Maurice Morris and Company sign NCAA Letters of Intent

Fresno City College Rams National record holder, two-time JC Grid-Wire First Team, All-American running back Maurice Morris will play at the University of Oregon. He made the commitment to Oregon by signing his letter-of- intent February 4.

Morris shattered every record possible at the National Community College level as a running back for the Rams. He broke the records against College of the Sequoias during the last game of the 1999 season. Morris exceeded the rushing record with 3,708 yards, most carries with 593, and all-purpose yards at 4,487.

Morris had numerous offers from colleges during

More than a mindless Leo vehicle

The marketing campaign for *The Beach* seems to consist mainly of shots of Leonardo DiCaprio, usually with his shirt off. I half-expected to see huge billboard signs proclaiming "Leo is *The Beach*". From the commercials it looks like a cross between *The Blue Lagoon, Swiss Family Robinson*, and *Lord of the Flies*. However, buried deep beneath the advertising veneer are a couple of enticing facts. First, the film is based on a highly acclaimed novel by Alex Garland. Secondly, it was written by John Hodge and directed by Danny Boyle, the team that made *Shallow Grave* and *Trainspotting*.

The latter is the most important, since, from the get-go, *The Beach* isn't what you'd expect it to be. With a pulse-pounding techno soundtrack beating behind the scenes, the film moves with energy and originality. Harshly realistic in its depictions of violence and its aftermath, with a bitingly gruesome sense of humor to match, *The Beach* may turn off a few viewers.

FCC Fire Academy and Madera Fire Department in training partnership?

Madera County Supervisors have approved a plan that would use Fresno City College firefighting students to supplement fulltime firefighter personnel in Madera.

The "Resident Apprentice Program", proposed by Madera Fire Chief Candáce Gregory in a memo to County supervisors on January 10, was approved by a four to zero vote on January 18.

believes the program will offer training to firefighting students.

"Ours is more based on a classroom environment," Byrns said.

Currently, Madera County has about 250 volunteer Paid Call Firefighters. Consideration for the open positions will be given to current volunteers first, said Chief Gregory.

Although the memo to County supervisors stated the program is not considered employment, volunteer students will be Paid Call Firefighters. As Paid Call Firefighters, student volunteers will receive monetary compensation for every fire response and certain Emergency Medical Services. Volunteers will also be protected from liability through workers' compensation insurance.

"They are County employees for all practical purposes as far as liability and workers' comp[ensation] is concerned," said Gregory.

The program responds to a decline in the number of volunteer firefighters, and the new Occupational Safety and Health Administration standards which affect interior fire attack tactics.

Citing volunteer firefighters as "the foundation of the department," Gregory said volunteer students will be placed at Permanent Paid Stations in addition to regular volunteer personnel.

"Madera County has a long history of a very strong volunteer fire company. We're not at full-strength for volunteer firefighters," said Gregory.

Sometimes referred to as a 'sleeper' program, County Supervisors asked Gregory to develop an inexpensive way to increase firefighting personnel last year after concerns about adequate staffing surfaced.

"This is the first time we've ever done this. I'm not sure what kind of response we'll get from students," Gregory said.

The implementation of the 'sleeper' proram is at a minimal cost for Madera County and none at all for FCC.

"Actually we took this in mind when we made out this year's budget," said Gregory.

Participating in all daily firefighter activities, including Emergency Medical Service and firefighting responses, apprentices can receive Firefighter II certification, Driver Operator certification and consideration for Haz-Mat training while working one-on-one with an assigned mentor.

To qualify for apprenticeship, volunteers must have completed an accredited Fire Science Academy with 240 hours of training and have or be working toward an AA degree in

The 18-24 month program requires participants to work three 24-hour shifts a week. If students have class during their shifts, they will be excused from working then.

Could this really be the end of the Scream series? Just over three years ago the horror trilogy got off to a slashingly good start. Scream was a word of mouth hit which redefined the horror genre and spawned a series of copycat movies (Urban Legend, Halloween: H20, I Know What You Did Last

Summer). Scream 2 was also a success, but due to its heightened satire nature, the film was relatively seen as less a horror movie than a comedy.

The fact that Scream 2 was less scary and more funny than its predecessor is because the makers of the film must envisioned the market would be flooded with Scream rip-offs. By making a film which poked fun at movie sequels, while following the rules of a sequel (the unspoken one being not to mess with the perfect formula), Scream 2 turned out to be a razor-sharp satire and murder-mystery. The film turns out to be the perfect lead-in to the third and, supposedly, final entry in the Scream series. In fact, it turns out that even the horrible rip-offs were build-up to Scream 3. Granted, nothing may ever top the opening sequence to Scream, but Scream 3 is overall scarier than both its predecessors.

Once again, the story revolves around the mayhemattracting Sidney Prescott (Neve Campbell, who apparently will have to either renegotiate her contract with Party of Five or find other work since this is the end of her Scream character). Poor Sidney not only has to deal with the memories of all the death and destruction that has crossed her path (justabout every character that crosses her path might as well be signing up to be a contestant on Who Wants To Be A Murder Victim?), but she is also haunted by visions of her dead mother, reminding her that children often turn out just like their parents (which, in Sid's case, means she'll grow up to be a slut...oh, I'm sorry, I mean a dead slut!). Just how does Sidney deal with all these problems? Strangely enough, she cuts herself off

from the outside world, living in a house all by herself out in the middle of nowhere! Security systems aside, if this isn't an open invitation to trouble then I don't know what is.

Sidney's disappearance seems to have worked all too well since someone (or someone's) has decided to go on a murderous rampage until she comes out of hiding. The killer(s) secondary targets are the cast members of Stab 3: Return Woodsburrow, the third entry in the fictional movie series based on the "actual events" of Screams one and 2.

The idea of a killer on the set of a movie provides ample room for creativity. Director Wes Craven seizes the opportunity to setup chase sequences mirroring the ones from the original Scream, showing us that some characters actually don't learn from experience. Another gold mine taken advantage of is Hollywoodland setting. The film highlights the hypocrisy of the town and its oblivious actor-inhabitants. For example, there's the blonde bimbo who knows she's seen only as a sex object, yet sleeps around and proves that self-awareness in no way implies intelligence (a great moment is when she miss-identifies the Alfred Hitchcock classic Psycho).


However, this is the big-

gest scare machine in film history, so there are plenty of scary moments. These scary moments can be credited to script writer Ehren Kruger, who also wrote Arlington Road and the upcoming Reindeer Games. Kruger took over for the floundering Kevin Williamson, the creator of the Scream franchise whose time is over-occupied by television and other films. Kruger considerably ups the ante by raising more than making up for the scares that

were missing from Scream 2. All of the elements of the Scream machine are also evident in Scream 3: the ingenious opening murder(s), the shifting of suspicions concerning the identity of the killer(s), the furious escalation of deaths leading up to the surprising revelation of the killer and motive, and plenty of scares/laughs along the way. Therein lies the key to the success of the Scream films: the seamless way moments of terror are followed by moments of humor. Within the same breath, one will find themselves screeching in fright and choking with laughter while watching Scream 3. That is the selfaware film series' greatest strength. Although Scream 3 does bring the trilogy to a satisfying close, let us hope that, with the way the film literally leaves the door wide open for another sequel, this may not be the last time we'll scream with fright/laughter.

Leo plays Richard, a selfdescribed non-descript twenty-something, searching for excitement or, at least, something else. While traveling abroad in Bangkok he finds something of interest: an alluring beauty named Francoise (Virginie Ledoyen). Oh, and he also comes across some map to a hidden paradise or something like that.

When the aptly named character named Daffy (Robert Carlyle) hands this map over to him, Richard couldn't care less. The Fresno City College Men's Basketball team is back on track since suffering to two heart-breaking losses that caused them to slip to number ten in the state junior college basketball polls.

On Wednesday, February 2nd, the Rams overcame a sluggish second half to hold off Modesto College by a score of 90-84.

The Rams were again led by all-CVC power forward Terri Miller, who scored 25 points. After the Rams a 54-36 lead at halftime, and

81-64 in the middle of the second half, Modesto went on an 18-4 run that saw Fresno's lead dwindle to one at 83-82. "I knew we were gonna win", stated Miller. "We just had to sweat it out a little, I guess." "Coach told us in the huddle (during a timeout) to stop playing lackadaisical.", he said, referring to Modesto's big

"I told them to settle down and run their offense", stated Rams coach Denny Aye. "We took quick shots, but we pulled together in the end".

The Rams avenged a January 8th loss to Modesto, by a score of 79-77, with this victory.

On Saturday, February 5th, the Rams had a balanced attack and went on to annihilate Merced College by the score of 106-65.

Scott Clark and Terron Lewis each scored 20 points to lead the Rams. Clark also hit a school record six 3-pointers. Terri Miller contributed 17 points and 13 rebounds for Fresno, as the Rams also out-rebounded Merced 46-33, including 30-11 in the first half...

"We started out slow, but finally settled down later.", stated Clark. "We've got a good team, so if someone starts out slow,

Of his hot shooting night, Clark stated, "When the team saw that I was hitting my shots, they kept passing the ball to me"

When asked what adjustments the Rams had to make for Merced, Clark




