## **Draft Tests** Planned For Fresno Area

College students or those who plan to enroll in a junior college or four-year institution will have two opportunities in Fresno during the 1951-52 school year to take the selective Service College Qualification Tests, Archie Bradshaw, Fresno Junior College dean of men, said yesterday.

Bradshaw announced that the tests, which were first given last spring in cities all over the country, are scheduled for December 13 and for April 24, 1952.

Applications for the examination to be given in December must be postmarked not later than midnight November 5. Applications for the April test must be made by March 10.

#### DRAFT BOARDS

Copies of bulletins of information, application blanks and official return envelopes may be obtained from local draft boards.

To be eligible to apply to take the test, a student must meet three requirements, according to E. Simpson, superintendent of puban announcement Bradshaw re- lic instruction. ceived from Earl J. McGrath, United States commissioner of education:

(1) He must intend to request deferment as a student;

(2) He must be satisfactorily pursuing a full-time college course;

(3) He must not have previously Qualification Test.

For most students the old requirement that they be under 26 will still apply, but for others the maximum age is 35, since the draft law has been amended to extend the liability for military service of certain registrants until they attain the age of 35.






