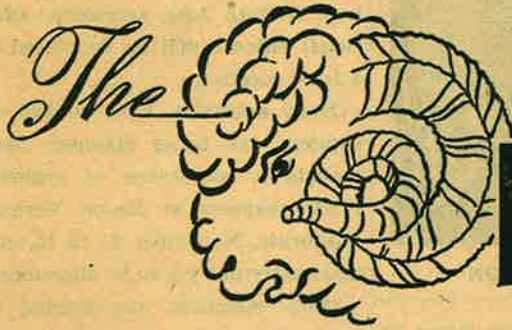
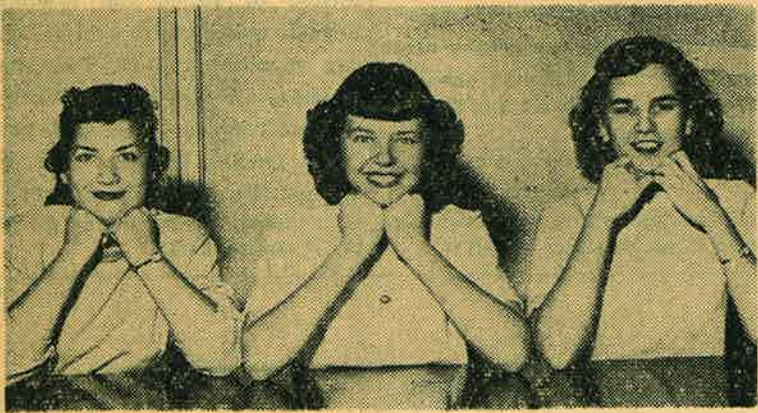

Dr. Lucille Williams and Mr. Garland Murphy, sponsors, will answer questions pertaining to the IVCF, Smith said.

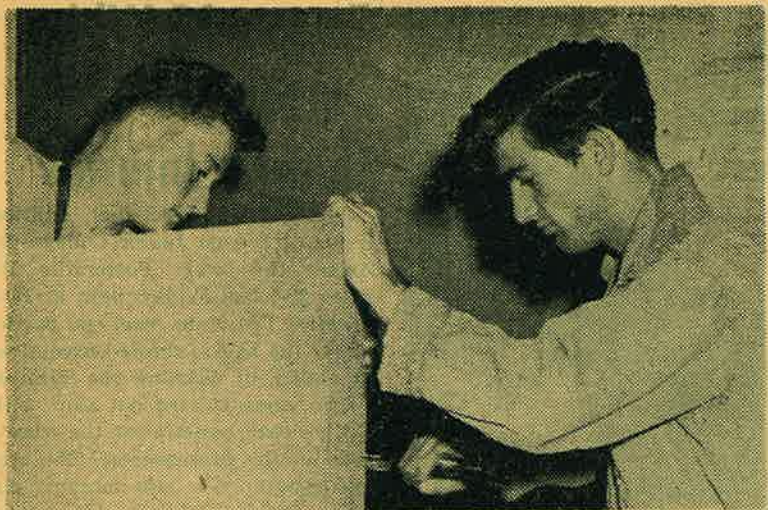

The mill and cabinet industry in the San Joaquin Valley is a large part of the presently booming building program, and the work entailed in this trade is highly skill-

ed, clean, fascinating.

"Demand for workers who are well skilled in cabinet making is always high," Seth Cowan, JC mill and cabinet instructor, said, "and wages rank with the top in the building industry."

The Fresno Junior College has much of the expensive equipment used in mill and cabinet making and is prepared to give students the proper training to prepare them to take jobs as apprentice tradesmen.

The school keeps in touch with the mill and cabinet shops and in many cases is able to place students who take advantage of the opportunities offered by the vocational Training Program.

The Ram second team backfield of Mel Wagner, Pete Toomajian, Edsel Beasley, and Gonzalo Valencia are to be lauded for their fine play in the tilt. Small wonder that Coach Johnston has been perplexed all season as to who to start. The lineplay of Jack Allen drew many good comments from the onlookers as did hustling Warren Wright's fine line backing.

OTHER CCJC PLAY

In other Central Junior College Conference play, the Taft JC eleven edged out the College of Sequoia Giants 26 to 20; Santa Maria defeated poor Reedley 14 to 7; and Coalinga slipped past San Luis Obispo to the tune of 14 to 0.

The Fresno State Bulldogs were defeated by the Santa Barbara Gauchos for their third loss in a row. The lead see-sawed back and forth in the contest which saw the Gauchos take a 7 to 0 lead in the third quarter only to have the Bulldogs slam back with a score in the same period to tie it up. Fleetfooted Gauch halfback Dick Johnson took a Bulldog punt in the fourth quarter on his own nine yard line and rambled 91 yards for Santa Barbara's margin of victory. Statistics showed that Fresno outplayed the Gauchos.

NATION'S GRID SCENE

The top team of the nation, the Fighting Irish of Notre Dame, lashed out with a terrific offense to overwhelm the highly-rated Tulane Green Wave 46 to 7 last Saturday.

In another contest watched with anxiety by the nation's grid fans, the Northwestern Wildcats upset the Michigan Wolverines 21 to 20 in Evanston, Illinois. The once tops Michigan eleven looked sad as Northwestern's Tom Worthington ran 56 yards and gave Northwestern its victory.

Fresno JC Whips Porterville 20-0 Despite Injuries

The injury-riddled but fighting Rams of Fresno Junior College defeated the lowly Porterville Pirates 20-0 last Friday night at Porterville. The Ram reserves, particularly the backs, showed exceptional ability in downing the Pirates.

The game started out slow with neither team penetrating the other's zone in the first quarter. The second quarter was two minutes old when Warren Wright, JC center, intercepted a pass and went 70 yards for the initial score without a hand touching him. Lyman Ehrlich converted to make it 7-0.

PORTERVILLE HELD

After that score the Rams buckled down and really went to work. Porterville was held after receiving the kickoff and punted out. On the third play Mel Wagner, former Edison High sprinter, went 60 yards off tackle to score behind good blocking. Ehrlich again converted to make it 14-0.
