National Guard called in by student body president Shaaman

Silly College experiences 'Jaws III'

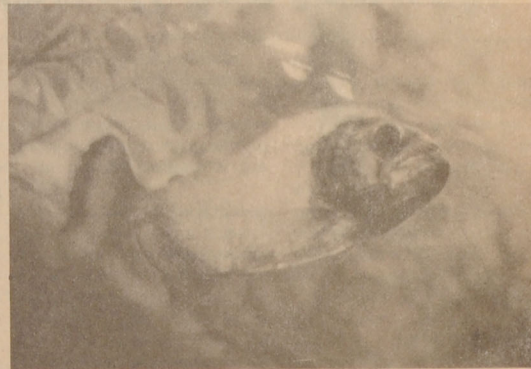

Humane killings?

The proper seal kill takes skill

The harp seal is a magnificent animal. At birth it weighs 15 pounds and is expected to rapidly gain over 100 pounds within several weeks after birth.

The baby seals are born with thick white fur, which is used for insulating purposes. The fur is capable of absorbing heat from the sun and transmitting it through the pup's skin. Eighteen days after birth, the pups begin shedding their white furs and gaining several layers of fat.

The life of a sealer is not a glamorous one. It is a dangerously lived out profession.

Most of the sealer's life has been decided upon early in life. And that is a life of a fisherman. Their fathers and their grandfathers hunted harp seals for two centuries.

Recently hunting harp seals has provoked differences among the sealers and the greenpeace organization, who wish to save the harp seal from extinction.

According to an article in the Smithsonian institute magazine, William McCloskey claims that the information submitted by the greenpeace organization has been grossly exaggerated and is generally misleading to the public.

A famous film script created by the greenpeace organization portrays a sealer repetitiously clubbing the baby pup over its head.

In reality, it only takes one or two hits over the head to knock the seal unconscious.

McCloskey writes: "While this is no indication of consciousness, it can appear on a movie film to be in writhing pain."

The baby harp seals are killed each year for needless reasons, such as making cute little stuffed seals and toy bears. There has been no indication in most articles of seals being used for food.

Perhaps this has been the biggest argument of the greenpeace organization, and apparently the public agrees. The sales of the seal's fur has drastically

gone down, and the sealers have had to deal with the dilemma of skin hides stacking up in warehouses, but still the sealers continue to hunt.

However, the greenpeace organization makes no attempt to understand that the sealers have been hunting over two centuries, and one can't expect an entire culture based upon the economy of harp seals to make a rapid turnaround in a couple of years.

The greenpeace organization, continues to resort to yellow journalism especially when there is blood. There have been photographs of blood spilled over a great body of ice, which looks quite gross for the viewer. Nonetheless, seeing the blood of an animal isn't all that uncommon. The sealers clobber the harp seal three times, and it is knocked unconscious. To make sure that the seal is fully dead, before skinning the seals, the hunters cut into the main artery of the heart, and within seconds the seal dies.

The same thing happens in cattle houses in the United States. The steer is knocked unconscious, a knife is shoved down its throat and into the main artery, which instantly kills the calf. The calf then is hung upside down while the blood drains out.

Obviously, the greenpeace organization is being irresponsible in leading the public to believe that the harp seal was skinned alive right there on the ice.

The blood that is spilled over the ice is caused by the cutting of the main artery. It has not been skinned alive, as the greenpeace organization wants you to believe.

The greenpeace organization often show movies of a sealer approaching the mother and the baby seal. The mother makes no attempt in defending her baby, instead she quickly ducks under the ice and swims away, while the sealer kills her baby. The mother returns when the sealers have gone. She usually sniffs around in the

location of where her baby was.

The greenpeace films this aspect, and informs the viewer that she is mourning for her baby.

However, McCloskey writes in Smithsonian magazine that, "The protest groups interpret the sniffing as grief, while some biologists suggest that the female is merely identifying her young before moving on."

New Canadian laws have established the limit in killing the harp seals to 150,000 per year. Since the 1950's the seal population has diminished slightly.

However, the extinction of the harp seals can be avoided. The greenpeace organization has done a good job in making the public gain awareness about the seal hunt, but it doesn't have to resort to sensational journalism.

In articles written in the Smithsonian and National Geographic, each mention the increasing number of industrial fishing companies entering into the business.

Although the greenpeace organization has been very influential, with the Canadian government tightening their laws on how many seals can be killed, it has done nothing to stop the competition between the Canadian sealers and conglomerate fishing industries.

Apparently anyone with a fishing license can fish. There are no laws creating guide lines on who can hunt and who can not.

The Canadian government should be establishing laws prohibiting those who can not show proof that their families have been hunting for two centuries, because that is their form of livelihood.

Also, an age limit should be set on who can fish. It is useless to encourage youths in Newfoundland to hunt for seals when it is becoming a dying occupation.

The greenpeace organization should be working with the government in finding alternatives for the hunters and their families.

ASB wants NO on Prop 9

Fresno City College's ASB—NO ON NINE Committee will be sponsoring a booth in the fountain area to collect signatures for the Tax Simplicity Act. The proposal, which will be placed on the November General Election Ballot if it gets the sufficient number of signatures, is being proposed as "the alternative to Proposition 9."

The booth will have information on both the Tax Simplicity Act and Prop. 9, the so-called Jarvis II initiative on the June Ballot.

ASB President Tim Sheehan formed the ASB—NON ON NINE Committee in order "to work with both Fresno State and the Citizens For California in educating the students here at City about what will happen if Jarvis II passes. I do not want to see any increase in fees, or the enacting of a tuition fee structure in the community colleges under any circumstances."

The ASB—NO ON NINE Committee is also planning an Anti-9 rally and voter registration drive for the end of April.



ASB election due 28-29

Nine Senate seats, as well as the office of President, Vice President, and Treasurer, will be up for grabs in the upcoming Associated Student Body elections. ASB President Tim Sheehan has called the elections for Monday and Tuesday, April 28 and 29.

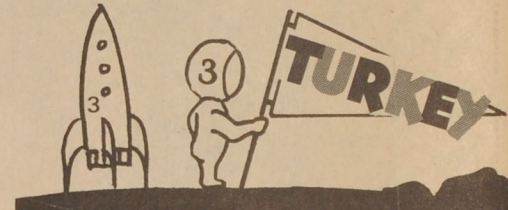
Petitions for office will be available in the Student Services building beginning on Monday, April 14. Sheehan pointed out that some "candidates" have already said that they will run, but that they must also go through the petition process, in which each candidate must collect at least 40 signatures of ASB Cardholders (not counting honorary cards), as well as meet the requirements in the ASB Constitution, to even get on the ballot.

The ASB Constitution states that to be a candidate for Senator, a person must have and maintain a 2.0 grade point average for his total college

career, and maintain 8 units during the term of office. Failure to meet those requirements would result in automatic removal from office.

The standards are somewhat more rigid for the three executive officers, though. The 8 units during the semester is the same, but a candidate must have a 2.5 g.p.a. before the election, maintain that g.p.a. during the term of office, and also must have completed at least one year (two consecutive semesters full time) to run for office.

Sheehan expressed hope that everyone that turns in a petition to the ASB Advisors office, 200-d, will meet these qualifications and have a chance on the ballot. He warned that all signatures will be checked for verification, and that the deadline for completed petitions is Wednesday, April 23. Any otherwise qualified candidate who turns in a completed petition after the 5 p.m., April 23 deadline may run as a write-in candidate.

Sunday I went to the mountains with an American family, which I have got to know well during my stay here in California. We had a picnic with all kinds of delicious food. Afterwards, the adults started to hide the Easter eggs and a few minutes later, all the kids started an exciting hunt for the eggs.

The whole day passed with eating, playing games and, most of all, catching up with what had happened in the family since last Easter, which, for many of the people, was the last time they had seen their relatives.

I went home with a very nice experience and a too full stomach.

The Easter Bunny, which jumps around and hides eggs, is an unknown character in Denmark. What symbolizes Easter in my country are white lambs and chickens.


Like here, Easter is mostly a time for the small kids. In school they paint and cut lambs and chickens to bring home for the Easter table, which probably is the main part in the Easter celebration. The table is set with the colors that symbolize Easter: Green and Yellow. Usually a yellow tablecloth, green napkins, green candles and the Danish Easter lily, which, here is known as the daffodil.

Always included in a Danish Easter decorated home are big bouquets of beech branches, which bloom in bright green colors exactly at this time.

The main dish in the Easter lunch is boiled eggs cut in half in a thick mustard sauce. The famous Herring is another important component in the meal. Danish snaps and a special beer, only brewed for Easter, go with the meal.

But Easter is not only eating and drinking. It is a special time of year when everybody, as at Christmas, gets into a certain mood. The Easter holidays start the Thursday before Good Friday and end the Wednesday after Palm Sunday. The Thursday we call Maundy Thursday, and Monday and Tuesday are called first and second Easter-day. Everybody is off these days, no stores are open and the streets are almost deserted. The whole atmosphere is quiet and relaxed. It is Easter.

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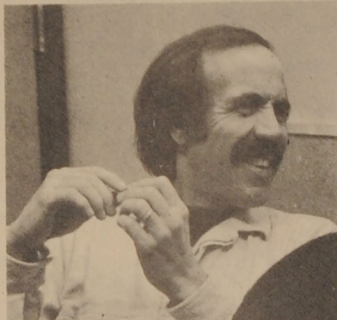

Moviegoers are finally ready for Campbell double bill

His films came out before their time

Johnny got his gun. Then he got his face blown off by a German Artillery shell. His arms and legs were gone and the doctors were certain his brain had been destroyed — leaving him incapable of thought or feeling.

They stashed him away in a dark supply closet, sure that he was unfeeling, unknowing and a dead man. But they were wrong. Everything else had died but Joe Bonham's mind was in there, screaming soundlessly for help.

The story, "Johnny Got His Gun," which plays in Fresno at

the Country Squire theater this week, is 39 years old and has a curious history.

Dalton Trumbo wrote "Johnny Got His Gun" in 1939. It won the National Book Award and is still a brisk seller today. In fact, it's required reading in many high schools and colleges.

Bruce Campbell got the idea to bring Trumbo's story of man's inhumanity to man to the screen. In 1971 he made "Johnny," with Timothy Bottoms, Donald Sutherland and Jason Roberts.

The film impressed the critics, won three major awards in one year at the Cannes Film Festival, and was praised by many famous people, including Jimmy Carter (then Governor Carter).

Nevertheless the film did not succeed commercially.

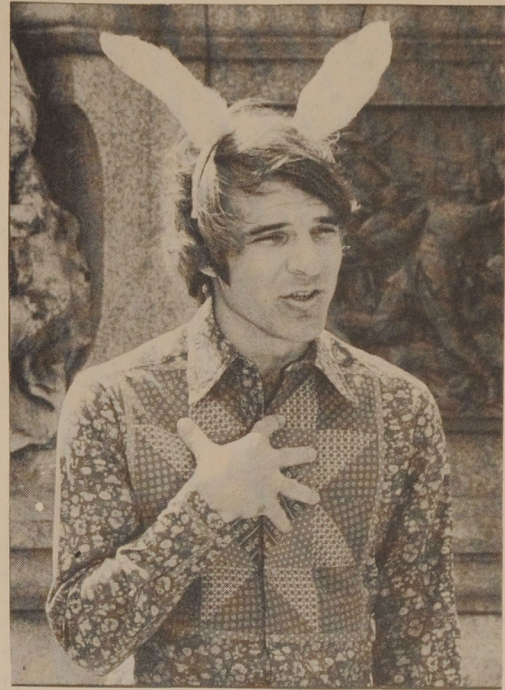
Carter said of the film, "Johnny Got His Gun" should be shown to everyone in the government, the military and the United Nations as required viewing . . . every American should see it . . ."

In a recent *Rampage* interview, Producer Bruce Campbell said, I feel strongly about what Mr. Carter said and I want him to say it again this week . . . It would be nice if he took some action, making it mandatory viewing for all Americans."

Campbell was able to buy the rights to the film for \$2,500 when Allied Artists went bankrupt. Now he's got it in the back of a 51-foot-long truck, carrying it across the country, showing it wherever he can.

Campbell has a theory why the film didn't do well on its initial release.

"Johnny was released at the height of the Vietnam war," he said. "People had the war in their livingrooms every night. It's a powerful film. Audiences get hysterical. People just weren't in

the mood for this kind of picture back then. Today I think the audiences are ready for the film and the films like 'Coming Home' and 'The Deer Hunter' prove it."

"Johnny Got His Gun" is an anti-war film set during and after the First World War. Campbell calls it the last of the romantic wars where men went off singing only to be killed. It deals

with the story of Joe Bonhom, (Timothy Bottoms) a young volunteer soldier who becomes a vegetable mass when he catches a bomb practically in his lap. He is kept alive for 30 years before a nurse discovers that his mind has been functioning all the time.

Also Playing with "Johnny Got His Gun" is another film directed by Campbell called "The Funnier Side Of Steve Martin," starring

Steve Martin. The film is a sharp contrast to

"Johnny". It was a made for TV half hour short, originally called "The Funnier Side of Eastern Canada." It was supposed to be a series of entertaining travelogues.

Here again, Campbell appears to have been ahead of his time. Steve Martin was not yet a household name. Ex-cu-u-se me was unknown. The piece didn't have a laugh track either. Campbell said people didn't know when — or if — to laugh. When people saw the piece they all said it was good but "That guy was terrible."

"I took the movie around to everyone in the business and they just stared at it with blank faces," Campbell recalled, "Nobody laughed."

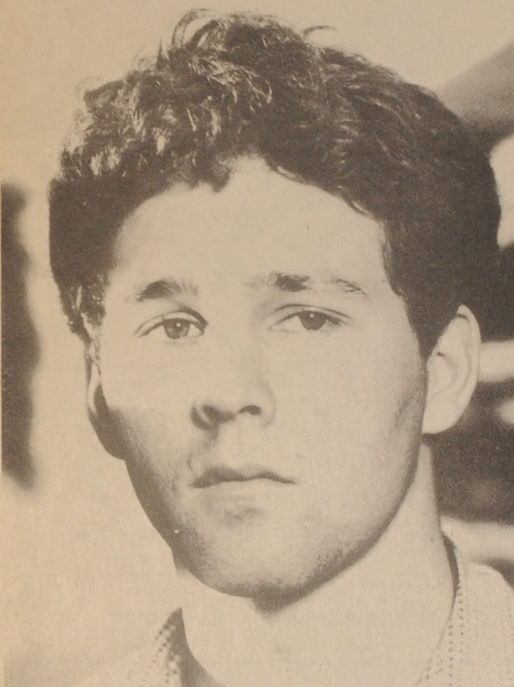
Campbell then took the film and locked it away in a vault for five years. When Martin hit it big a few years later, he dusted it off and began playing it again. This time people roared, recognizing the humor in the film.

Campbell has been doing his road show for four years. To put his trailer on the road, he had to mortgage his house. He plans to eventually turn the trailer into a World War I museum.

Currently Campbell is on a 10 city tour. He said that it was the first major test of his project and if it did well in California, he'd take it straight to Washington DC.

During his Fresno stop, Campbell will have the films shipped back and forth from the theater in an armored car. After each show he will have a question and answer period for the audience.

Campbell promotes his show as "Two and a half hours of laughter and tears, or your money back without a murmur."

Movie Review

"Black Stallion": A film for kids and adults

There are a lot of good things about *The Black Stallion*, but there are also many things about the film that are, if not really bad, somewhere close to mediocrity.

The story is divided into two parts: the first a mystic and mythical account of a boy named

Alec and the Black Stallion, the only survivors of a shipwreck, who end up on a deserted island and form a friendship of sorts. Then they are rescued and return to civilization, where the story turns into a more routine telling of the boy and stallion training for and entering a match race with two top-ranked horses.

The first part is more original, maybe because it's not seen as often. A horse rescuing a boy from a burning, sinking ship in a stormy ocean is more interesting than a horse running around a track. After they reach the island, there are no words spoken for about a half an hour of screen time, and none are really

needed. Carroll Ballard's photography and the music by Carmine Coppola are all that is necessary to hold interest.

Ballard has chosen a good subject. There's something inherently majestic in the stallion and he captures it well. Just watching the horse run on the beach, after seeing him locked up in a small room on the ship moments before, is exhilarating. And the scenes in which Alec tames the horse, while it happens a little too quickly, are especially memorable.

Once they are rescued, events become much more predictable: the film goes from the sublime to the mundane. The horse escapes from Alec's backyard and is coincidentally found by a retired jockey, who becomes a friend of Alec's. The boy decides to become a jockey, too, and he

and the stallion eventually enter "The Big Race."

The photography and score remain at a high level throughout, but Ballard is more effective showing Alec and horse than Alec and other people. Teri Garr has little to do as Alec's mother; Mickey Rooney, as the ex-jockey, has the best part and makes the most of it. Kelly Reno, in his first role as Alec, seems more comfortable with the horse than without it.

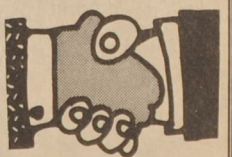
The second part of the movie would have been more interesting had the characters been better developed. The ending would seem more important if the audience could care about the people a little more. As it is, we know very little about them.

They are few good family pictures around these days; there just aren't that many of them made. Even with its flaws, the G-

rated *Black Stallion* is about as close as anyone comes to making a film that kids and adults both can enjoy, although there's room for improvement in the future.

Still, in defense of Ballard, with all that rich photography and beautiful scenery to look at, maybe a complicated plot and complex characters would have just gotten in the way.

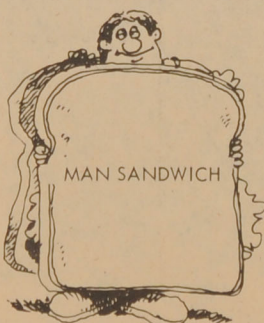
A couple of years ago, a commission on New York City finance gave the word decriminalization, seven syllables and 18 letters. And

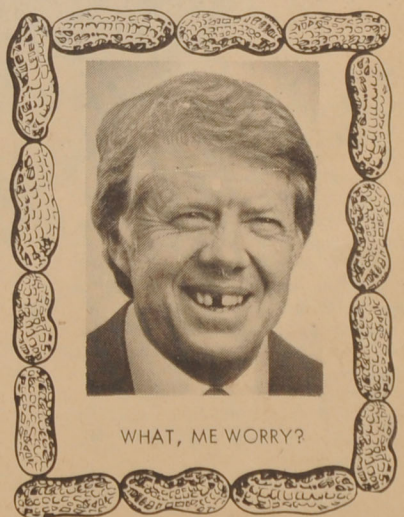

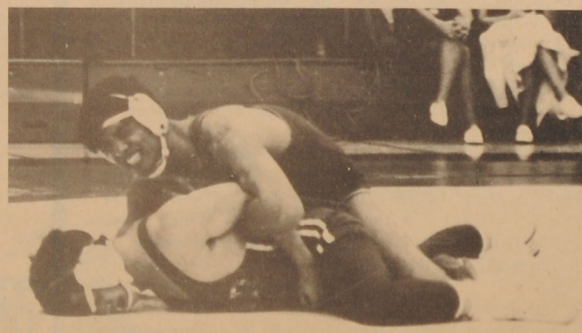
