Coming down the last hundred yards, Flynn and Stewart were pushing each other, but Flynn was able to out kick and win the race at 2 minutes, 12.81 seconds.

In the men's junior college long jump, Traco Rachal came in second with a jump of 23 feet 2 1/2 inches. Jason Koslan came in second in the high jump with a mark of 6 feet 4 inches and haskethall standout Cor Powell finished in fifth with a jump

The Rams have two meets before returning home on April 18 for a dual meet against Modesto and then on May 17-18 for the state championships.



Rams Tennis teams dominate CVC play

Women's Tennis setting records By Scott A. Mayes



After a record setting week, the PCC women's tennis is closing in on their first league championship in ten years. Mark Belman's team, ranked 7th in the state of California, pulled off a great week of tennis including four wins with two in one day.

On Monday, March 31, the Rams beat DeAnza 6-3. On Tues. April 1, PCC beat Delta 9-0. In ironic fashion there had been another game previously scheduled for that particular day, April Fool's Day. Kings River, which dropped their women's tennis program earlier in the season, provided FCC with it's second win of the day, a forfeit.


Rounding out the week was a critical game against C.O.S., a 5-4 victory. "The match was over early (against C.O.S.)," said Belman. "We were up 5-2 after the first doubles match. We had a bit of a let-up in losing the last two doubles matches."

PCC is now 10-0 in the conference and 14-1 overall. The nearest competitor is two games back at 8-2. With only two matches remaining, the Rams have clinched a tie for the CVC championship. A victory over either Porterville or Modesto this week would give sole possession of the league championship to Fresno. Incidentally, the one loss this season is not against a junior college at all. The loss came earlier this season in a match against the Fresno State JV

Belman believes the key to FCC's success at this season's conference and state tournament's will come down to their continued work on shot selection and placement.

Although they may not have 15 consecutive CVC championships as do the men, they're well on their way. Keep in mind the following: 1) This is Belman's first full year at PCC. 2) The team is 10-0 in the conference. 3) The team won zero matches last year. 4) Out of eight on the team, seven are freshman. 5) Recruits from Southern Illinois St., Cal Poly, and two all-valley performers from the high school ranks have their sights set in Fresno.

The conference tournament will be held April 17-19 in Visalia.

After the dust settled Saturday afternoon at Euless Park, the FCC Rams walked away with an 8-5 victory over Modesto JC.

Ram ace righthander Rip Rogers, got off to a shaky start in the 1st inning allowing the Buccaneers to load the bases. A visit to the mound by coach Ron Scott seemed to be what Rogers needed. Whatever the head coach told Rogers, it was magic. Rogers worked out of a jam to end the inning while allowing Modesto only 1 run. He cruised through the 7th inning.

The Rams ignited a 2 run rally in the 2nd inning off Modesto's starting pitcher Ryan Hansen. FCC scored 2 runs in the 3rd inning and 2 more runs in the 4th inning quickly sending Hansen back to the dug-out.

Third baseman GJ. Raymundo hit the ball in all directions. "I feel I can hit any pitcher in the world and my defense is good," said Raymundo, who drove a run scoring double deep to center field in the 3rd inning. Second baseman Scott Barr also had a hot bat. Barr went 3-4 for the day. "I went back to my old stance and hit the ball well today and I got a lot of good pitches," said Barr.

Rogers was relieved by spot starter and reliever. Chad Johnson in the 8th inning. The Rams were up 8-2, but Modesto jumped on Johnson for 3 quick runs minutes after be entered the game. "I just didn't have it," said Johnson, I didn't feel comfortable on the mound, I got behind on the hitters and I was just trying to throw strikes,". Danny Viveros relieved Johnson in the top of the 8th, putting out the fire for the Rams in the 8th and 9th inning.

Catcher Rob Avila went 2-3 with 2RBIs, Brent Gutierrez was 2-4 with 1 RBI, Steve Woodward and Ryan Accardo each had 2 hits. Rip Rogers now 6-1 picked up the win. Rogers fanned 6, surrendered 8 hits, yielded 2 runs and walked 4, in 7 complete innings. Ryan Hansen 4-4 was the loser. The Rams now have an overall season record of 20-12 and are currently 10-3 in the Central Valley Conference.
