MULLINS NAMED **HEAD OF STATE** STUDENT GROUP

John Mullins, student body president, was elected to serve as president of the next California Junior College Student Government Conference which will be held in Fresno in October with Fresno Junior College as host. Louis Ingraham is the state parliamentarian.

Students from junior colleges throughout California will attend the conference here; between 400 and 500 representatives are expected. Student body officers are working on plans for housing, feeding and entertaining the delegates. A location will be decided upon by May 15, when invitations will be sent to all participating junior col-

Mullins was elected at the conference held in Long Beach April 26-28. Other representatives at the convention were Ingraham, Joe Spino, Rowena Campbell, Ward Longueville and Jim Telegan. Speech instructor Joe King was the faculty sponsor.

A resolution approving inclusion of all student activities on student transcripts of record was introduced by FJC representatives and adopted at the conference in Long Beach.

Another resolution was passed approving ROTC training in junior nia members of Congress to vote for the measure now in the Sen-

Three resolutions concerning sports were passed. One recommended a standardized award to pe presented to every athlete who receives a "first team all conference" recognition in his respective conference. Another recommended reduced prices for sports events to a member of any junior college upon presentation of his student body card.

Participation in the National Junior College Athletic Association in basketball alone was favored in a third resolution, because many small colleges cannot support a full sports program.

A list of basic responsibilities of delegates to JC conferences and a code of conduct were also adopted at the Long Beach meet.

Clint Wheeler, chairman of rallies, will introduce Coach Paul Starr, who will speak to the students and introduce the track team.

The track team will go to Reedley tomorrow to compete in the Central California Junior College Conference Meet there. Preliminaries will be held 3 to 5 p.m., and finals 7-9. FJC trackmen will be entered in all events.

Full coverage of the nominations assembly will be provided by the Rampage staff. A special Ramette bulletin will be published Tuesday giving the names of all candidates for all offices. The bulletin will briefly state the platforms of nominees, All candidates who wish to make a statement for publication should prepare it in writing and turn it in to a member of the Rampage staff immediately following the assembly.



Nurses Training — Increased demand for more nurses training at the junior college has made an extended program of courses for nurses a necessary part of the new schedule. During the first half-year of training the nurses will enroll at the junior college in Related Science, Foods and Nutrition, Oral and Written English, Mental Hygiene, Ethics and Personal Hygiene, and Nurses Procedures.

Incoming students for the nurses training program will be given an English proficiency examination which requires 10th grade level ability for passing. In addition they must pass a special aptitude test prepared by the Practical Nurses Association, and must have a personal interview for guidance and counseling purposes.

The Fresno State J.V. baseball team eked out a 6 to 5 victory over the Fresno JC Rams last Friday afternoon in the Fresno State College ballpark in a practice tilt.

The Rams jumped to an early lead with one run in the first inning. Norm "WeePee" Britton reached first on an error; Ben Yano also reached first via the error route; then Jerry Manfredi singled in Britton.


State evened the count in their half of the first on two walks, two stolen bases, and a passed ball.


Since the ways of baseball are as they are, whenever two teams meet, either of the two can wind up the winner, no matter which one is superior. This is especially true when the teams are well matched.
