500 Delegates From 60 Jaysees To Meet In Fresno

When the California Junior College Student Government Conference meets in Fresno next week, November 15-17, with Fresno Junior College as hosts for the annual fall convention, the other eight junior colleges in the Central California Junior College Association will assist FJC in receiving the 500 delegates from 60 of the state's junior colleges.

Bradshaw Is Given New Appointment

Archie Bradshaw, dean of men of the Fresno Junior College, was notified of his appointment to the board of directors of the Veterans Service Committee of the Fresno Community Service Center by Reed K. Clegg, the center's director.

The appointment was made by General Ray Hays, the board's chairman. The committee, whose chairman is Austin Healey, is charged with the responsibility for veterans' problems in the community and for suggesting new or additional services which the center should institute for Fresno County veterans.

Other members of the committee are Alfred Thomas, Chet Cary, George Roth, Lawrence Viau, and Thomas Nelson.

Bradshaw was first director of the center and resigned in 1947. President Thomas A. Blakely of the Fresno Junior College is a member of the center's board of directors.

Bookstore Puts 1952 Class Rings On Sale

John Mullins, a FJC student who is state president of the organization, said that his conference is divided into three regions, northern, central, and southern. The three rotate the location of the state conference, which is held twice yearly.

The conference, with all sessions at the Californian Hotel, begins Thursday night with a banquet, when Dr. Frank Thomas, former president of the Fresno State College, will speak. A variety show, including professional entertainers, will follow.

Welcoming the delegates to Fresno will be FJC's president, Dr. Thomas A. Blakely, Miss Willa Marsh, dean of students, and Archie Bradshaw, dean of men.

The nine junior colleges in the central section are Fresno, Reedley, College of the Sequoias, Coalinga, Bakersfield, Porterville, Taft, Santa Maria, and San Luis Obispo.

Joseph King, FJC student council adviser who is supervising conference arrangements, explained that the conference is literally "student government in action" and that sessions are modelled after California's legislature and the United States Congress.

Louie Ingraham, a state officer and another FJC student, is state parliamentarian. Assisting Mullins and King in planning for the convention is Ward Longueville, FJC student body president, and members of his council and King's student government class.

Rams Play COS Giants Saturday

The Fresno Junior College Rams will seek their first conference win when they meet the College of Sequoias in Visalia Saturday night.

The conference tilt will be played in the Mineral King Bowl at 8 o'clock. The Rams will open their bid for the Central California Junior College Association football title.

The CCJCA is one of the most exclusive setups in Northern California with Taft, Fresno, and COS comprising the entire larger schools division. Taft already holds a win over the College of Sequoias' Giants and another loss would eliminate the Giants.

The Rams will try to eliminate their traditional rival in what will be a well-rounded and up-to-par game.

The Giants are hoping to upset the Rams so they can stay in the running for the CCJCA crown. Wins from Taft and COS for the Rams would cinch the title. If the Rams continue their high scoring performances as they did against Monterey, they should come out on top.

Plans are under way to make the CCJCA a six-team circuit with Reedley, Porterville, and Coalinga joining the conference. The Rams were champions in their division last year.

Although most Fresno Junior College students are demonstrating that they are here for serious purposes, a few are not keeping their attendance up to par. This minority wastes their time and squanders their parents' money.

I know that FJC instructors make plain to students our rules and regulations concerning attendance. Students should know that absence from class may be the cause for a lowered final grade in that course.

Instructors also are asked to send in a disqualification slip on any student when his cumulative absences exceed the total number of hours that subject meets during one week.

On Page 14 of our catalog are summarized FJC's rules for attendance, leaves of absences and make-up of missed course work. Read them; and if you have any questions, I am sure any instructor or our two deans will be glad to answer them.

Miss Willa Marsh, dean of students, and Archie Bradshaw, dean of men, report that 14 students, including three women, have had to be dropped from school for continually poor attendance.

At Fresno Junior College the administration and faculty feel that the students are not children and that they can be given privileges that have to be denied grade or high school students. But, as Marshal Ferdinand Foch once said, "With every privilege there goes a responsibility."

Your responsibility is to attend classes regularly.

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CSJCA Studies Athletics

Three recommendations on the "overemphasis of athletics" will be made to a December meeting of the athletic committee of the California State Junior College Association by the administrators of the state's 72 public junior colleges who comprise the association's membership.

Dr. Thomas A. Blakely, president of Fresno Junior College, who returned to campus Monday after attending the three-day annual fall meeting of the association in Yosemite National Park last week, said that the administrators unanimously went on record as opposing:

- (1) Postseason games in all sports;
- (2) Football bowl games; and
- (3) Recruitment of athletes outside the state.

After a motion by Dr. Ralph Prator, president of Bakersfield College, the association voted unanimously to ask the athletic committee to consider the administrators' action and to make recommendations, in turn, to the spring meeting of the California State Junior College Association, which will convene in Los Angeles during April.

Dr. Blakely explained that the association's constitution provides that initial action in such matters be taken by the athletic committee. The FJC president said four members of the nine member committee were present at the Yosemite meeting and voted in favor of the three proposals.

San Joaquin Valley members of the athletic committee include Dr. Edward Simonsen, Bakersfield Junior College; Donald Carr, Coalinga Junior College and P. E. Jamison, Porterville Junior College. Leo Wadsworth, Chaffey Junior College, is chairman.

Rams Down Lobos, 44-12, In Fresno

The FJC Rams overpowered the Monterey Lobos, 44-12, last Friday night in Ratcliffe Stadium.

The light but game Lobo pack was the victim of a powerful Ram squad that was sparked by halfback Winston Beasley, fullback Ronnie Chapanian and quarterback Eddie Perez.

The Rams unleashed a combination ground and air attack which was too much for the visiting Lobos.

The fired up JC eleven scored their first T.D. after the kickoff on the opening scrimmage play of the game. Winston Beasley took a pitch out from quarterback Bob Rodgers going around his right end and raced 66 yards with Chapanian putting the key block. Williams' conversion attempt was wide.

Minutes later the Rams fumbled on their own two yard line; the ball was recovered by the charging Lobos. With first down and goal to go, Monterey was penalized five yards. The Ram forward wall held the persistent Lobos and then took possession of the pigskin.

RON SCORES

With 95 yards to go, it took the Rams 15 plays, which were climaxed with Ronnie Chapanian's two yard plunge into the end zone.

Bob Williams booted the extra point.

The Lobos backfield consisted of quarterback Jim Hare, halfbacks Dick Garguilo, Enea and fullback Segovia. Hare did much of the Lobo's mail carrying and a fine piloting job.

SEGOVIA GOOD

Fullback Segovia kept the Ram's defensive line busy by consistent bucking of the line. Tom Haine was an outstanding lineman for the Monterey eleven.

Weer and Hare both did a fine job on offense for the Lobos. Both scores for Monterey were on pass plays from Jim Hare to Dick Garguilo.

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Student Council Warns FJC About Attendance

Because of the lack of regularity of students attending classes, the FJC student council would like to point out four things to students regarding attendance.

First, students who do not attend regularly are cheating themselves and are wasting their time in being enrolled.

A student is automatically disqualified from any class when his cumulative absences exceed the total number of hours that class meets during one week. The student must then apply for readmission to the class.

Some students are failing to keep their FJC attendance in certain classes or in all "up to par." Three hundred and twelve students were absent last week from Monday through Friday, for one period or a whole week.

The number of students to be dropped from school because of continually poor attendance is increasing; Miss Willa Marsh, dean of students has had to drop three women students, and Archie Bradshaw, dean of men, has dropped 11 men for the same reason.

If class attendance does not increase, Ramble Inn might have to be closed during class hours, the council said.

Please cooperate and urge others to attend classes.
