Three Fresno Junior College faculty men will attend the Central California Industrial Administrators Conference at Modesto tomorrow night.

They are James E. Welden, trade and industrial education division chairman; Keith Emmert, apprenticeship training counselor; and Robert P. Hansler, trade and industrial education coordinator.

Welden said that the central section of the California Industrial Education Association will meet in Fresno October 20. Fresno Junior College will hold "open house" in its shops for the 150 delegates expected to the conference.

Don Perry and Merle Rush of Yosemite Junior High School are making arrangements for the conclave. The main speaker will be Samuel L. Fick, Sacramento, chief of the State Bureau of Trade and Industrial Education.

Welden said representatives from schools from Bakersfield to Modesto will attend the Fresno conference. Last year 125 were present.

FREEDOM

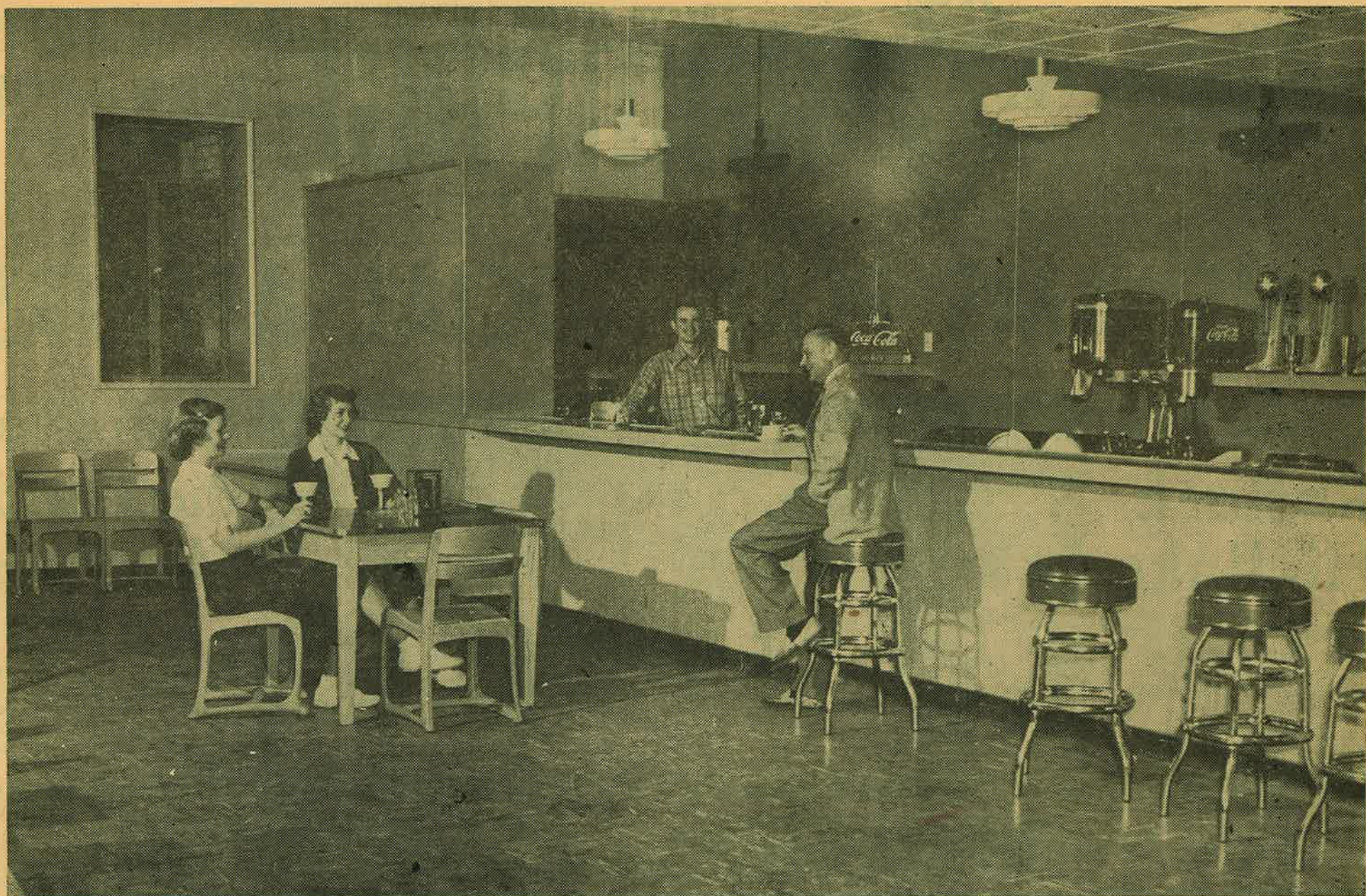

12-6. The Rams' coaches report the Menlo team will be "tough."

Widenhoefer said, "The honeymoon is over," and he predicted the Rams would have a "tough row to hoe" during the rest of the season.

Next week the Rams play at Salinas October 12 against Hartnell College. The next home game is October 18 with Porterville at 8 p.m. in Ratcliffe Stadium.

In pulverizing the Comets, the Rams ploughed to seven touchdowns, scoring two in the first, second, and fourth periods and one in the third.

Touchdowns were scored by Ronnie Chapanian, who ran wild to chalk up four; Winston Beasley, Iryea Mims, and Dale Bassett.

FJC's fast charging forward wall literally tore Palomar to shreds, and the Rams' backs were continually given wide holes to plow through to touchdown territory.

Palomar's only offensive threat came from halfbacks Harley Felture and Bob Leith. But FJC's line, led by Babe Obradovich, Jerry Halvorsen, Orv Crane, Pete Belden, Basseett and Keith Tucker, stopped the futile Comet attack dead in its tracks.

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
