Salazar Controversy Heats Up

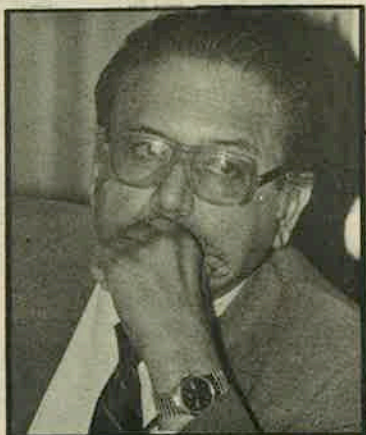

The Rampage reported in its March 6 issue that FCC Financial Aid Director Joseph Salazar was given a one year health leave as a result of his recent EEOC complaint. The Rampage story was based on information obtained from a normally reliable official source in the FCC administration.

According to FCC acting President Dr. Arthur Ellish, Salazar was not placed on health leave but reassigned as FCC special services coordinator.

Salazar declined to comment about the reported transfer.

Salazar had filed a complaint with the Equal Employment Opportunities Commission charging FCC

administrators with racial discrimination after word came that he would be released because of allegedly poor job performance.

A petition containing about 200 student signatures showing support for Salazar was presented at the March 3 SCCC Board meeting by FCC student Valerie Torres and

FCC counselor Frank Quintana. Quintana, speaking for the support drive, urged that Salazar be retained as FCC financial aid director, and that he be given the "resources to do the job."

Addressing the recent decision made on the Salazar issue, Torres, who began the petition, said "we are thinking of picketing." Torres elaborated that she wants to have picket lines established around the board members individual offices. "Mr. Salazar has been used as a scapegoat for the problems in the financial aid office," she said.

Salazar has had support in the conflict from both the FCC chapter of MECHA and the Mexican American Political Organization, according to Quintana.

New President Finally Named

The State Center Community College District Board of Trustees named Dr. Ernie Leach the new president of Fresno City College at a news conference Thursday.

Leach is currently the vice president of academic affairs at Triton College in River Grove, Illinois.

Leach was selected from a group of five finalists chosen by a special presidential selection committee consisting of 16 individuals from the FCC faculty, administration,

student body and the community.

FCC is offering the new president a minimum salary of \$65,000 according to a brochure provided to all presidential applicants.

Leach will fill the position vacated by former president Clyde C. McCully who retired in October 1986. Dr. Arthur Ellish has filled the position as Interim president since November 1986.

The SCCC Board of Trustees and Chancellor Bill Stewart made the final decision to hire Leach.

Prostitution Brings Crime To FCC

Blackstone prostitutes are having an effect on crime at Fresno City College, according to Kenneth Shrum, Campus Police Chief.

"We have had cases where prostitutes have brought their

tricks on the campus," Shrum said.

Shrum also added that at least three cases were directly related to prostitution. "Two were involving reported sexual assaults and one of them was a reported theft of money," remarked Shrum.

"When it involves a

prostitute and it involves money, it's a no pay situation. Some guy tries to skip out without paying," continued Shrum, "then there's either a charge of theft of money, or there's a charge of sexual assault, or rape filed."

Complaints have also been voiced by female students who are approached by men on Blackstone when leaving FCC.

"Normally it doesn't have that much effect on us other than them walking up and down the streets on Blackstone and a lot of drivers assuming that they are picking up college girls," commented Shrum.

The new law, which became effective at the first of the year, allows undercover police officers to solicit prostitutes and then arrest them.

Shrum believes this new law has been effective. "It hasn't stopped it totally, but it has been very effective."

Assault in Cafeteria

Police arrested a non-student yesterday after an attempted assault with a deadly weapon in the cafeteria coffee shop, according to campus police Chief Kenneth Shrum.

Donald Raymond Ludlum, 23 was taken into custody after an attack on a male student with a buck knife about 3 p.m.

Shrum said that the suspect apparently attempted to stab the victim and came within inches of his chest, but no

The AIDS virus is virtually always fatal and is spreading at epidemic proportions in the United States. Yet the spread of the virus can be prevented, according to Kay Vanderford of the Central Valley AIDS Team.

The use of condoms is the most practical means of preventing the AIDS virus, said Marilyn Mitchell of the Fresno County Health Department. "The rest of it is educating people not only to use them (condoms) but also explaining the other options, such as abstinence."

Many people are uncomfortable about using or even talking about the use of condoms, explained Mitchell. "Along with the use of condoms you have to explain to people how to use them," she said. "You can't just say 'here, use a condom' because most people in this day and age have never had to use them and don't know how to use them."

According to Mitchell, 61

percent of condom sales go to women. "A lot of the education is focused with the women," she added, "they're the ones that are the consumers."

The use of a spermicide containing nonoxynol-9 is recommended as a backup prevention when using condoms during sexual activity, Vanderford stated.

Nonoxynol-9 kills the AIDS virus in the laboratory but is not proven in practical use because it is not known whether the spermicide interacts with chemicals occurring naturally in the body.

There are other options, expressed Mitchell. "The options are that you take the precautions to protect yourself as well as protect other people, or your other option is that you're going to die. That's as clear as I can get."

To promote safe sex and the prevention of AIDS the Central Valley AIDS Team distributes safe sex kits free of charge. The kits contain two handi-wipes, two condoms, two packages of lubricant, a safe sex instruction card, and a Central Valley AIDS Team card.

To obtain information about the AIDS virus and anonymous AIDS testing or to get a safe sex kit contact the Central Valley AIDS Team at 264-AIDS.

Everyone is responsible for preventing the spread of AIDS, exclaimed Vanderford. "Whether we're talking about a male or a female, each sexual partner is equally responsible for their own life and the life of their sex partner," she added. "You cannot blame someone else for transmitting the virus to you."

It makes no difference that you might not be doing your job properly or that you might lack the qualifications for that promotion you want; the EEOC will jump in and take up your "cause."

In fact, the very worst thing that could happen is that you'll be reassigned to a new position, maybe even with more pay.

So next time you don't get your way, don't whine. Don't cry. File an EEOC complaint.

dance came directly from the Edison/Bakersfield high school basketball game which was held in the gym.

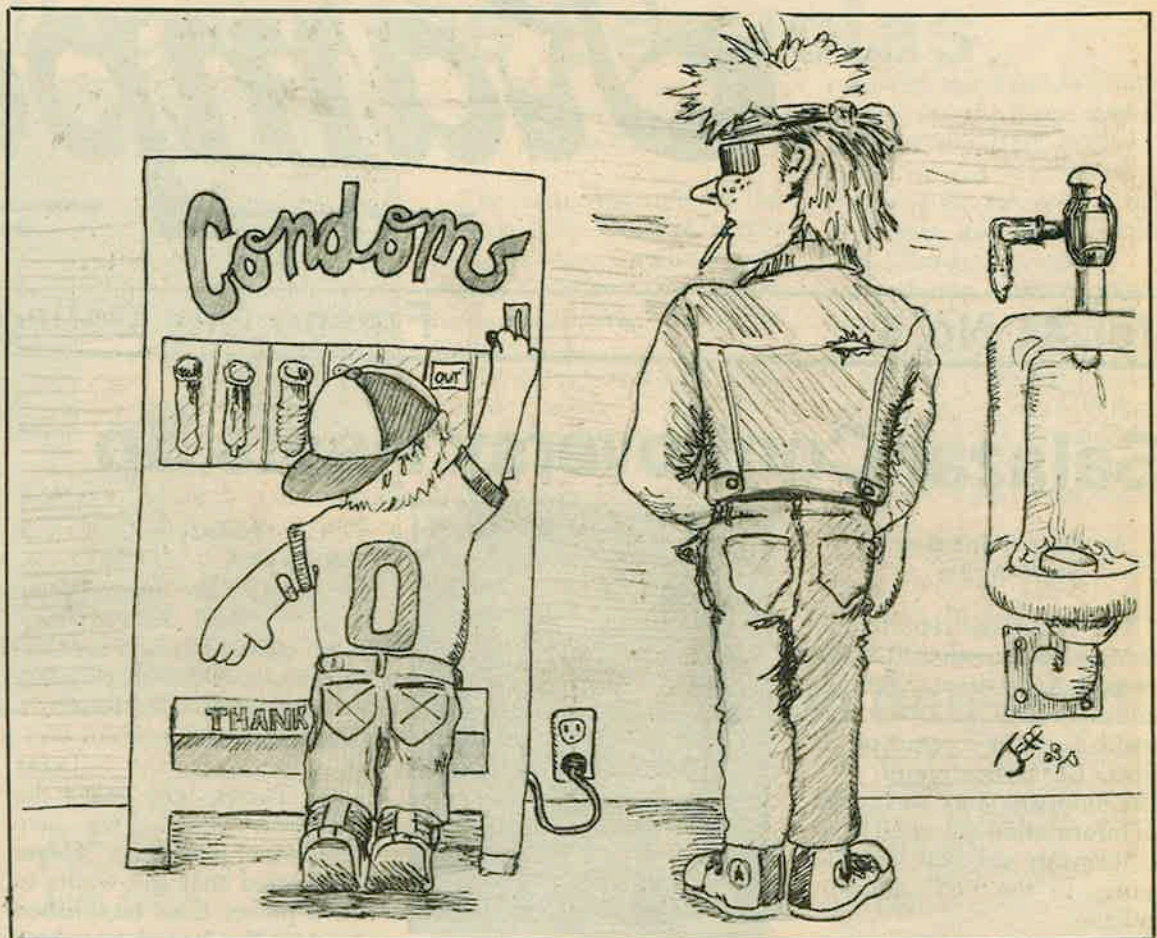
According to Campus Police Chief Kenneth Shrum there were an estimated 400 people packed in the Student Lounge.

If educating students, and possibly saving one life is jumping on the "condomversy bandwagon" as it has been termed, then I hope every student jumps on it with the ASB Senate.

The action the ASB took is reflective of requests by students. Students who realized the need for protection regarding the spread of the AIDS virus.

The issue is AIDS and how we as individuals can protect ourselves against it. In a recent statement by Surgeon General Koop, there are three ways to prevent the spread of this deadly disease:

- 1) abstinence
- 2) a monogamous relationship
- 3) the use of condoms

Ideally, abstinence and monogamous relations are the best, however, realistically they are not always practical. Therefore, if one wants to best protect themselves the use of a condom becomes necessary. It has been stated that if individuals want to purchase condoms they can go to the stores and purchase them there. That is fine for those

people who are comfortable in doing so.

However, there are a great number of people, both men and women, who are very uncomfortable with this method. Especially now with the high rate of pilferage some stores have removed them from the shelves and are stocking them behind the counters, making it even more difficult for some individuals to purchase them.

Awareness and education comes in many forms, one being providing services for those who want them. Condom vending machines in the men's and women's restrooms is one example of a service that can be provided. This could save a life possibly your own.

the issue here. The issue is taste. And putting condom vending machines in FCC restrooms is certainly distasteful.

Each individual is responsible for protecting himself or herself from AIDS. If a person is embarrassed to walk into a store and purchase a condom they do have other options. That option is that they are going to die if they have sex without condoms.

The Central Valley AIDS Team distributes a "safe sex kit" free of charge to the public. You don't even have to give your name to get a safe sex kit. Inside the safe sex kit are condoms, lubricant, and educational information about having safe sex.

You can't just throw condoms at people and expect that to solve or even help the AIDS problem. Education is the most important aspect of any AIDS prevention program. That, Susan, is where the ASB is missing the boat.

Instructors Invent Wheelchair Umbrella

Other than oversized ponchos and hand held umbrellas, wheelchair users currently have no adequate means of weather protection designed specifically for their needs.

Realizing that many students who use wheelchairs often experience greater discomfort and inconvenience when it rains due to the non-existence of proper equipment, Technical Industries Counselor Dan Munshower has coordinated several T.I., classes in a concerted effort to invent an umbrella like attachment for wheelchairs.

According to Munshower, a faculty member for more than 10 years, never before in the history of the TI Dept. has such an ambitious and unique learning experience been conducted.

Beginning at the drawing board, Munshower approached Mr. M. Nunes who eagerly accepted the challenge of design for his advanced drafting students. With Eddie Ash, a sociology major, and his wheelchair for a model, the Tuesday night Drafting 41 class measured, and sized up, the situation. Taking into consideration the mobility and dexterity of the user and whether or not to make the attachment permanent, each student had the opportunity to bring to the project their own creative and imaginative input.

Student Kim Chi relied upon her years working with fabric to come up with a convertible top-like attachment that would be made of canvas. Another student added a height and angle adjustment to his design to make sure the rain would not fall onto the lap of the user.

After the rough sketches have been refined and one cost efficient and effective design emerges, which may be a combination of several designs submitted, the plans will go to the machine shop where the actual construction and attachment of the prototype to Ash's wheelchair will take place.

From start to finish this will be a college project that, if the legality of patents by a community college can be overcome, will booster the prestige of and provide additional funding to the T & I Department.

There is support among the administration, says Munshower, to conduct more projects like this which provide students with a "real world" learning environment. By bringing together the different fields of study in the one department, students have the chance to see the realization of their ideas and the working process involved in production.

The victory over KRC combined with Porterville College's win over College of the Sequoias left the hard-hitting Rams in sole possession of first place in the Central Valley Conference.

Led into battle by heavy-hitters Mark Crawford (4-4), Todd Deck (singled in two

runs and Jim Tesmer (singled in one run) the Rams scored 5 runs in the first inning, 5 more in the fourth inning finishing the day with a total of 23 hits, and scores marked in 6 different innings.

Freshman starting pitcher David Wilson's lethal pitching arm held the KRC Tigers at bay for 7 innings allowing only 2 earned runs. Wilson's win moved his personal record to 5-1, tying the record for Most Ram Wins set last season.

The Rams next league game will be against Taft College, in Taft, on March 11.

Drug Program Required

Fresno City College will be required to have a drug prevention program in order to qualify for federal financial aid next year.

The requirement was set by Public Law 99-498, and applies to all public schools receiving federal financial aid.

FCC is waiting for an interpretation of the law from the National Association of Financial Aid Administrators, according to FCC Dean of Students,

Robert Fox. Fox emphasized "I am convinced we are in compliance," he said, but "the law is conflicting."

Fox said that FCC is "interested" in another federal law that provides funding to support drug abuse programs. The law, termed Public Law 99-750, would funnel federal funds to the states for "drug abuse prevention."

Certain non-profit substance abuse prevention groups are now operating on campus, such as Narcotics Anonymous and Alcoholics Anonymous.

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
