Eight Candidates Enter Race For Fall Student Body Offices

The pomp and ceremony generally associated with political campaigns will go into full swing this week as aspirants to various offices in the student council of Fresno Junior College begin their verbal duels.

Nominations took place Tuesday, with hopefuls gathering in the boy's gym to accept nominations. The meeting, which was very poorly attended, heard nominations for the following students: Art Margosian and Duke Potere, president; Gene Hamblen, Rick Anderson, and Bob Sani, vice-president; and the unopposed students, Rudeen Bruce, secretary; Marie Lipscomb, treasurer; and Jerry Anderson, representative-at-large.

The elections, scheduled to take place May 8 and 9, will find the office of president as a hotly-contested one.

Both candidates have long records in JC activities. Margosian, in stating his platform, stressed the importance of organizing various school clubs. Another of his plans lies in the formation of a school handbook designed to serve the students with such things as school songs, yells and the student body constitution.

CHANGES RECOMMENDED

Margosian added, "I feel that FJC is in need of a different hour for assemblies, an effective alumni association, a large sign to replace the present night school sign and last, but not least, a bigger and better student council."

Duke Potere stressed that the duties he has performed in the past would enable him to adequately fulfill the qualifications desired for the presidency.

He pointed out that his help in preparing for the forthcoming carnival celebration and the work on the budget proposals have helped to a great degree.

Daylight Time Affects JCers

Ben Franklin is credited with having been far-sighted; it is obvious, however, that he did not have the best interests of Fresno Junior College students at heart when he originated the idea of daylight saving time.

When his plan for hoarding sunlight went into effect again last Sunday morning, it lengthened the days of some 1,000 cities in the United States and Canada. It affected at least 50,000,000 Americans. Among these were forlorn students of FJC who had to arise weary-eyed one hour earlier. Monday morning, for example, found the college campus flooded with students who were rudely awakened with the idea that they could no longer postpone mowing their

lawns until Saturdays. Daylight saving time provides the necessary light.

In California, by legislative act, the new time began at 1 a.m. when clocks were jumped ahead one hour for the period lasting until the final Sunday in September.

Twenty-eight states do not have any daylight saving plan. Many of these prohibit it by law. There are approximately 100,000,000 Americans virtually unaffected by fast time.

California is the only state to use fast time exclusively. Generally, the summer time will be used this year in the industrial Northeast, and most of the nation's large cities. Several Midwestern and West Coast states also have authorized the new time plan.

All types of booths sponsored by the organizations of the school will provide the activity for the evening. One of the highlights of the evening will be the Dummy Dunk, sponsored by the faculty men.

Other booths and activities are a fortune telling booth, sponsored by the Spanish Club; Bingo, serviced by the AWS; Bell and Hammer by the AMS; and an AMS side show.

WANT TO KISS

The FBLA will present "games of chance; kissing booths and follies, the Rally Committee; character sketches, art department students. The student council will take care of the basketball throw while the home economics classes will furnish food. A fish pond will be the job of the thirteenth year students while the 12th year students will handle a dart throw.

PROCEEDS FOR BUS

Proceeds from the Carnival will go towards a school bus which will aid in transportation of our players to games, student leaders to conferences, and other needs which may arise.

Program Of Recruitment Draws To End

As the Fresno Junior College's recruiting program draws to an end, the committee has expressed the belief that the effort made will picture success in increased enrollment figures this coming fall.

The recruiting committee was activated in December with the task of organizing a program designed to inform high school students in the central valley about the educational opportunities offered at the Fresno Junior College. Miss Willa Marsh, Dean of Students, has been in charge of the committee.

SENIORS HEAR LEADERS

To date, over 500 seniors from nearby high schools have visited the junior college campus and have heard from student leaders and administrators. In addition a group of talented FJC students have visited several schools to present the Fresno Junior College pictures to student bodies.

Plans for the visits to the senior classes of Edison, Roosevelt, Fresno High, and San Joaquin Memorial are currently being made.

Visiting students have been vitally interested in the practical type of training offered by the junior college in such lines as business, selling, and apprentice and shop training.

The opportunity to make up high school deficiencies also is attractive to those seniors who plan to work for the four-year Bachelor of Arts degree, Miss Marsh added.

Students from the high schools were also much interested with the idea that they could also take such helpful subjects as the bachelor's course, the bride's course, musical training, and writing preparation.

The committee reports that many of the visiting seniors have remarked about the friendly, pleasant attitude of FJC's students.

FJC Scholarship Open To Returning Student

Applications for a \$50 scholarship to Fresno Junior College will be accepted by Mrs. Irma Flannery, chairman of the scholarship committee no later than May 15 in M-23.

The award will be made on basis of scholarship, need, and anticipated enrolment at FJC for the year to be covered. The grant will take care of the costs of books, fees, and student body cards for the academic year 1950-51.

Should a student desire more than five tickets, he may apply at a later date. Tickets should be secured before May 20, 1950.

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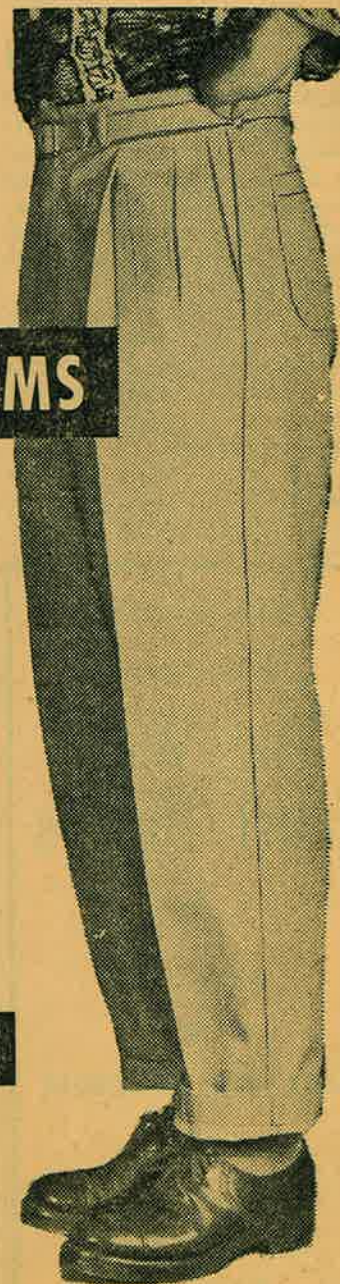

Baseballers To Defend CCJC Lead Against Taft

Tonight the Ram baseball team will travel to Taft to put their unbeaten record on the block against the much-improved Cougars.

The locals beat Taft early in the season, 7 to 3, in a practice game, but both squads have made changes in lineups since.

Coach Stoney Johnston is expecting the Cougars to field a strong team behind ace chucker Don Gleason, well known to Fresno JC fans because of his football and basketball ability.

To tame Cougar batsmen Johnston will probably start southpaw Rich Choochajian, who was effective against the southerners in the early season outing. Joe Ybanez and Joe Boracino may also get the starting nod.

RAMS HAVE POWER

The Rams' batting power, if recent games are an indication, will be provided by first baseman Jerry Anderson, outfielder Joe Spino, and third baseman Don Putman.

The remainder of Fresno starters will be Len Anderson, catcher; Lou Cocola, second base; Norm Britton, shortstop; and Gerry Manfredi and Maurice Fitzpatrick outfield.

POSSIBLE CHAMPS

Few observers have mentioned, perhaps because of superstition, that the Ram baseball squad may be on their way to the school's first inter-school championship. Several tough hurdles do remain—the biggest, at the moment, being Taft.

Although complete reports of conference standings are not available, Johnston reports that Taft, Coalinga, and Reedley have each been defeated once.

The Rams return to action locally next Thursday, May 11 against Coalinga to wind up their season.

RAMS DROP 3RD TO FSC FROSH

The Fresno Junior College nine bowed in defeat to the Fresno State College Frosh for the third consecutive time last week. In winning, the Frosh extended their victory streak to 19 straight games for an undefeated season.

As was the case in the other two games, the Rams handed the Frosh a lead in the early innings which they were never able to overcome. Two hits, four errors, and three walks added up to 4 runs in the first two innings of the ball game.

JC COMES BACK

Fresno JC came back with one run in the first on two hits, a double by Lou Cocola and a single by Jerry Anderson, and a long fly ball from the bat of Don Putman. They then added three runs in the sixth inning on three walks, three hits, and one error to tie up the ball game.
