No Cut Is Planned In SB Card Price For Spring Term

The Student Council voted to table discussion on the reduction of the cost of student body cards at last week's meeting.

The council heard a report from the Budget Committee, headed by Marie Lipscomb. The committee's recommendation was that there should be nothing done about it at this time, but if the council were to go ahead and act they should not reduce the cost to less than \$8 for fall and \$7 for spring.

The Budget Committee believed that this would bring about too drastic a reduction in the working budget and lower the financial status of the student activities which are helped through the sale of the cards. Some of this budget has been committeed since last fall, stated Miss Lipscomb.

No more action on this matter will be taken until the newly-elected council takes office for the spring semester, Duke Potere, retiring president, revealed.

MARCH OF DIMES NEEDS FUNDS

Ninteen Hundred Fifty was the third straight year of high Ninteen Hundred Fifty was the third straight year of high polio incidence. There is at present a tremendous backlog of Consider Nurses 30,000 cases from other years still needing care, and there is no way of preventing new epidemics in 1951.


As time goes by, more people are being stricken, more communities are being affected, more patients must be cared for. More of us must give help to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Half of all funds raised in this community will remain in this community to care for local cases. The remainder will go to National Headquarters to finance a national board program of scientific research that seeks a solution to infantile paralysis, to train professional workers, and to give epidemic aid to chapters.

By September 9, 1950, 780 chapters in 43 states had used What makes a school? Many people will answer "spirit," or up their chapter funds in caring for patients, and the national office had sent an additional \$5,803,050 in emergency aid to those areas. The National Foundation is now operating at a deficit to meet all responsibilities of care, treatment, epidemic aid, professional education, and scientific research.

Polio can hit any person, any time, any place. Every edidemic leaves in its wake a critical backlog, of crippled children and adults. The responsibility growes heavier with each year that passes, as new thousands are added to the roster. The National Foundation during 1950 had to use every available dollar to provide its pledged assistance. There are now no reserves for 1951 patient care.

Besides being a worthy cause, the March of Dimes is an essential cause. The need is great and the need is urgent. All of us must contribute what we can. Any one of us may need the facilities of the National Foundation at any time. We must have facilities available to ourselves, our families and our friends if and when the need for them comes.



A plan to train practical nurses to replace registered nurses who may be called to serve with the armed forces is now under consideration by Fresno Junior College officials and nursing directors of local hospitals.

California at present has a shortage of 6500 registered nurses, and 500 of those now in the state will probably be called into the various services. It takes several years to train a registered nurse, while practical nurses can be trained for the war emergency in a year to take over many of the duties of registered nurses.

HAVE DISCUSSION

These and other facts and ideas were discussed Tuesday night at a meeting at the Fresno General Hospital. Miss Ruth Jorgensen, director of nursing services at the hospital, acted as chairman.

Others of the group were Miss Myrtle Rapp, assistant director of nurses training at the Community Hospital; Mrs. Alice Schindel, director of the school of nursing at the General Hospital; Maurice Reetz, Dean of Education at the junior college; and Dr. Thomas A. Blakely, president of the college. NO COURSE IN VALLEY

There are at present 7 practical nurses training schools operating in California under a joint hospitalpublic school program similar to the one proposed for FJC. All are located outside the San Joaquin Valley.

Under the proposed program, trainees would attend classes for 18 weeks, 30 hours a week and then complete the remainder of the year's training at a hospital on a 40-week basis. While at the hospital, they would receive \$30 per month, laundry and meals.

Present pay scales for practical nurses are \$9 per day on private duty and \$165 to \$185 per month for general hospital duty.

Shops Construct Redwood Sign For Campus Display

The Fresno Junior College is to further its existence being known with the aid of a redwood sign to be erected in the not too distant future, Dr. Thomas Blakely, FJC president, said today. The sign is in the process of being treated, in a Fresno paint shop, to bring out the redness of the wood; also it is being painted with red luminous paint so that it will show up at night.

The designers of the sign are Miss Kate Darling and Mr. A. E. Sullivan. Mr. Seth Cowan cut out the letters, and the members of the bricklaying class will build the brick piers on which the sign is to be erected.
