Roy Seiler Wins Time Quiz Award With 80% Score

Roy Seiler, a History 2A student, won the recent Current Events Test given in a number of the social science classes. The test was sponsored by Time, a weekly news magazine.

Seiler scored 80 out of a possible 105. Runners-up included James Telegan and Haig Mosesian with scores of 79, and Adele Summers with 78. Seiler will receive a \$5 book for his efforts.

Faculty scores, while held confidential, saw Paul Soderstrom, typing instructor, the winner and recipient of a book order. Noel Frodsham of the social science department, who administered the tests, commented that the faculty scores were not as high as the top students scores, except in one or two instances.

Students and faculty alike did well on the "War in Asia" section of the examination, but scored low in sections devoted to United States Affairs and domestic news.

Time Magazine provided the prizes for this contest, which is an annual event.

Program Changes OK Next Tuesday

Requests for change of program will not be honored before Tuesday, February 13, with two exceptions, Dean of Men Harold Sanderson said yesterday.

The exceptions are for changes made necessary due to revision of the official class schedule and for the addition of physical education following payment of towel fee.

Deadline for program changes will be February 23.

The student must originate his request for change of program with his faculty adviser. Duplicate copies of the request must then be approved by the division chairman and the class instructors concerned. One copy of the change of program request shall then be taken to the attendance office, and the other to the Registrar.

Sanderson asks that students contact advisers for changes of program during their free periods or immediately after their last period during the day.

During the first week of program changes, faculty advisers will remain in their offices after school to accommodate students desiring program changes.

Petitions Are Out For Spring Vote On AMS Officers

Men students interested in running for Associated Men Student office should secure their petitions now in the main office. The deadline for returning completed petitions to the office will be Monday, February 19th.

Election of spring semester officers will be held on Friday, February 23.

The AMS has delayed their election from a pre-registration date to give assurance to voters that elected men students would be enrolled for the spring term.

AMS activities are all stag affairs. According to John Mullins, outgoing president, "They offer a wonderful opportunity for men to become better acquainted with their fellow students."

One of the first tasks of the new officers will be to plan an active social calendar, Mullins said, and then set up an organization to interest all men students.

"With a little help from all men students, we of Fresno Junior College can make our AMS organization one of the strongest in the state of California," Mullins said. "Get behind your school and your organizations. Secure your petitions now and run for the office of your choice."

VACATION MONDAY

Fresno Junior College and other schools in the city will be closed in observance of Abraham Lincoln's birthday on Monday, February 12.

The remaining holidays for the spring semester are, according to the Fresno City Schools Calendar, Washington's birthday, February 22; Spring Holidays, March 23 to 29, inclusive; and Memorial Day, May 30.

Spring Enrollment Nears 700; Late Registrations Expected To Swell Figure

Incomplete enrollment figures indicate that registration at Fresno Junior College is nearing 700, with enrollees still being processed.

In addition to those enrolled in regular classes, more than a hundred high school juniors and seniors are enrolled in trade and industrial classes on a half-day basis while continuing high school courses.

New Draft Policy Gives Men Delay, Service Selection

A new basic policy for postponement of induction and enlistment in the armed service by college students has been recently announced by the Secretary of Defense, General Marshall.

Under the new policy a young man called by Selective Service during the academic year can continue his studies and still retain the right to designate his choice of service by enlisting in the period beginning 90 days before the termination of the school year and ending 30 days before the termination date.

Services accepting enlistments during this two-month period will not call the students to duty until they have finished their school year.

The above does not relieve the individual from the responsibility of applying to selective service for postponement of draft.

The change in policy eliminates the necessity of a student dropping from school in the middle of the semester in order to enter the branch of the service he desires.

Dr. Thomas Blakely, junior college president, announced that congress is at present considering the authorization of establishing Reserve Office Training Class units in junior colleges.

Dean of Men Harold Sanderson, in the main office, is keeping an up-to-date file of information pertaining to selective service, reserve programs, and enlistments for information of Fresno Junior College students.

Student Committee Will Make Study Of Canteen

Following receipt of a letter in the suggestion box, a student committee has been appointed to study the types of foods most desired by FJC students. The study will be made on possible greater variety, facilities, and price considerations.

Several factors to be considered will be a rise in food costs, help and equipment costs, and subsequent costs in the light of recommendations made.

The committee are Mrs. Mylius Shoemaker, homemaking instructor; Rowena Campbell, Jess Olinger, Jim Telegan, Mary Ann Hightower, and Sally Lane.

Enrollment in late-afternoon classes held from 5:45 to 7 p.m. was unexpectedly high. Comptometry, PBX, office machines and typing are business courses being offered to help employed persons improve or increase their skills while they work at full time jobs.

No figures are available on enrollment in the night school classes, but registration figures will be published as soon as complete.

Students enrolling late will report to the registrar for a registration permit and check list. After completion of the study list agreement, payment of fees, and filling out necessary registration forms, the student will be issued a white identification card which will admit him to classes.

Upon completion of the enrollment procedure, all students are expected to attend all classes in which they are enrolled. Absence slips must be obtained from the deans for every absence from class, and no changes of program may be made before Tuesday, February 13. Program changes will then be honored without penalty until February 23.

Petitions for program changes must be approved by students' advisors and by division chairmen before changes can be made.

IMPORTANCE OF ATTENDANCE

Public supported junior colleges, of which Fresno Junior College is one, must give close accounting on attendance of students. Monies for support are derived from the state according to the average daily attendance at the school.

Because of this dependence for money, students at Fresno Junior College have a responsibility to fulfill — careful attention to attendance and to the procedures involved in reporting to class following absence.

When a student is shown absent in an instructor's book for one time more than the course has credit units, the instructor enters a disqualification notice with the attendance clerk. **This disqualification does not mean that the student will not be re-admitted.** Rather, it is a notice to the dean that for some reason the student is not attending class regularly. The slip also prevents the return of the student to that class until he has conferred with the dean as to reasons for his failure to be in regular attendance.

The Dean of Students, Miss Willa Marsh, and the Dean of Men, Mr. Harold Sanderson, should be consulted when prolonged absences are necessary or when other problems in regard to attendance are encountered.

Activity Classes Give Credit Offer Enjoyment For Enrollees

Registration figures disclose that there are several openings in classes of an activity nature that can be taken for elective credit, Miss Willa Marsh, dean of students, revealed today.

In the speech field Radio Broadcasting offers opportunity for students to learn to write, produce, and air radio programs from Fresno Junior College's new studio in M46. Joe King is the instructor for the course which offers 2 units of credit.

Mr. King also revealed that students interested in school social or governmental activities may enroll for General Studies 1, Student Government, held Tuesday and Thursday mornings at 8.

Miss Marsh pointed out that classes in art listed as 9 to 11 a.m. or 2 to 4 p.m. can be taken for one hour for part credit. Students interested should see Miss Kate Darling, Art instructor, to make arrangements.

Musical activities from the Fresno Junior College will be expanded this semester with the enrollment of new talent in the Mixed Chorus and the Dance Band. Openings in both classes still exist, Lowell Spencer, instructor, said following the first class meeting Monday.

Representatives of the music classes have appeared a number of times during the fall semester before service clubs of Fresno. This spring they plan to visit high schools in the Fresno area with talent shows to accompany talks on the program of the Fresno Junior College.

The Dance Band, which convenes on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday at 10 has room for a trumpet and a sax man, according to Spencer. He also urged anyone who wanted to begin study of a musical instrument, or to continue work with one, to sign up for Musicianship, offered Tuesday and Thursday at 10 a.m.

Change of programs to enter any of these classes should be completed on February 13, Miss Marsh said, but arrangements to enter the classes should be done as soon as possible.

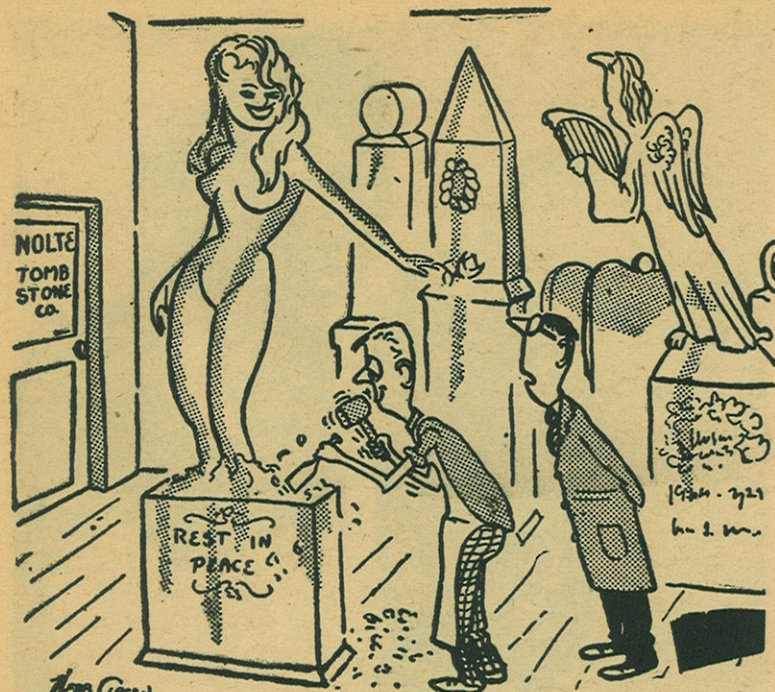

Radio Class Will Install Equipment In New JC Studio

Construction work on Fresno Junior College's radio room is completed. Installation of the equipment, which is now on hand, will be done under the supervision of Louis Kozub, radio instructor, as part of regular class work. Mr. Kozub's class will also maintain and operate the equipment.

The studio will be used by students who enroll in the course, Principals of Radio Broadcasting. The class will be taught by Joe King, and no pre-requisite, other than approval of the instructor, will be required.

The course will cover reading and writing commercials, mike technique, continuity writing, and program production. Programs originating at FJC may be aired over any Fresno station.

Students who wish to enroll in Mr. King's or Mr. Kozub's classes should consult those instructors at an early date for further information. M46, location of the new studio, is open for anyone who wishes to view the new structure.

The three-unit studio will consist of a small announcing room, a larger main studio, and a control room. Large glass windows permit easy vision into and out of the three rooms.

Station managers and chief engineers of Fresno's radio stations have agreed to act as FJC's Radio Activities Advisory Board. Station managers are Hal Brown, KMJ; Clyde Coombs, KARM; Gene Chennault, KYNO; and Paul Bartlett, KFRE.

Chief technicians are Bill Williams, KMJ; Elbert Dean, KARM; Bert Williams, KYNO; and Keith Mealy, KFRE.

All plans have been approved by the board and all members have pledged cooperation and support of programs and use of local radio station broadcasting facilities.
