## Scholarship **Fund Grows** To \$1,616

The Dean James M. Malloch memorial scholarship fund at FCC, established Feb. 19, the day after the dean's death, now totals \$1,-

The FCC student council contributed \$300. Other contributions have been received from the city college faculty club, individual faculty members and from organizations and individuals in Fresno.

Archie Bradshaw, the dean of students, said the scholarship fund will be a perpetual one; the interest from the donated money which is being invested in a local financial institution will be used for scholarships for incoming fresh-

Bradshaw said the first \$50 award will be made next fall. The Dean Malloch scholarship will be awarded to students with financial need, outstanding academic achievement and participation in church, school and community activities.

He said the FCC scholarship committee will consider all applicants who qualify. The award will be made on a point system.

Donations to the fund are still being received. Bradshaw invited further contributions from friends of the dean, who served as a member of the Fresno City Board of Education for 19 years and helped establish the college in 1948 as a separate institution from the Fresno State College.

### Entrance Tests Start On May 31st

Entrance examinations for the fall semester at FCC will begin May 31 and terminate Sept. 8.


High school seniors who plan on enrolling for the fall semester should file admission applications promptly. Dean of Students Archie Bradshaw said the first 400 students to apply will be permitted to take the May 31 tests, while the second 400 will take the examinations June 4. The tests will not be given again until Aug. 22.

The testing program will include a new test which will take the place of the American Council of Education examination and the mathematics placement test previously used. This test, the School and College Ability Test, will take only one hour and 25 minutes to complete.

Complete testing dates are scheduled as follows: May 21 and June 4 at 8 AM in the FCC auditorium, Aug. 22 at 1 PM and Aug. 23 at 8:30 AM in the auditorium, Aug. 31 at 7 PM and Sept. 8 at 8 AM in Room 200 in the McLane Hall.

Vocational Nurses examinations will be given on Aug. 22 at 1 PM in

the library. Preregistration and counseling of new students is scheduled for Aug. 25, 26, 31, Sept. 1 and 2. Returning students will be preregistered Aug 29 and 30.

# **President Predicts EnrollmentIncrease**

President Stuart M. White computed the new study for the citizens' committee studying the needs of the Fresno City Schools in an impending bond election June 7.

He foresees a fall, 1960, registration of 4,334 students. The predictions are based on an estimated increase of 377 stu-

dents a year, the average increase enrollment for 1948 was only 388. in 1961; 2,885 in 1962; 3,094 in White's prediction of 3,151 for

the fall of 1957 was only 10 under the actual total of 3.730. The 1959 estimate of 3.521 was 438 less than the actual total of 3,957.

FCC's peak enrollment last fall for 4,254, but nearly 300 students withdrew before the official total was computed Oct. 31.

The fall enrollment for 1950 was 1.348: the estimate for 1960 is 4,334, a 300 per cent increase over the last ten years.

FCC expects to enroll 754 of the 6,804 students who are expected to graduate from 35 central San Joaquin Valley high schools this June. This estimate is based on the average of an 11 per cent enrollment of the students graduating over the last three years. . The addition to courses offered,

as well as the influx of people to the Fresno area, are contributing factors in the increase of enrollment, according to the office of the administrative dean.

The number of foreign students attending FCC is increasing. Ninety-three foreign students are attending classes this semester, compared to 83 for the 1959 fall semester.

White also has made new projections for full time and part time enrollments.

The forecasts for full time enrollments are 1,874 in 1960; 2,049 in 1961; 2,224 in 1962; 2,399 in 1963; 2,574 in 1964; 2,749 in 1965. The full time figures previously have been 649 in 1953; 875 in 1954; 975 in 1955; 1,113 in 1956; 1,288 in job. 1957; 1,699 in 1958; 1,699 in 1959.

percent below average. The college credit program students seem to be well liked from the results of the faculty questionnaire regarding these students. One instructor feels they stimulate others in the class and thinks it is one of the best programs to come this way in quite some time.

The main point emphasized by the college credit program students is for the college to offer more courses. Some students feel that the present program is too limited.



Mrs. Simpson attributes her increase in visitors to three possible reasons. She feels that possibly many students are just discovering the nursing serv- service and emergency care as

The increased enrollment is another factor, she stated. Also at present there are a number of gastro-intestinal disorders and sore throats bringing students to her office.

Italian spaghetti, chicken caccitore, tossed salad, and a baked dessert were prepared for the Italian dinner.

Mrs. Carpenter said that fac-· ulty members were invited guests and were served by the students.

Mrs. Carpenter said students had the opportunity to learn the problems of management and preparation of complete meals.



offered at FCC first went on a full time basis in 1959. Prior to that time the school nurse visited the school only on a rotation

·With that set-up it was impossible to give more than the most limited attention to the students.

When Mrs. Simpson first came to FCC she saw all students who had been absent for any reason of illness. This program allotted approximately six seconds for each visitor.

Mrs. Simpson said it soon became apparent that deeper problems needed more time for consultations. She worked with the administration in setting up the present health counseling pro-

To be most effective the program should not exceed 20 consultations daily.

The total number of students who were seen in the health center during the fall semester was 1,852. Of this number 160 were sent to physicians or clinics for further medical attention.

There were 13 calls pertaining to visual difficulties; ten were dental problems; hearing problems accounted for two calls.

Mrs. Simpson said that many times a teacher will notice that a good student's work is falling off. It is common practice, then, for the teacher to talk with Mrs. Simpson about the student, or for the teacher to advise the sudent to drop into the nurse's office.

"Many times," Mrs. Simpson said, "health problems needing the services of a physician have been discovered in this way."

She emphasized the importance of students forming the habit of eating good breakfasts before coming to school. Neglecting this very important meal is very often a direct cause of disorders leading to a visit to the nurse.

Students at FCC are fortunate in having an excellent student insurance plan. The administration worked for several years to get the best insurance coverage possible. Mrs. Simpson said it is a shame that so very few students have availed themselves of this protection plan



Tom Haverty of FCC defeated Stan Davis of Porterville in the men's singles, 7-5 and 6-4.


