It happened to one young man in Kansas City, Missouri. He was at a SIFE competition when the CEO of GNB Technologies said, "I want to hire him!"

SIFE is an acronym for Students in Free Enterprise and "it is quickly becoming the premier organization on campus," said William (Bill) Syvertsen, faculty advisor to SIFE.

SIFE is a partnership between higher education and businesses geared toward helping students understand business and market economy and helping them use this knowledge to better themselves, their community and their country.

Through club functions, SIFE builds career connections between students and the businesses that donate to SIFE. Some of these businesses are Wal-Mart Stores/ Sam's Clubs, Hallmark Cards, Kraft Foods Inc., AT&T, Coca-Cola USA and the list goes on. Perhaps the most im-

portant aspect of SIFE for college students is that it gives actual business experience before students start their careers, an internship if you will; resolving the Catch-22 so many encounter as they can't get the job because they don't have the experience, but they don't have the experience because they can't get the job.

SIFE is a non-profit organization open to anyone who wants to learn, practice and then pass on their knowledge of free enterprise. The motto is, "Tell me and I will forget, show me and I might remember, involve me and I will understand." That involvement comes from the many projects SIFE has done, and those ongoing.

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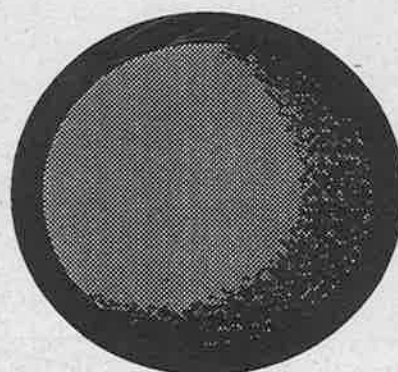
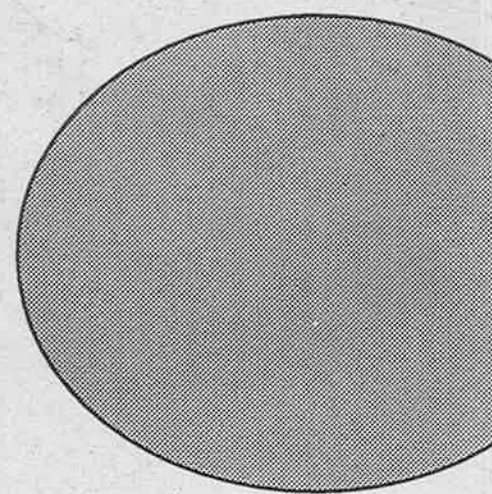
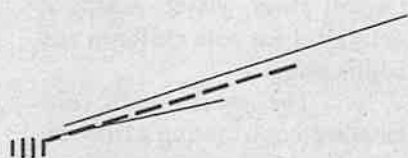

Things get more and more curious after Alice plummets down the hole. From a hurried but continually late white rabbit on a skateboard to a camelion like Cheshire Cat on a wide screen, to rastafarians Tweedle Dee and Tweedle Dum

In an age where the extent of most rap lyrics is: "I got more money than you, I'm the bomb, she's got it on,," and of course, "c'mon ride the train," it's refreshing to hear a truly gifted rap artist. Ras Kass (which means Jon IV) has been a near legend in hip-hop's underworld since the early 1990's, and his recent release Soul on Ice (named after Eldridge Cleaver's autobiography) is his first commercially available L.P.

What's apparent in Ras Kass's lyrics is his incredible absorption of the English language. Ras comes off booksmart and streetwise, mixing slang with complex concepts and words that use all 26 letters of the alphabet. Plus, his terminology is as vast as his subject matter.

"On Earth as it is..." is an analogy for the record business that uses religious imagery. It could also be described as a five minute exercise in blasphemy towards the Christian religion (which is good or bad depending on your own personal views).

Ras makes his motives for this blasphemy materialize on "Nature of the Threat," a seven minute excursion into the history of racism. "Nature of the Threat" is a lyrical marvel, as shown in this quote about Thanksgiving: "...when you celebrate Thanksgiving, what you are actually celebrating is the proclamation of the pope of Rome, who later in league with Queen Isabella sent Cardinal Ximenes to Spain to murder any

blacks that resisted Christianity. These moors, these black men and women were from Baghdad, Turkey, and today you eat turkey on your Thanksgiving day as the European power destroyed the 'turkies' who were the forefathers of your mothers and fathers. Now fight the power..."

What surfaces throughout the rest of the album is the Ras Kass is a paradox. Sure he is a great spokesman for injustice, but he also admits to many of his shortcomings. From the way in which his daughter was conceived, to his free use of common synonym for "femadog" on the track "Drama" (which Ras starts his first verse of with "no disrespect to the opposite sex..."), Ras falls victim to many of the traps of society that he criticizes.

Ras Kass is simply a man who sees the evils of the world, both abroad and inside himself (which were taught him during his childhood shown in "The Evil that Men Do") this makes Ras seem incredibly human in his rhymes.

On the flipside, Ras has freestyle lyrical skills that place him in the top ten of rap lyricists ever. So many of his freestyles are quotable that can't decide on just one, but you miss out on his lyrical craft while listening to the album, as the lyrics are on the album innersleeve (get your dictionary ready).

The production on Soul on Ice is shared by Ras and other notable west coast producers

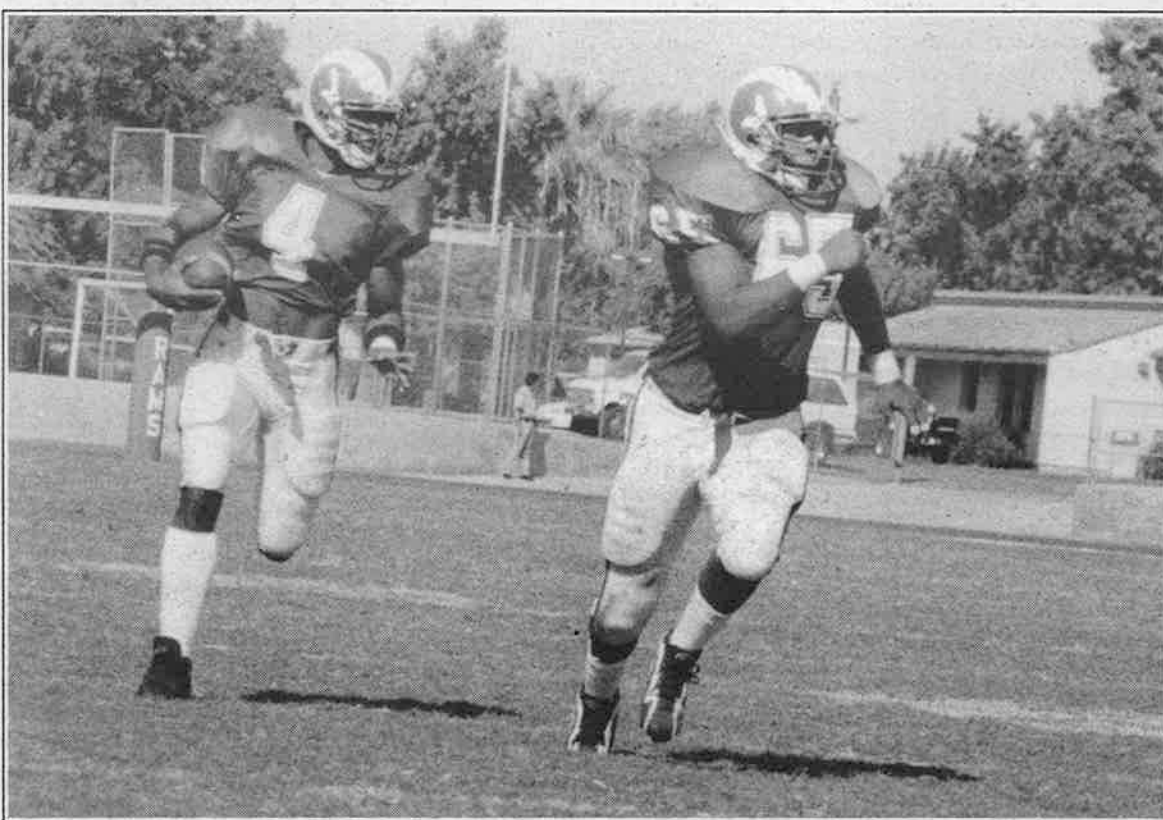

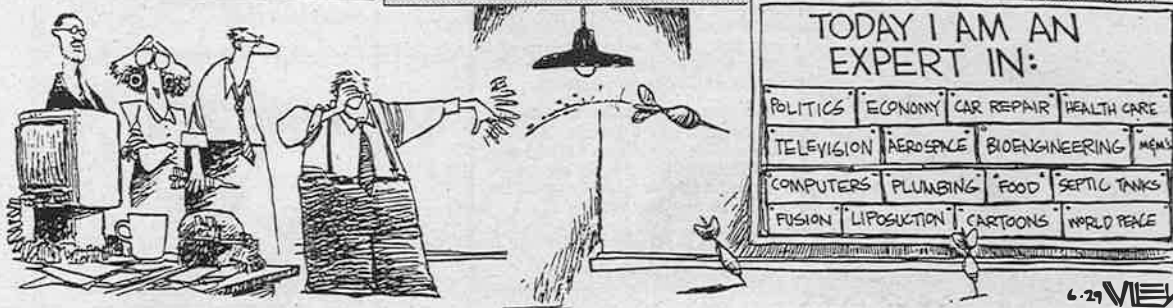

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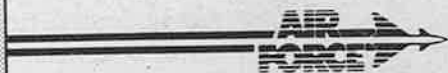

In week 7, the Raiders came out recharged in storming to a 20-0 lead over the visiting Detroit Lions. They would increase their lead to 34-0 before the penalty demons of Raiders past would come out to haunt them.

Then the Lions would show signs of life. With help from penalties and an ineffective Raider offense, the Lions scored three times in a ten minute span to make the score 34-21. As the Lions were trying to get yet another score, their drive was halted by a Larry Brown interception. The Raiders then kicked a field goal to finish the game at 37-21. A rejuvenated Raider team will visit San Diego for a Monday night contest in week 8.

This should be an offensive affair. The Raiders will come into the game with the NFL's #10 scoring offense. They are scoring 22.28 points per game. San Diego has the #5

offensive machine with a 24.16 average.

The last time these teams went to war, the passing games really got going. Tim Brown had 11 receptions for 120 yards and two touchdowns. Stan Humphries hooked up with Tony Martin totaling three touchdowns on 10 catches while compiling 138 yards. The Chargers won 40-34.

The defenses are not doing as well. The Raiders are giving up 19.14 and the Chargers are allowing 24 points a game. These teams are ranked 14th and 22nd in this department respectively.

If the Raiders play a decent game, it should be close. The Chargers will win this game for two reasons: The Chargers are at home and they are rested coming off the bye week. The Raiders must wait one more week for their bye which will be welcomed with open arms.

In Week 8, the 49ers will get a breather after a thriller at Green Bay. They will host the 1-5 Cincinnati Bengals. Following a 23-20 overtime defeat to Green Bay, the 49ers are once again tied with the Carolina Panthers atop the NFC West standings.

The 49ers, playing without Steve Young, held a 17-6 advantage at the half, but surrendered to the kicking leg of Chris Jacke. Jacke connected on five field goals including the game winner from 53 yards in the overtime period. Don Beebe tallied 220 receiving yards for the Packers.

Steve Young will be able to rest this week as well. They will beat the Bengals easily without his services. Thus, risking the irritation of his injured groin is simply not worth the trouble. The Bengals are terrible and the niners won't make them look any better.

A Koi can be purchased for as little as \$1 and as much as \$25,000 depending on the size and quality. The average Koi will grow to be 24" to 36" depending on two factors: heredity and the environment. The size of the pond, the amount of aeration, and the method of feeding also will determine the size. The largest known Koi is a little under 60", according to club data.
