FCC offers general scholarships to students. These scholarships make funds available to those who can qualify.

Bradshaw said, "Students can make an appointment to see their counselors and should feel free to do so at any time during the semester."

Rabb Speaks On Nuclear Explosives

Lieutenant Colonel David A. Rabb of the Lawrence Radiation Laboratory will speak in Room 200 of McLane Hall on Nov. 17 at 11 AM. The purpose of this talk is to give all interested students a better understanding of nuclear explosives for peacetime use.

Miss Doris Deakins, dean of women, said Colonel Rabb will show short films, film strips and rock samples. He is prepared to answer questions concerning nuclear explosives and test operation. There is research now being done on an inland sea in the Sahara Desert and the possibility of a harbor on the coast of Alaska made through the use of explosives. Also of interest will be the use of nuclear explosives for heat.

Colonel Rabb was born in Denver, Colo. He received a bachelor of science degree with honors from the university of Arizona and his masters degree at the same school.

Miss Deakins said after active duty in the army he did work in metallurgy until called back into active duty. He is currently an administrator and consultant for the Plow Share Division in Livermore.

The conference was attended by nearly 150 journalism students

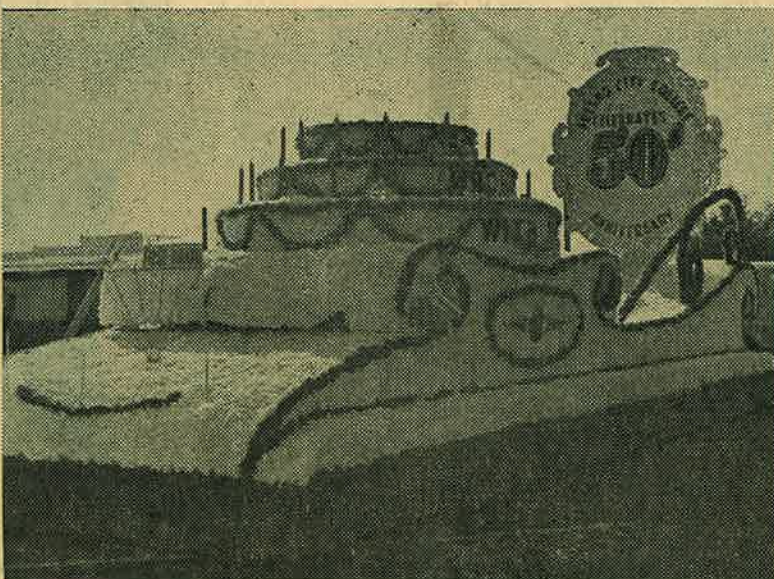
from some 30 different Northern junior colleges.

that tomorrow's junior college will be "openly, honestly and gladly a community college."

"Study expenses should be kept at a minimum," he said, "and the colleges should offer a variety of programs which meet a multitude of community needs."

Dr. Gould Criticizes

In a later speech, Dr. Samuel B. Gould, the chancellor of the University of California at Santa Barbara, criticized junior colleges for not limiting their objectives.

"Junior colleges are offering wider educational goals than they can ever hope to achieve."

"A lack of unity among students and faculty and creation of a faculty intended to do all things to all people, can result in a 'core of mediocrity' unless the complications are recognized and regularly challenged," he said.

Dr. Gleazer, on the other hand, said vocational and general education "should be closely interfused."

Encourages JC Districts

Dr. Roy E. Simpson, from the state department of public instruction, said state department of education is strongly committed to encourage all parts of the state to come into junior college districts.

"Organization of junior college districts is basically a matter for local determination," said Dr. Simpson. "Our fundamental policy on such districts is to seek and size which insures tax support."

He said that he does not mean the junior colleges that are now part of the unified districts, like Fresno City College, should be detached from the unified districts.

But aside from the unified districts, Dr. Simpson said, "independent junior college district has definite advantages."

President Stuart M. White and Vice-president John F. Hansen represented FCC at the conference, held at Yosemite Park.

Old College Site Is Up For Sale

The old Fresno High and Junior College site at Stanislaus, O, P, and Tuolumne Streets is up for sale.

The minimum price set by the board is \$375,000 for the three acre lot.

Bids were to be taken at the Fresno City College library last week, but the board backed off at the last minute and voted to ask the city to remove the parking and height restrictions on the property.

Lewis S. Eaton, the Fresno City Board of Education president, said he had been told earlier that the property restrictions would discourage bidders.

The zoning limits buildings to six stories or 75 feet high. The zone also calls for one square foot of parking space for every square foot of building space.

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Hansen Claims Gould Is Wrong On JC Views

Dr. Samuel B. Gould, chancellor of the University of California at Santa Barbara, made the statement recently that "individual junior colleges are offering wider educational goals than they can ever hope to achieve."

Further, he said that part of the reason for this is that because of the wide range of classes offered at junior colleges faculty members and students formed caste systems and tended to lack in unity.

John F. Hansen, FCC vice-president, claims Dr. Gould could not be more wrong in supposing such a thing. From his experience at FCC and other institutions, Hansen said he has found junior college instructors to be on very friendly terms, and not at all grouped into unified sections.

"The big advantage about junior colleges is the fact that their programs are so varied," Hansen said. "This gives the student a chance to find for himself a suitable field of study."

The vice-president pointed out that many students who attend technical schools might better change to other courses of study, but those courses are not offered at specialized schools. With the junior college system, students are offered counselling, and can change their direction without having to change their school.

Hansen concluded that Dr. Gould had looked at the junior college system superficially and had based his statements on superficial evidence.

"Dr. Gould's opinions were based on sincere convictions, but not on complete information."

Let us, as junior college students, prove Dr. Gould's statements wrong. Junior college instructors and administrators throughout the world are doing their utmost — but they need our help.

Radio-Communication Pupils Operate Short Wave Station

"W701P. W701P. This is WA6DBI calling W701P." This is what went on when interviewing James Wintemute, a FCC radio communication student. He was trying to make contact with W701P in Butte, Montana. The station came in good and clear.

New Transmitter Received

FCC amateur short wave station operates under the direction of Gerald Fries, advanced radio communications instructor, and answers to the call WA6DBI. The station is licensed by the Federal Communication Commission. The students in the class just completed their 60 ft., three element antenna, which houses their transmitters and receivers. This year they received a new transmitter (DX100) which operates with 125 watts. The station is equipped with a Mohawk receiver (RX-1). The class is working on a 1000 watt transmitter which will enable them to pick up foreign stations.

Fries said the purpose of the class is to give the students training in the field of radio communications the experience of operating, constructing, and maintaining equipment. There are 14 students in the class.

The first year students learn radio theory, shop practices, the Morse Code, and the Federal Communication Commission regulations.

Prepare For FCC Test

The second year students discover the theory of transmitters, audio and antenna systems, and the measurement of testing with communication equipment. They also prepare for licensing examinations, and get practice in trouble shooting and equipment construction.

Fries said there are three different kinds of licenses that stu-

dents can obtain. They are: (1) The novice license. To secure this license the student has to send and receive five words a minute in Morse Code. They also take a test in radio theory. The novice license is good for one year. (2) The technician license. The applying technician students take the same test in Morse Code as the novice students do but they take a more difficult radio theory test. This license gives the student privileges in a higher frequency band. There are two students in the class that have attained this license. They are Kenneth Cornelius, whose call number is WA6ALW, and Wintemute, whose call number is WA6KIJ. (3) The general class license. The applicant is bound to take a test in Morse Code by sending and receiving 13 words a minute. They take a radio theory test and are able to operate their own "ham" radio station. There is one student who has earned this license. He is Don Carberry.

These tests are given the second week of December by an inspector of the Federal Communication Commission.

Radio Communications have been made to over half of the fifty states including Hawaii, as well as Canada. The farthest contact made this year has been as far as Saskatoon, Canada (the central part). Fries has contacted many foreign countries on his own amateur station, WP6CS.

A trip to Sequoia is being planned for the girls who take an active part in the activities of the AWS. Girls are given the opportunity to be classified as active members until Dec. 1.

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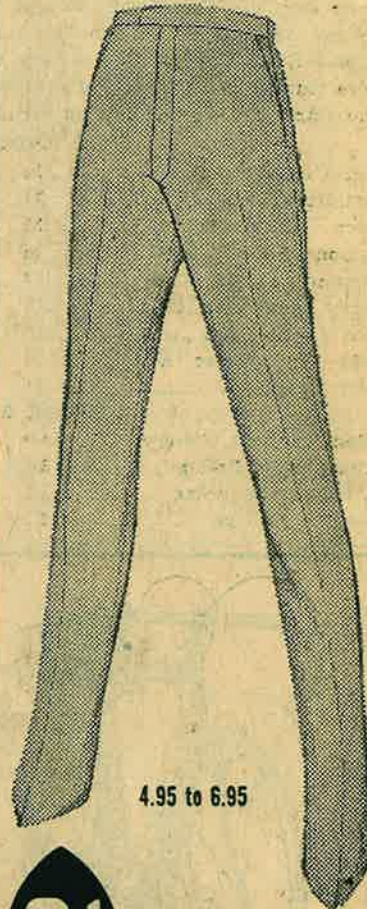
