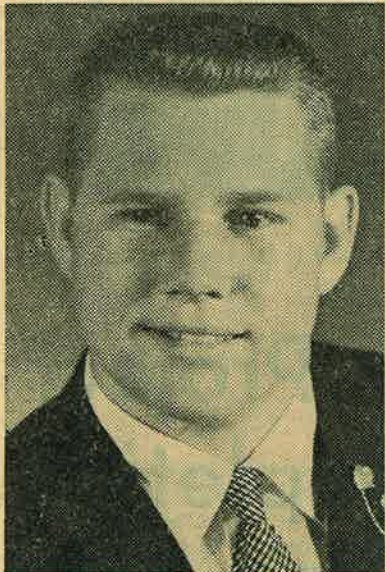


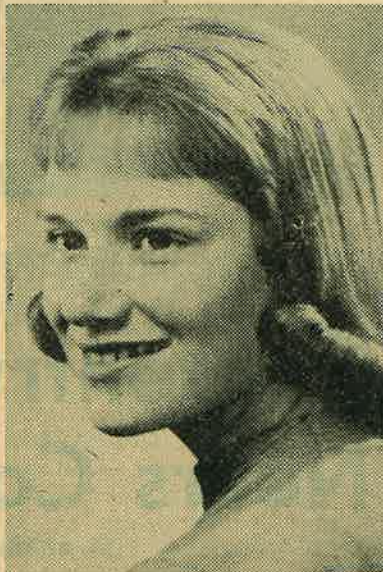

Graves said that bids should be picked up now for those who plan to attend, but those who don't obtain their bids at school may present their student body card at the door.

This dance is sponsored by the Associated Men Students and the Associated Women Students with funds for this dance coming out of the appropriated school budget.

Don Walker is the Fresno City College fall semester student body president. He defeated his only opponent, Milton Barnes, in the student body election yesterday.

The students elected Robert Roe, the current student body parliamentarian to the position of student body treasurer.

Judy Potter, the other candidate for the treasurer's post lost by only 47 votes.

Uncontested Candidates

Linda Carol Miller and Nancy Tamura were assured of being elected to student body offices as they were running unopposed for the offices of vice president and secretary respectively. Both candidates received 305 votes.

Jacqueline Riley, the new president of the Associated Women Students was also uncontested in her bid for office.

Clark Bridgman was elected president of the associated Men Students with 48 votes in a write-in campaign.

Representatives At Large

There were eleven candidates for the ten representative positions. The winners are Donna Pursell, Brenda Daum, Jon Johnson, Shirley Kauffman, Rebecca Reed, Cherie Sharp, Joe Nascimento, Barbara Blayney, Charles Overs, Jr., and Carol Russel.

Olga Ermoian, the commissioner of elections, reported 349 students visited the polls compared with the 365 students who voted in the last official student body election.

Walker, president elect, is a business administration major and was the recipient of the Bank of America award for that division.

Only 142 Students Sign For Gowns

Only 142 graduating students have signed up for caps and gowns. The number of students participating in this graduation ceremony does not exceed the number in previous years. Archie Bradshaw, the dean of students, said this is the first time in the history of the school that this has happened.

Bradshaw said 187 students are eligible to take part in the graduation exercises, and 45 of these students failed to secure orders.

Saroyan Gives Three Plays To CC Library

All sorts of great things are doing at the Fresno City College. For the first time in FCC history the school's baseball team won the league's championship, and right along with all of this the school's library will be given "several" of William Saroyan's original manuscripts.

When Saroyan heard that FCC students were considering how to raise funds to pay for a year's rent in an apartment for two or three of his scripts, he said in typical Saroyan fashion, according to the Associated Press in Paris:

"That was very nice of them, but they don't have to do that (raise the money). I'll give them the manuscripts. Fresno is my home town."

Saroyan, when he won the Pulitzer Prize for drama for the play "The Time of Your Life" in 1939, refused it because at the time he was making enough money and didn't want to "patronize on the arts." So it is only typical that Saroyan would refuse to accept financial aid from FCC students.

About getting an apartment in Paris Saroyan said:

"Heck, I don't need the money. It's just that you can't find an apartment in this town regardless of the price; so I thought I would offer something else instead."

Saroyan is staying at a hotel while looking for a place "to unload my stuff."

"You can hardly work in a hotel room," he said. "I've got to find a place where I can spread out and work."

He is still looking for an apartment "for cash or manuscripts" and said he "hoped to find one — some day."

Saroyan's original manuscripts will be on the library's shelves for the enjoyment of the students. About the scripts' publication rights Saroyan said:

"All I'm offering is the paper and the writing; the rest still belongs to me."

Well, just what he's offering will be enough.

Pastor Will Teach At New State College

The end of this semester marks the beginning of a new experience for Dr. Paul Pastor. He will be leaving FCC to teach in the new Orange County State College at Fullerton.

Pastor's summer duties will consist of teaching principles of guidance, physical education methods in elementary school, and audio-visual aids.

In the fall he will teach primarily physical education methods and principles in this exclusively upper division college.

Dr. Pastor said the college is so new they are still clearing orange trees off the 252 acre campus. He said the school plans to hire five full time instructors this first year, 50 next year, and 150 the following year. They are planning for 700-800 students in the fall with an ultimate registration of 35,000 by 1980.

Plans call for the first permanent building to be completed by 1963. It will be six stories tall with 28,000 square feet per floor to accommodate 3,000 students. This building will become the science building when the school is completed.

Dr. Pastor has been an instructor and swimming coach at Fresno City College since the fall of 1957. He has also been a co-sponsor of Alpha Gamma Sigma, campus honor organization, during this past year.

He previously has been employed in YMCA work in Canton, Ohio and Berkeley, California as well as work as a corrective therapist in McGuire Veterans' Hospital in Richmond, Virginia.

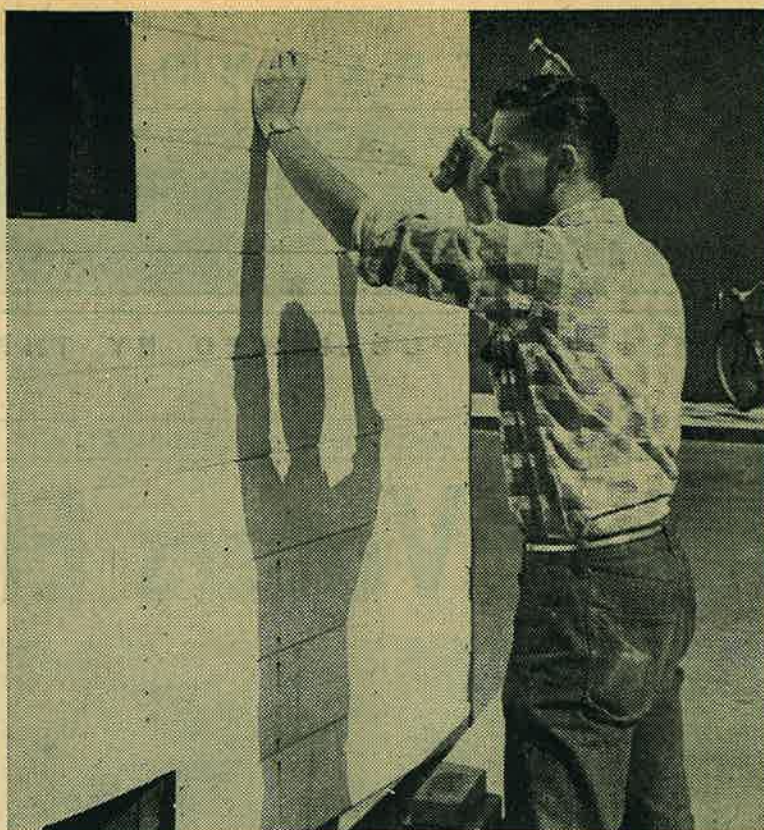
Student Wins \$50 In Spelling Test

Carpentry Project Nears Completion

The house being built by the FCC carpentry students is nearing completion.

The house project is a cooperative effort of some of the other industrial classes as well as the major project for the carpentry class.

The exterior painting is being done by the paint shop, the electrical shop is installing the wiring, and the metal shop students installed the air conditioning ducts. The architectural class did the architecture work for the building.

Merle Sons, mill cabinet and carpentry instructor, said, "We got a late start on the house this year. The carpentry students were busy building booths and partitions for the radio and television shop the first part of the spring semester. Because of our work in the other shops, we did not start on the house project until November."

Sons said the house is designed to meet the desires and demands of the buying public.

He said the house is designed so that the purchaser can easily make a few alterations if desired. For example, the wall between the kitchen and service porch can be removed to make a larger kitchen. This will not effect the structural soundness of the building, but will permit the new owner flexibility to meet his particular needs.

The house will be complete except for the interior finish and the plumbing. The buyer of the house will finish the interior and put in the plumbing.

Sons said the house is expected to be sold in October. He tentatively figures the cost of building the house to be between \$3,000 and \$3,500. A notice of sale will be advertised in the newspaper, and a minimum sale price indicated.

The house will be sold on the sealed bid system. The bids will be submitted to the board of education for disposition.

One reason for selling the house in October is to give the carpentry students an opportunity to see the technique of house moving as part of their training.

A certain time by which the house must be finished by the students has not been set.

Sons said, "We are in the business of training students, not building houses. We want to get construction methods across to

every student. If a particular student has a problem in any phase of construction he may spend more time on it to improve his technique.

The FCC carpentry students have built four complete houses and three partially completed houses since 1952, Sons said. Every house built by the students has been sold, and the buyers have indicated they are satisfied with the work.

Display Shows Modern Uses

The plastics display in the bookstore window is more than something to look at; it is an indication of the trend in modern manufacturing material use.

The display was arranged by Edward Milewski's industrial education plastics class.

Milewski, instructor in plastics, said, "If all plastic was taken out of the modern automobile; you could not move the vehicle one inch."

Many parts in today's automobiles are made of plastic; such as the timing gear, steering wheel and ignition system, to name but a few.

Most students in the evening plastics class are employed in industry. Industry uses plastic material for construction purposes, in clothing, packaging, and some advertising media.

Richard Bates, engaged in biological research, is building his own equipment. Other students are learning how to apply plastics to packaging in their business.

The plaster of Paris rings on display are the molds for the beginning of a plastic wheel. A hot plastic material is placed over the plaster mold and a vacuum is applied. The vacuum forces the plastic material over the plaster mold, and the molded plastic then has the exact shape of the plaster mold.

Milewski said this is a basic course, teaching students to use the plastic materials with the minimum amount of theory,

Thespians Give Play New Look

In the play "Antigone" as written by Jean Anouilh and produced by Clyde Sumpter's drama class, there is a feeling in the audience that they are there today with yesterday all around them.

Right from the beginning when Timothy Brooks, as the Chorus, tells in a brief speech what's going to happen to who in the two acts, one realizes that this old Sophocles play is being done in a modern style. Brooks puts an emphasis on how contemporary it is when he lights a cigarette by clicking open a Zippo lighter.

Modern Effect

But then the idea behind the play is to give an ancient tragedy a nearness which we of this age can more easily understand. The roots of the play remain unchanged. They still manage to reach down into each of the characters and to scratch at their most latent thoughts and emotions.

So there the audience sits, around the stage in the open air of the east court yard of the administration building while listening to the characters act out their parts — sometimes doing it so well that the attention they get is almost overwhelming.

Does Well

Danna Arslan did well with her part as Antigone, especially in the first act when she needed to show how much she enjoyed life. At times she spoke her lines so clearly that the echo which bounced off the walls of the building seemed to be ashamed to return and disturb anything else she might have to say.

Attempts Change

But the meaning and the reason for the play itself comes in the dialogue between Antigone and King Creon, played by Ron Eddington. In the king's attempt to change the idealistic thinking of Antigone, one finds the basic difference between the practical realism of the king and the spirited and arduous duty of the faith of Antigone.

It is difficult to single out a particular person's performance; they all did a fine job. Above all, though, one should mention the person behind the whole thing, the director. FCC students who don't own a hat should go to town and buy one, and then take it off to Clyde Sumpter for the great job that he did with the play.

Journalism Staff Sponsor Luncheon

Hanna said the students will have an opportunity to visit the journalism office to look over the facilities. Students who are interested in attending FCC, or who are undecided as to the college they plan to attend, will have a chance to look the campus over.

Hanna said about 30 students are expected to attend.

Invitations, Hanna said, were mailed to high schools in the local and outlying rural districts.

Journalism Department Changes Program; Adds New Course

The journalism program at FCC is being reorganized for the 1960-61 school year.

Philip Smith, the journalism advisor, said the change will include a new course in survey of news. Introduction to mass communications will be the new name given to the course in principles of journalism.

News writing and reporting, formerly a one year course, will be divided into two separate subjects. They may be taken independently of one another.

Smith said the six journalism courses will be re-numbered consecutively from one to six. Course numbers being changed include

project journalism from Journalism 9 to Journalism 5. The year-book class will change from Journalism 10 to Journalism 6.

Introduction to mass communications will be designated as Journalism 1; survey of news as Journalism 2; reporting as Journalism 3; and news writing as Journalism 4.

The new course in survey of news will include news analysis, fundamental techniques of news and feature writing, and comparison of different kinds of journalistic writing and styles. It will also provide an introduction to the writing and structure of news stories, and a survey of copy preparation.

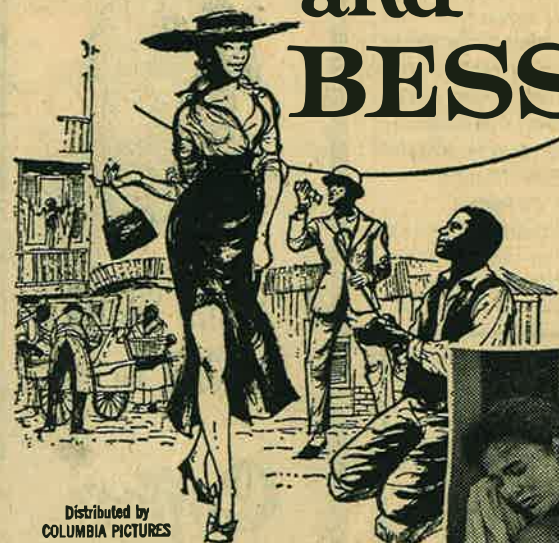

Baseball Team Captures League Crown

"Dark Horses" Beat COS Giants Twice

After a half-century of trying the Fresno City College baseball team is the sole owner of the coveted Central California Junior College Athletic Association championship. In the past 11 years the Rams have tied for the title twice, only to lose in playoff games.

Coach Len Bourdet's team, one of the dark horse entries this year, downed a highly favored College of the Sequoias Giants, 2-1, and 9-2, to capture the league championship Friday, at Euless Park.

With tension quite apparent at 2 PM Friday, Ram Bucky Hoover squared off against COS's Wayne Mayfield, in one of the best pitching duels in CCJCAA history.

At the end of the game, Hoover had allowed one run, given up only four hits, walked one, and struck out eight. Mayfield yielded two runs, six hits, walked four but struck out seven. He also threw two wild pitches.

The first inning of the game set the stage for the rest of the contest. COS sent up three men and Hoover set them down, one, two, three. Fresno's turn came and they were also set down, one, two, three.

Rams Tally Score

In the last half of the second inning a mental error by Mayfield allowed the Rams to score. Jim Sanders had drawn a walk to start the inning. Second baseman Pete Lango hit a single with one out, advancing Sanders to second. Dan Rameriz hit a ball to the Giants' shortstop and Lango was forced at second, Sanders going to third. Sanders came in when catcher Ken Frankfort hit a slow bouncer to Mayfield. Mayfield held the ball for a moment and Sanders came in with the Rams' first run and Frankfort was safe at first. Tom Burkman popped up to first base to end the inning.

The game remained at a standstill for the next three innings, but in the first half of the sixth inning the Giants tied the score with an unearned run.

Pitcher Mayfield got a scratch single to left field to open the frame. He advanced to second on a sacrifice and came home when first baseman Tom Burkman let a ball get away from him.

FCC Scores Again

The Rams weren't to be counted out as they scored their winning run in their half of the sixth inning. With two away, Sanders hit a triple to right center field. Hoover drew a walk and team captain Pete Lango hit a clean single, scoring Sanders with the winning run.

COS threatened again in the ninth inning but Hoover bore down on the opposition and retired the side. The Giants loaded the bases with one out but Hoover struck out Albie Branco and got Larry Branco to ground out to Pete Lango.

Second Game Slugfest

After a twenty minute intermission the two teams squared off at each other again. This game

saw the Rams' Doug Atwood facing COS's Maurice Yates.

Atwood, more through perseverance than anything, kept the five Giant hits and four walks he issued far enough apart that the Rams could catch up after falling behind, 2-0, in the third inning.

The Giants jumped on Atwood in the first inning for one run on three singles. In the third inning they got their final tally when Atwood walked Doug Wiley, forcing in a run after the bases were loaded.

From then on it was the Rams' game as they shelled six COS pitchers for nine runs on 12 hits.

Yates Falters

Yates, who kept the Rams under control for four innings with a good breaking curve ball, finally tired in the fifth and left the game, after yielding five runs and six hits.

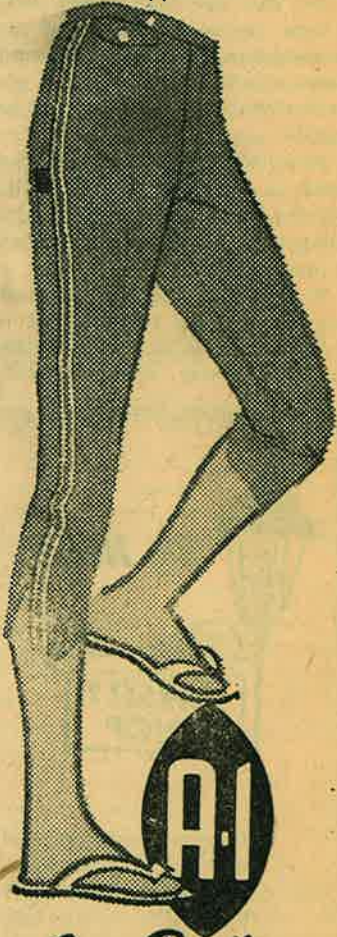
