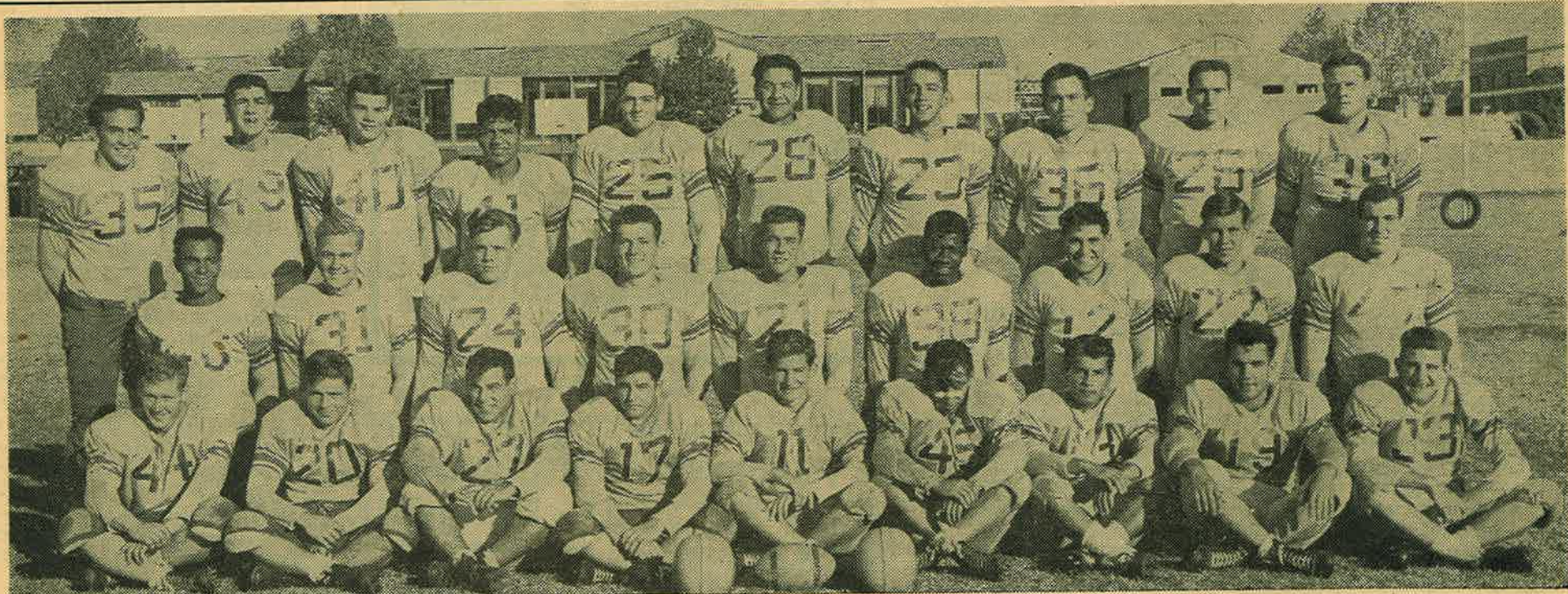

PREREGISTRATION DATES WILL START JANUARY 14

The Fresno Junior College will begin preregistration and student counseling for the spring semester January 14th.

President Thomas A. Blakely announced that the college's three divisions will offer more than 15 new courses when the second semester begins February 6th. FJC official registration is scheduled February 4-5th.

Courses which have never been offered at FJC in previous semesters which will be given in the spring semester include geology, anatomy, physiology, home management for men, home mechanics, economic problems, and labor relations.

Blakely also announced that the junior college will offer a number of courses in the spring which were not available during the fall semester.

They include blueprint reading, surveying, slide rule, physical studies, small business operation, tax accounting, secretarial training, and secretarial problems.

Blakely said the three division chairmen and Robert F. Hansler, trade and industrial education coordinator, may arrange other new courses. The chairmen include John M. Mock, general education; Ethel McCormack, business education; and James E. Welden, trade and industrial education.

Information may be obtained from Mrs. Irene Stewart, FJC registrar, or from the division heads. The phone number is 3-5241.

Mrs. Stewart announced the 1280 FJC students now enrolled may go through preregistration procedures by making appointments in the division offices and by consultations with their advisers.

Prospective students not now enrolled who wish to make appointments for preregistration are asked by Mrs. Stewart to come first to her office in the main wing of the FJC building at 1430 O street.

Blakely announced the college will give its English and Reading Classification Examination February 2nd in the FJC library. Paul Mueller, English department head, will be in charge.

1280 Attend FJC Classes

Dr. Thomas A. Blakely, FJC president, today announced the December enrolment here is 1280, the highest so far this year, although most colleges have fewer students after three months of school.

Even though the total attending day classes has decreased during November slightly to 657, a big increase in FJC's evening trade and industrial education programs, with a total of 623, has more than offset the day class decline.

Bradshaw Says Absences Will Affect Grades

"Absence from class will affect final grades as well as being a cause for disqualification from school," quoted Archie Bradshaw, dean of men, as a reminder to FJC students.

Mr. Bradshaw added that men students who are in satisfactory attendance may be deferred at the discretion of the local draft board until the close of the school year.

The Fresno Junior College will honor its football conference champions, the Rams, Wednesday in a banquet in FJC's Ramble Inn.

Bob Bronson, head pigskin coach at San Jose State College, has been invited to be the speaker by Paul Starr, FJC director of athletics. Starr has also asked Joe Drilling, KMJ sports announcer, to be the master of ceremonies for the annual affair, which will begin at 6:30 p.m.

Coach Hans Wiedenhoefer of the Rams announced two special awards will be presented to outstanding members of the 1951 squad, which lost only one game during the season.

Wiedenhoefer and one of his assistant coaches, Ray McCarthy, will present a trophy given by the American Legion Post 509 to the outstanding Ram, and they will also present an encribed football to the outstanding team captain of the year. The Rams selected a different captain for each game.

Special guests at the banquet will include representatives of the press and radio and FJC and Fresno City School District administrators.

I hope the New Year, 1952, will bring happiness to all, and I hope that the valley, state, national and international problems may be alleviated during that year.

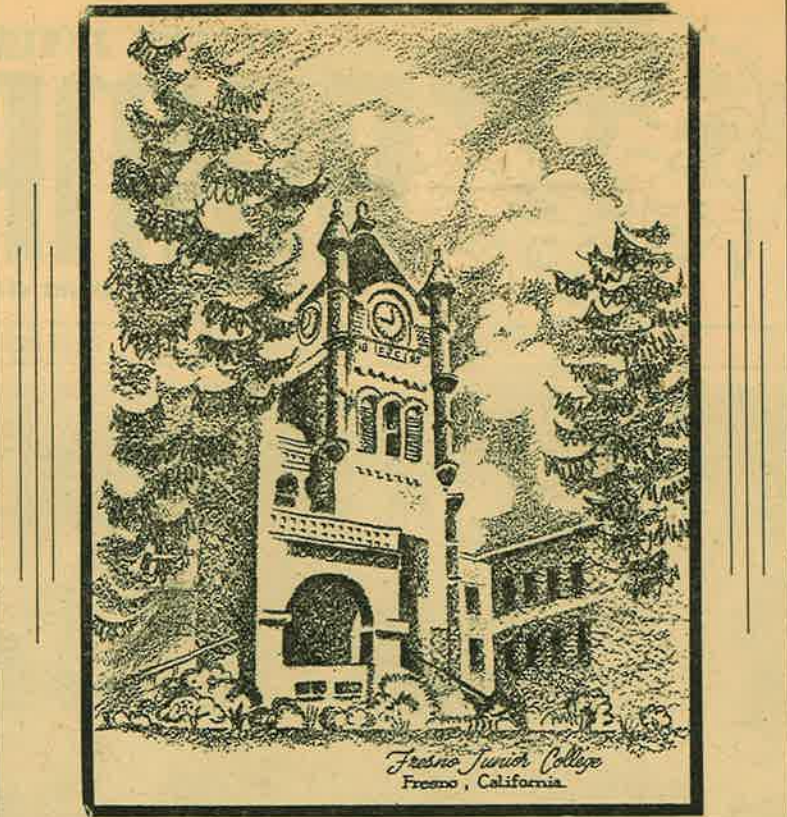

FJC Has Dual History Since 1910 Founding

Fresno Junior College is one of the youngest, and at the same time, the oldest junior college in the state. Are you wondering how it can be the youngest and at the same time the oldest? Well, here is a background on FJC.

FJC was founded in 1910, the first in California and one of the first in the United States and the world. It was in existence until about 1921, where it ceased to exist about the time the Fresno normal school, forerunner of Fresno State College, was being reorganized by the State Board of Education.

The FJC building was first the Fresno High School until Fresno High moved to the northern part of the city in 1921. From 1921 until 1948 FJC was the only college here. In 1948 the State Board of Education asked the Fresno City Unified School District to establish a junior college as part of the action the board (state) was taking to meet the recommendation of the Strayer Report, the recent "Bible" on planning for higher education in California. The Fresno Tech students were absorbed by other high schools.

Erwin Dann, assistant superintendent for secondary schools, was appointed by Edwin C. Kratt, city superintendent of schools, to act as president. Dann served as head of Fresno JC during the 1948-49 and 1949-50 school years.

Dr. Thomas A. Blakely, formerly administrative assistant at College of Marin, became president in 1950. This is his second year.

Casabateers Break Even In First 2 Tilts

Coach Paul Starr's basketball squad, which has broken even in two starts in the 1951 campaign, plays at Modesto Junior College tonight.

Next week the Rams will play four home games. They take on Fullerton Junior College Monday in the Fresno High gym, Pasadena City College Tuesday in the Edison High gym, Camp Roberts Friday in the FHS gym, and Bakersfield College Saturday in the FHS gym. All games begin at 8 p.m.

After a return engagement here with Grant Technical College of Sacramento the day after Christmas (FHS at 8 p.m.), the Rams will have a vacation until January 2, when they will return to Modesto for a junior college tourney.

In the first game of the season Friday night the Rams walloped the Fresno State College junior varsity casaba men, 50-32. Coach Starr used the platoon system of substitution, Fogal, Wilson, Hockersmith, Smith and Ohanian played the first and third quarters, with Beasley, McCrady, Owens, Miller and Halderman handling the second and fourth quarters. Halftime score was FJC, 24; FSC, 17.

In the second game Saturday night at Sacramento against Grant Tech J.C. the Rams dropped an overtime game, 43-38, after FJC led, 17-15, at the half. The game was tied, 36-36, at the end of the regulation periods, but Tech's George Larsen threw in three points in the overtime session to drop the Rams.

Starr said his men have played good defensive ball in the first two games but that they were poor on offense in the loss to Grant Tech. He has little height and experience on the squad, except for 6 foot 8 inch Ronnie Miller, who was the outstanding player in the first home game with FSC junior varsity, chalking up 14 points.
