Stretch" Bischel potted 10 to spark the Fresno offense. Joe Ybanez and Warren Wright did some fine rebounding taking the ball away from six foot, six inch Don Gleason on defense and offense.

Gleason and Page led the visiting Cougars with 12 and 11 points respectively.

Trackmen Labor In Preparation For First Meet


Looking forward to their first meet in the latter part of March, some 30 FJC spikemen are at present getting in shape under the supervision of track coach Paul Starr.


