

64 Attend On Honor Program

The honors program for high school students in FCC has 64 students enrolled. There were 61 last spring and 48 in the fall of 1959.

Vice President John S. Hansen said 60 seniors are taking part in the program for college credits. This is an increase of 13 more students for each of the two previous semesters. Three juniors and a sophomore are registered for high school credits.

The seniors include 33 students from Fresno High School, 10 from McLane High School, seven from Bullard High School, four from Roosevelt High School, four from San Joaquin Memorial High School and two from Washington Union High School.

Hansen said the 64 students are enrolled in 15 different courses. One of the courses is a night class and one meets both days and nights. Eleven of the students are taking two subjects.

The foreign languages are four unit classes, while the others are three units. Seven units is the maximum any student is taking. Students with one subject are in 8-AM classes, while most of those with two are in 8 AM and 9 AM classes.

Hansen said, "This program is proving to be a great success according to the FCC faculty members and students participating in it."

He said junior colleges throughout the state are offering similar programs to high school students.

FCC Council Moves Office

Moving was in store for the student council this year, as they once again moved into Room 229 in the student center.

They were originally in 229 until last year, when the room was used for research by the Fresno City Schools.

"Last year's student council shared Joseph King's office in 201, student center," said Don Walker, student body president.

Because of the increase in faculty members, Dan Ozier was assigned to share King's office this year.

"The research personnel was then moved out of 229, making the room available for student council meetings," Walker stated.

Student council meets Tuesdays at noon. "Any student body member is welcome to attend," said Miss Doris Deakins advisor.

Veterans' Enrollment Is Down 50 Per Cent

The admissions office reported that 223 veterans are enrolled at FCC this year, which is a drop of 214 from last year.

Mrs. Louise B. Murphy, secretary of the veterans office, said the reason for this approximately 50 per cent drop is because fewer veterans are qualifying for the benefits of Public Law 550, the Korean GI Bill. To qualify a veteran must

have entered the armed forces before Jan. 31, 1955, and started his education within three years after his discharge.

Veterans going to school are paid according to the number of units they are carrying and the number of dependents they claim.

Mrs. Murphy said there are 191 students under Public Law 550, six under the state "Cal-Vet" law, and eight under Public Law 894.

Eighteen students are attending FCC under the two federal "war orphan" acts. There are eight under Public Law 634 and 10 under Public Law 881.

There are five women students attending FCC under the GI Bill this year. They are Dora Cabrera, Frances E. Jones, Virginia Petersen, Mary Jo Shaw, and Anna M. Wilkinson.

FSC Hosts Debate Team

The Fresno City College debate team traveled to Fresno State College yesterday for a practice debate at 3 PM.

Franz Weinschenk, speech instructor, said the inter-collegiate topic of the debate was Resolved: That the United States should adopt a plan of compulsory health insurance for all citizens.

Alan Hays and Reginald Marcellino were one team; Jack Crockett and Michael McConnell another team; David St. Louis and Neil Nuotio the third team; and Dennis Rogers and Morgan May were the fourth team.

Substitutes were Eugene Salazar and Gordon Berg.

The practice debate was judged by the two coaches, Dr. Provost and Weinschenk. They gave a critique of the debate.

Weinschenk said the Forensic Club is planning to attend the Northern California Forensic Association Tournament on Oct. 28-29. The tournament is to be held at the College of the Pacific in Stockton. The tournament will consist of debate, oratory, and impromptu.

Some of the debate team members are veterans, having competed on the team last year.

Students Use Language Lab

The foreign language laboratory was opened during the past academic school year. D. Lee Ross, language instructor, said it is used by students taking one of the four different foreign languages offered here. German and Russian is taught by G. Alex Kalistratov, French by William A. Reynolds and Spanish by Ross.

The language laboratory is a large room comprised of thirty cubicles possessing a modern acoustical system to reduce sounds. Included in each cubicle is a microphone. Also found there is tape recorder and earphones.

Ross said that the tape recorders are especially designed so that one can listen and record his responses, simultaneously. This way, he can work by himself. Instructors can listen in on students with a monitoring feature.

It is open from 2-4 PM Mondays through Fridays and from 6:30-7:30 PM on Mondays through Thursdays. A person can remain in a booth as long as he desires. This method gives every student a chance to recite. It gives more emphasis on the spoken rather than the written work.

The lab is the only one of its kind in the Fresno City Schools system.

He stated that there has never been more opportunities for grad-



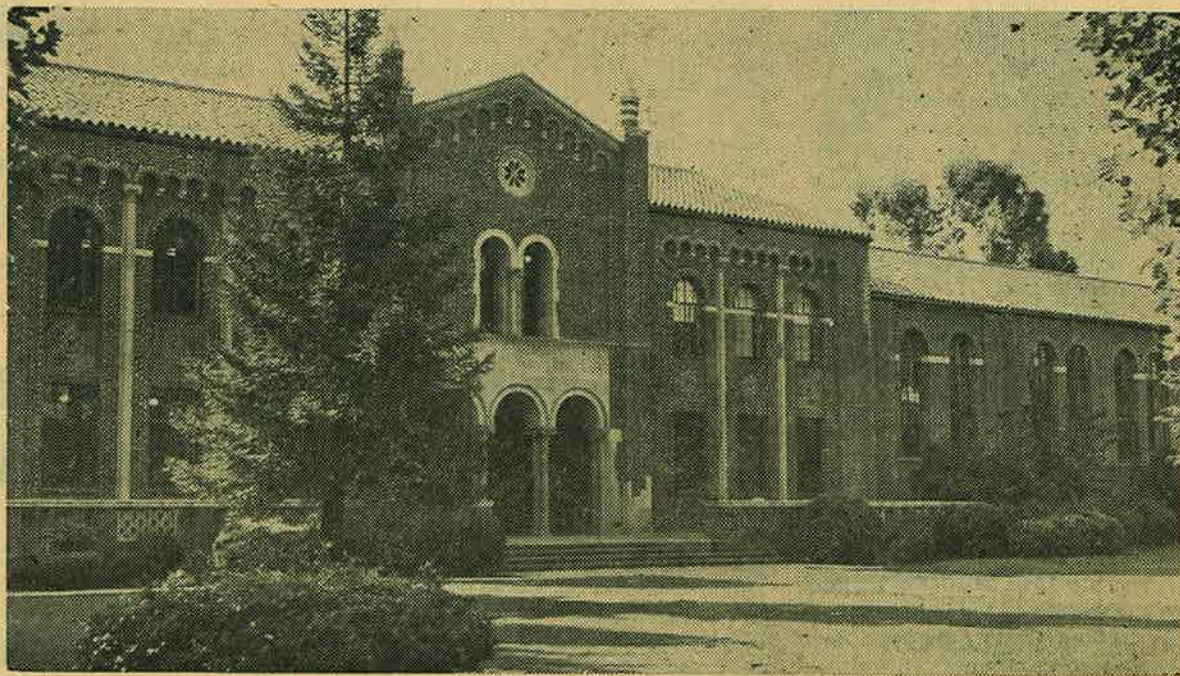

CARD SALES NET \$31,290

Fresno City College financial secretary, Arlene Vetting reported that more money was brought in this semester from the sale of student body cards than was brought in last semester.

Miss Vetting said there were 2,705 student body cards sold to day students at \$10 apiece, totaling \$27,050. There were 2,170 student body cards sold to night students at two dollars apiece totaling \$2,000, which brings the total of the sale of student body cards to \$31,290.

Comparing this with last semester, there were approximately 2,400 day student body cards sold at eight dollars apiece, totaling \$19,200. There were approximately 2,000 cards sold to night students, totaling \$2,000.

The money is given to the student council, in which they decide how the money is to be spent.

Vetting said the policy of refunding the student body fee is: The first week the student redeems the full amount. The second week the student can get only half of the fee back. After the second week the student cannot get any of the fee back.

Cars Go To Taft

Don Walker, student body president, announced that there will be a car train formed to travel to the football game at Taft College this Saturday.

He said the train will leave from the front of the Student Center on Saturday at 5 PM.

The car train will not be officially sponsored by the college.

A freshman nominations assembly will be held today at noon in the auditorium to select candidates for freshman class officers, for the fall semester.

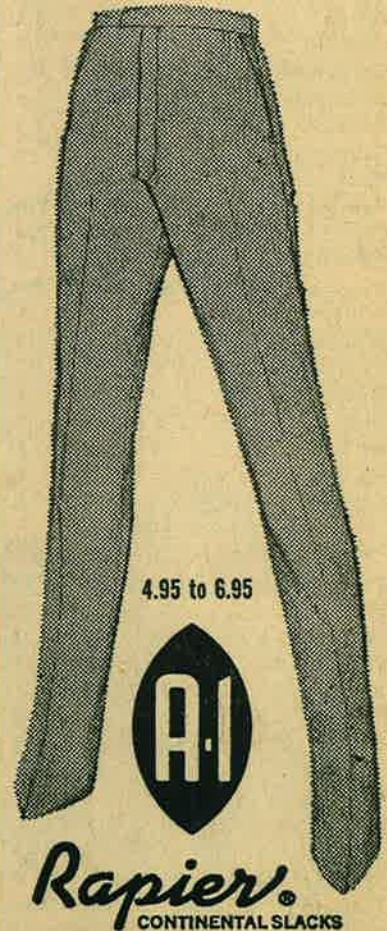

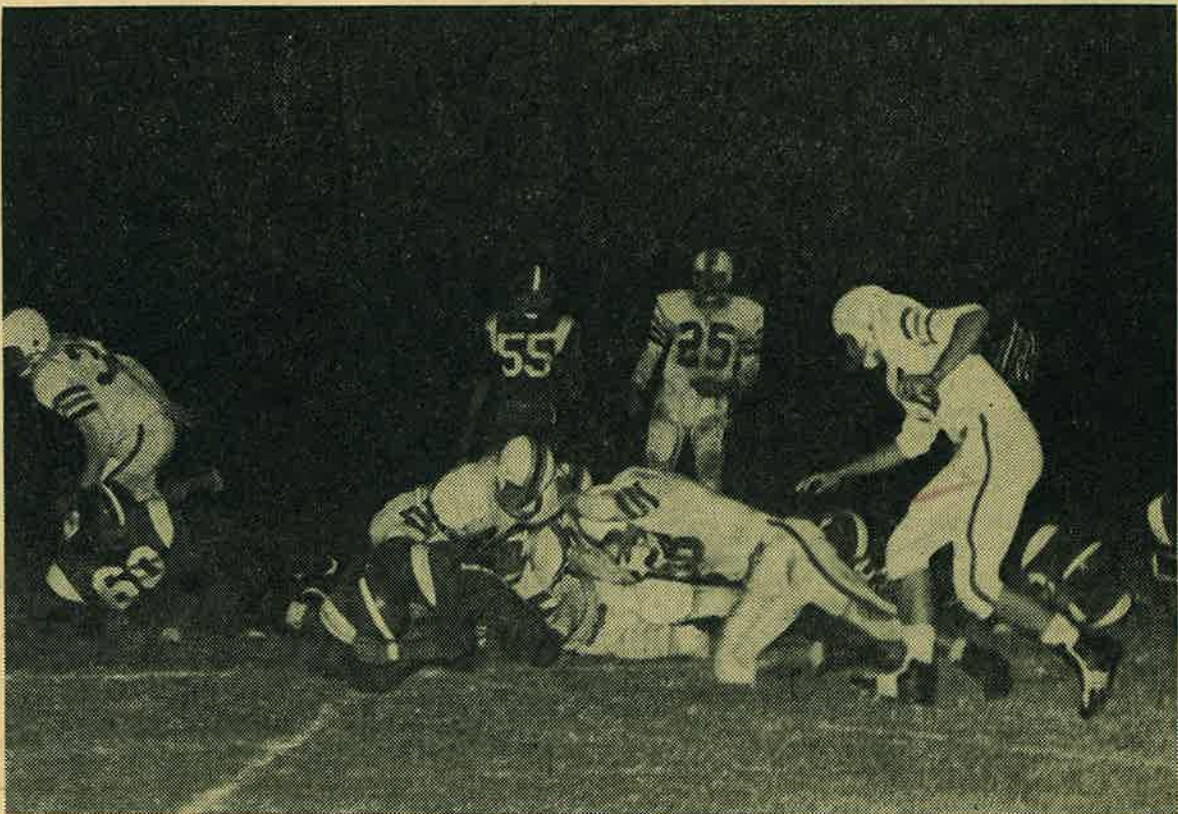
Air Game Moves

Water Polo Season Starts

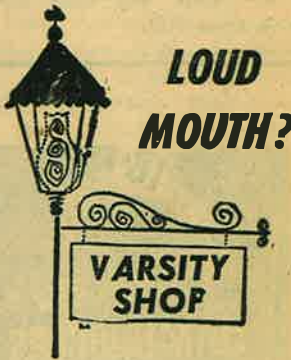
