Tomorrow is the deadline for dropping courses.


The correct procedure for dropping a course is to obtain a petition from the registrar, describe thereon the proposed change, and secure approval of the division chairman.







Thirty-one years ago on November 11,1918, heaven blessed the world when a war caused by the greed of autonomous rulers came to an end.

The First World War which had caused 2,000,000 Americans to cross the Atlantic and fight to "Make the world safe for democracy," had finally ceased.

The righteousness of American Democracy had won out over the oppressionistic policy of subjugating the masses which had poked its ugly face into the world under the banner of Germany, Austria, and other European nations.

The United States under a Constitution then only 129 years young, had proven again

that she would bow to none.

Under the American Constitution the cause of human freedom has been served. Human rights — the right to life, freedom of thought religion, residence, press, civil liberties, as-sembly, and property—are promulgated and perpetuated by this constitution which promotes the welfare of the individual.

As long as the Constitution lives, America need not dread the heel of a dictator or the

disorder of anarchy.

As the United States faces the future let us pause to recollect that the far-seeing vision of our constitutional fathers resulted in an instrument of government which no foe of human rights has penetrated and survived, and which has met every challenge

to the rights of man.

As we face this November 11, Armistice Day, our most formidable fortress of defense in time of stress still remains the Constitution of the United States, the protector of

humanity.




