

Old Boarding House Faces Destruction

The old Bulldog Kennel - a two story stucco walled building at 2308 College Avenue soon be crumbled to oblivion.

This building was a thriving privately operated boarding house for old Fresno State College stur dents in the decades before World War II. Originally the building was called Vassar Hall but as the men students took over they changed it to Cardinal Hall.

Finally this building became a salute to Fresno State College in the 1930's, perhaps because of the emerging power of the FSC football team of that year.

Later, after World War II, this building was used as an office by the Veterans' Administration to process students attending school under the GI bill. After the Veterans' Administration moved out of this building, the student council considered operating the building again as a men's dormitory, but decided it would take too much money to make repairs so the building could be used for a dormitory.

The built a college office annex until the early 1950's. There still are souvenirs of the last uses of this building such as remnants of old leaflets which were left from the campus religious council.

The tearing down of this building, the Bulldog Kennel, may come as a ostalgic wrench to Fresno State College alumni.

This building was inherited by the Fresno City Unified School District when it bought the campus three years ago for the city college. After buying the campus the school district tried to interest buyers in buying the building, but were unsuccessful. Now the district has agreed to pay an excavation corporation to destroy the building.

There are no definite plans for constructing any new buildings on this site, but the school district will retain the land in case any new college building proposals arise.



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
