

## Master Plan Calls For More JC's

The construction of more than 20 junior colleges in the next ten years is scheduled in the new master plan which will go to the state legislature in February.

The Master Plan Survey of Higher Education, headed by Dr. Arthur G. Coons, chairman, presented its findings to the Liaison Committee, and the Joint Board, the State Board of Education and the Regents of the University of California.

Stuart M. White, the president of FCC explained that the present trend indicates that more students are spending their first two years of college in junior colleges and later transferring to four year colleges and universities.

The latest figures show that over two thirds of all freshman and sophomores in all accredited upper division schools in California are going to junior colleges.

James P. Collins, the General Education division dean, stated on the television show, "University of the Air," that of the 2,200 regular day students at FCC, majority are transfer students.

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## MATERIAL FROM AROUND WORLD IN HEARST CASTLE

from afar by thousands of people as though they were looking through the haze of time, is now a State Historical Monument.

Encantada, the Enchanted Hill, in the Santa Lucia Mountains of the Coast Range five miles up a winding road from San Simeon on State Highway 1.

Start Building In 1919

Construction of the Hearst Castle was started by William R. Hearst in 1919. First to be erected were the palatial guest houses. The main structure, La Casa Grande, was started in 1922.

A small army of workmen hauled materials from all over the world up the hillside and painstakingly erected the castle.

Construction never ceased because its owner desired to improve his home and display his thousands of collector's items. Some of these are still in storage and uncrated from the time of their first arrival in San Simeon. Today the north and east portions of the building stand still incompleted.

The Hearst San Simeon State Historical Monument encompasses 123 acres within the 40,000 acre Piedra Blanca Rancho which was bought by U. S. Senator George Hearst in 1865 for a cattle ranch. Prize Hereford cattle are still raised on the ranch.

Hearst Builds Empire

William Randolf Hearst, born in San Francisco on April 29, 1887, became one of America's political forces through the newspaper empire he developed. Hearst died at 88 years of age.

It has been estimated that Hearst spent \$1,000,000 a year for 50 years on his collection and construction of his 100 room

The castle, a gift through the Hearst Corporation, is administered by the California Division of Beaches and Parks and open to the public from May 15 to October 15.

Tickets are sold on a first come, first serve basis beginning at 9:30 AM at the State Monument parking area. The fee is \$2 for adults and \$1 for youngsters between the ages of 6 and 12. There is no charge for children under the age of 6.

Guided Tours Limited

The guided tours are limited to twenty persons in a group.

Approximately six hundred perons can be accommodated each day.

Group tours are available from October 15 to May 15 and may be arranged by contacting the District Superintendent, Division of Beaches and Parks, Monterey, or the Monument Supervisor, San Simeon, California.


#### **Entrance Exams For** Spring Semester Are Set



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
