Free Polio **Shots Will** Be Given

Volunteer doctors, nurses and others will conduct a series of clinics at Fresno Junior College next week in an attempt to stamp out poliomyelitis.

The clinics, which will begin next Wednesday at Fresno State College, will kick off the greatest drive in local history to provide immunity to FJC and FSC students against the dreaded disease. The FJC clinic will be held one week from today, Mar. 28.

The clinics are part of a program financed by state funds. Each student will receive two free shots. The third, usually given 7 to 12 months after the second, is the "booster" and is not free, except to students under the age of 20. The Fresno County Health Department will give the third shot.

Mrs. Anne Gabel, the FJC school nurse, stated, "College students should take advantage of this wonderful opportunity to receive the two free polio shots. If everyone would we could greatly reduce the disease and perhaps someday even control it."

Mrs. Gabel said that the polio vaccination is safe. Since 1955, millions of doses of the Salk vaccine have been given with complete safety and effectiveness. Last year there were no deaths attributed to polio in the United States among persons who had received all three injections, and in California no confirmed case of paralytic polio occurred in any person who had completed the series of three

Dr. Edna Winter, the FSC director of health services, is organizing the two clinics with the assistance of Mrs. Gabel and Dr. Earl Coleman, a retired FSC director of health services.


JC Nurses Attend Career Day Event

Students Under 21 Must Have Folks OK For Shots

Students under 21, desiring to get the free Salk Polio vaccinations, must have their parents' or guardians' permission. Slips have been passed out to students during the past week in classes.

The approval slip does not mean that the vaccine is not safe. It is merely a State law requiring any person under the age of 21 to obtain the permission of a parent or guardian before being vaccinated against any kind of disease.

Students are asked to have this slip signed now, so that they will have them available at the time of inoculation.

Again the Rampage would like to stress the importance of obtaining these shots. Infantile paralysis is a terrible and dreaded disease. We owe it to ourselves to help stamp out this menace to every man, woman, and child.

Remember the inoculation dates of Mar. 28, and Apr. 25, they are important in the lives of every Fresno Junior College student.

Cigarette smoke plugs up airplanes—actually tightens the seal of pressurized cabins. When a new air transport was delivered, according to Flight Safety Foundation, a test showed a leakage through the pressurized shell of 190 cubic feet a minute. However, with the passag of time and millions of cubic feet of smoke-laden air, the tobacco tars lowered the leakage to 90 cubic feet a minute. The tars also fouled up the orifices that meter out the exhaust air, so the transport's operators now are experimenting with filters on cabin pressure regulators.

It has long been known that tobacco tars have affected flying instruments — even blind-flying instruments-and airplane manufacturers are constantly designing to overcome smoke-tar accumulations.

Curry, who is the present parliamentarian for the FJC Student Council, defeated Coalinga's nominee for parliamentarian.




