### Radio Production Class Will Record Dedication Of Inn

The Radio Production Class, under the supervision of Joe King, speech instructor, will simulate a radio broadcast of the official opening of the Ramble Inn tomorrow.

The broadcast, which will be recorded on wire, is intended to give members of the class a chance to work on their production techniques and other problems encountered under actual studio conditions. Such practice will prepare students for actual broadcasts to be undertaken later in the year.

#### STUDENTS BROADCAST

Students who will record the proceedings tomorrow are Duane Barker, Robert Ridges, Charles Cady, and Florn Lancetot. The planned recording will include the presentation and acceptance of the Inn, and interviews with outstanding visitors and students in the new fountain and student lounge.

Although the present equipment consist solely of a voice recorder loaned by the Fresno City Schools audio-visual department, the machine has been of great help in assisting students in self evaluation.

#### KING LOOKS TO FUTURE

Mr. King, instructor of the class, pointed out that with standardized studio equipment available for use in classes in the near future, the classes will be able to duplicate any radio broadcast situation while preparing for broadcast work.

### Deadline Set For Dropping Classes

Tomorrow is the deadline for dropping courses.

The correct procedure for dropping a course is to obtain a petition from the registrar, describe thereon the proposed change, and secure approval of the division chairman.

Students who discontinue attendance in a class without filing a petition will receive an "F" in such course, Dean of Instruction Maurice Reetz warned.

After Thursday any subject dropped from the student's program will be recorded as an "F," said Mr. Reetz, unless circumstances warrant the petitions committee to permit the withdrawal without penalty.

### JC Student Recounts Mistreatments By Nazis

August 31, 1939 — Germans enter Poland! September 6, Germans move into Lodz, Poland. The German war machine was on the march.

Hitler's goosesteppers didn't take long to establish themselves as the most uncivilized troops in world history pillaging, ravaging, and raping the town of Lodz in a short time.

Mrs. Frances Kline, a member of the literacy and citizenship class, at Fresno Junior College can easily verify the aforementioned statement.

Mrs. Kline was born in Lodz, Poland on March 20, 1917. She had four brothers and three sisters and her parents were wealthy. Her father was an active business man.

#### GERMANS MOVE IN

When the German onslaught started, she was employed as a dress maker; she taught dress-making also. Immediately on moving into Lodz, the Germans took over the Kline's seven room residence, and forced the Klines into the street. Mrs. Kline's first husband was killed by the Nazis, who

she claims killed anyone they did not like.

Her brother was taken by the Germans, who, after beating him miserably, left him for dead; he was found in the streets and taken in by friends.



underrated food to the Poles. Later in the war the Germans tried to starve the Polish people.

In 1940, Mrs. Kline continued, the Nazis moved much of Lodz's populace to Germany where they were put to work in flax fields and fabric factories.

Shortly the Poles were moved to a concentration camp in Auschwitz, Poland. Here, Mrs. Kline describes life as very bad. They lived in cement block houses where even the beds were made of cement.

### College To Open Doors To Guests Tomorrow At One

An open house will be held tomorrow in conjunction with the dedication of Ramble Inn. All adult patrons of the Fresno Junior College are invited to attend between 1 and 5 p.m.

Guests are invited to make a tour of the college to see afternoon classes in operation.

The science department will hold an open house to display some of their new equipment.

#### MANY INVITED

In a letter to over 200 business men and women, and city science teachers, Mr. James King, head of the chemistry department, said, "The school district has gone to considerable expense to equip our science laboratories with the fundamental instruments necessary to train students to serve the industrial San Joaquin Valley as competent laboratory technicians."

#### GUIDES NAMED

Representatives of the AWS, AMS, and the Student Association will receive and register guests in the foyer of the main building, and will act as hosts, escorts, and guides.

Don Bischel, Don Moulden, and John Savona comprise the student committee in charge of open house.

Larry DeCarlo, student president, will open the proceedings and express the appreciation of the student body to the school board for the construction of Ramble Inn.

Mr. George Turner, president of the school board, will give a brief history of the board's action in the construction of the canteen for the Junior College. He will then turn the keys to the canteen over to Eldon Webster, student manager.

#### WEBSTER WILL SERVE

Webster will present the members of the school board with the first refreshments made at the fountain. Following this ceremony all the other guests and students will pass into the social room where refreshments will be served by the homemaking classes, under Miss Mary Harney.

At the conclusion of the dedication of the canteen all guests will be invited to take part in the open house planned for the afternoon.

The money to build Ramble Inn was appropriated by the school board last year after much deliberation. A small student social room was first started by last year's student council, but the area was felt not adequate to meet the students' needs.

#### SIMPLE LINES

The new canteen is located in the basement of the main wing of the building. Simplicity of design, with natural and melon colored walls, gives the room a modern appearance. Fixtures in the room have been finished in the school colors, red and white.

Adjacent to the canteen is the student lounge which is trimmed in peach and green. This room will be used as an eating area until the south patio is prepared. Plans at present are that the patio will be built in the early Spring. At that time the student lounge will be converted and used for social purposes only.

#### RULES OUT LATER

Jim Jayne, chairman of the student committee in charge of governing the student lounge and fountain area, says that rules and procedures for Ramble Inn will be set up after the canteen has been in operation for a few weeks.

Ramble Inn will be open in the evenings for club meetings and dinners by student organizations.

Members of the school board who will be present at the dedication services tomorrow are Mr. Turner, Dean Malloch, Mr. Arthur Selland, Mrs. Margaret Robinson, and Mrs. Geraldine Wheeler.

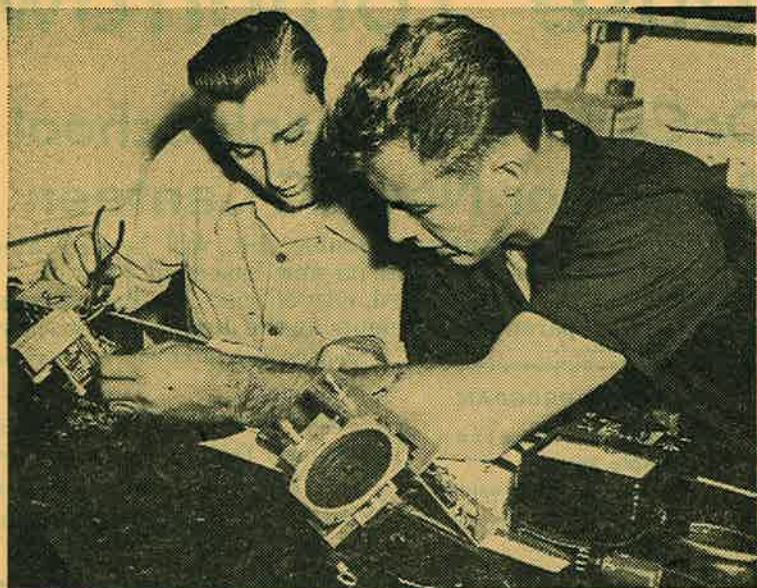
### 'Build Leaders' Is Conference Theme

## Radio Class Prepares 'Hams' With Electrifying Results

An electrifying realization struck me while in the radio lab of Fresno Junior College recently, after Mr. Louis Kozub, head (and tail) of the radio department, revealed, "When a student gets too wrapped up in his work, the results are shocking! (While pondering the wisdom of his words, I gasped for breath — the air is rare four flights up in our building.)"

Mr. Kozub, whose pockets bulge with spare fuses and radio parts, in response to my needling about the laboratory, eventually admitted that there might be something about radio that a journalism major wouldn't know and agreed to answer a few questions on the subject.

Mr. Kozub stated that the primary function of the laboratory classes is to produce future radio men. "I don't know how low ever," he casually mentioned, "the possibility of just stumbling on to an Arthur Godfrey or Bob Hope while working on radio sets isn't too remote either."

### RADIO WORK

"The highest degree of proficiency is the aim of our work here," pointed out Mr. Kozub. The instruction, which prepares students for futures of the radio field, includes work on radio and television servicing, radio operation, public address work, and other applications of radio. (Interested students, please note.)

The department has a fairly well stocked toolroom and a library containing wiring diagrams of all

radios ever made in the United States.

### PUZZLE BOARDS

Demonstration boards are also available to provide students in radio maintenance with lessons in trouble shooting. The boards, which are radio circuits, are laid out in the manner of a blackboard diagram and can be fixed in such a manner that they will not operate then like dealing from a stacked deck. The instructor shows the class how to fix them.

The presence of an amateur radio station in the department soon caught my attention, and in answer to my frank skepticism, Mr. Kozub vengefully switched on the set. After manipulating a few dials, and pulling a switch here and there, he contacted—and exchanged greetings with—a "ham" in Wisconsin. (Explanation: a Ham, I learned, is a radio fiend who owns a radio set and derives a pleasure out of talking to other hams in their own special language, such as, "QRK your BC Iand ICU.")

### HOPEFUL HAMS

Under the watchful eye of Mr. Kozub, other young hopefuls are being tutored in the language and

procedure necessary to make contact with other Hams. Among this special breed of radio enthusiasts are Don Bybee, Don Scheidt, and Joe Grimes. Good Hams all!

Mr. Kozub, who likened television of today to the automobile industry of 25 years ago. Without actually foreseeing when Fresno would have its own station, he did anticipate that Fresno would have "TV" within the year.

Displaying a gigantic radio tube called a cathode ray tube or kinoscope, Mr. Kozub explained that it was the "business" end of a receiver and was no part of a television kit received recently. The kit will be assembled by radio students learning the details of television.

Mr. Kozub said that the radio department, by converting surplus radar equipment, and "a few added items," will be able to duplicate the transmitting and receiving ends of a television system. The FJC Radio course will include this added feature in its two year program.

Any student who has questions concerning radio and television, or who is interested in obtaining some information about classes may see Mr. Kozub in M-45.

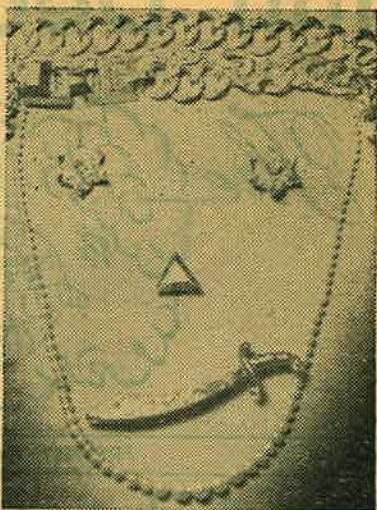

NEWS ITEM: Pins are used for more than holding in shoulder pads.

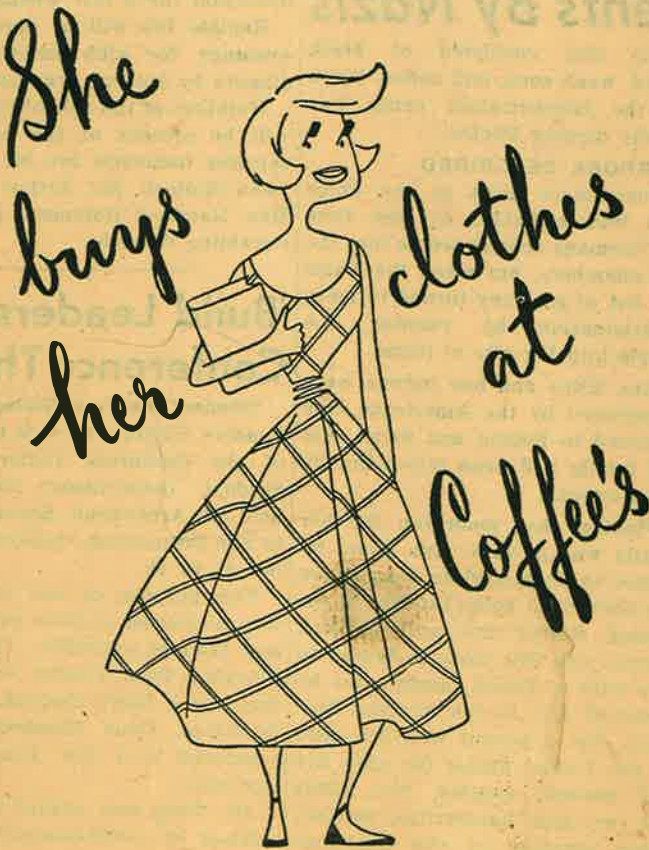
## Car Keys Mystery Baffles Office Girl

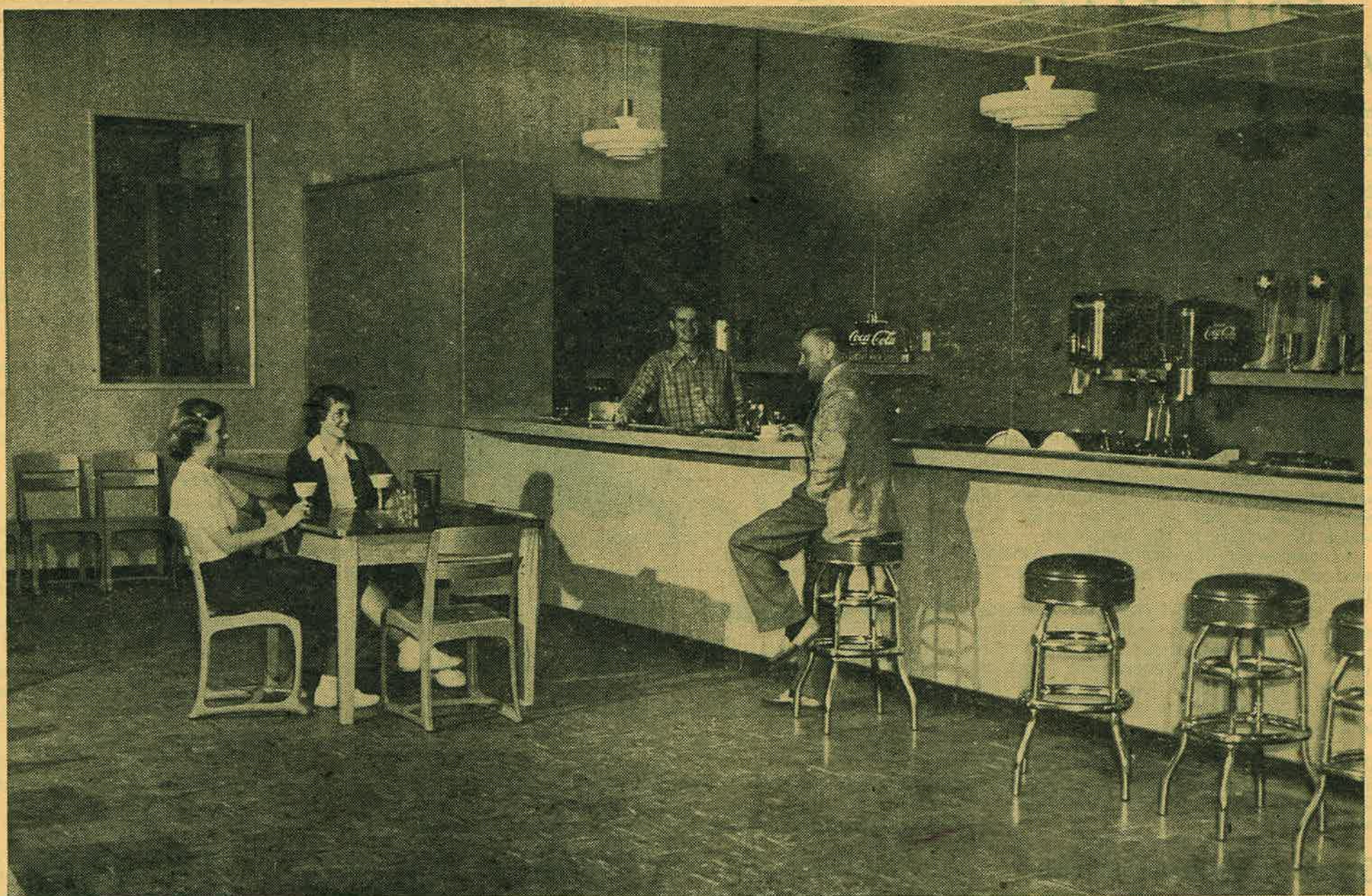

## Armistice Day

Thirty-one years ago on November 11, 1918, heaven blessed the world when a war caused by the greed of autonomous rulers came to an end.

The First World War which had caused 2,000,000 Americans to cross the Atlantic and fight to "Make the world safe for democracy," had finally ceased.

The righteousness of American Democracy had won out over the oppressionistic policy of subjugating the masses which had poked its ugly face into the world under the banner of Germany, Austria, and other European nations.

The United States under a Constitution then only 129 years young, had proven again that she would bow to none.

Under the American Constitution the cause of human freedom has been served. Human rights — the right to life, freedom of thought, religion, residence, press, civil liberties, assembly, and property—are promulgated and perpetuated by this constitution which promotes the welfare of the individual.

As long as the Constitution lives, America need not dread the heel of a dictator or the disorder of anarchy.

As the United States faces the future let us pause to recollect that the far-seeing vision of our constitutional fathers resulted in an instrument of government which no foe of human rights has penetrated and survived, and which has met every challenge to the rights of man.

As we face this November 11, Armistice Day, our most formidable fortress of defense in time of stress still remains the Constitution of the United States, the protector of humanity.

## Business Leaders Club Initiates 22 Mobile X-Ray Unit Coming

Twenty-two new members were initiated to the Fresno Junior College chapter of the Future Business Leaders Association in a candle-light ceremony, October 31 in N-35.

Explanation of the meaning of the words "Future," "Business," "Leaders," and "America" were given by Ken Kafeyan, Ruby Hall, Gilbert Pesquira, and Lazaro Leon. Evelyn Steinkamp, president, then gave a brief history of the organization and the oath of membership was administered. New members recited the national creed in unison.

Chester A. Byers, Jr., case finding director of the association, explained that it is the aim of the association to x-ray every person 15 years of age and over in Fresno County, especially both parents of school-age children, in order to protect the home against the disease tuberculosis.

Children under 15 years of age are not x-rayed for several reasons. Statistically it has been shown that tuberculosis is a disease of adults. Byers says that since the program is an expensive procedure efforts must be concentrated on the group most likely to have tuberculosis.

When an adult case is found, of course, all children living around the person infected with tuberculosis are checked by skin test or chest x-ray.

The danger of this disease lies in the fact that a person who feels and looks perfectly healthy may have contracted the disease unknowingly. Long before a man or woman knows that the germs are doing their work, the x-ray can show trouble in the lung. Chest x-rays are the best way of finding tuberculosis in the early stages.

The Mobile Chest X-ray Unit of the Fresno County Tuberculosis Association will be at the Fresno Junior College on Tuolumne Street, Wednesday, November 16, 1949, from 8 to 4 p.m.

The stork's first trip brought Lowell Spencer, FJC band director, a boy, delivered to his wife, Thelma, at Saint Agnes Hospital on November 1.

Both mothers are reported doing fine; the instruction in the music and journalism departments is also reported back to normal.

## Prof Describes Psych At FJC As Practical, Valuable Study

Every person often finds that his most difficult problems in life are psychological in nature. In fact, the material affairs of life such as earning a living or learning a skill are often complicated by a lack of proper adjustment to life's problems on the part of the individual. However, the average person is dissatisfied when he attempts to read books on the science of psychology. For him, the subject matter is too far removed from his every day interests concerning his work, his home, or his mental activities.



Perhaps the greatest need is the need for a better understanding of human behavior. It is our purpose in psychology courses to make this study interesting and helpful. For this reason we emphasize the psychological facts and interpretations which will meet the student's needs as a citizen, businessman, or professional worker.

### PSYCH FOR MR. AVERAGE

Accordingly, we are presenting psychology for the layman who wants to know what makes him tick, the meaning of an effective personality, and something about personal problems of everyday life. It is helpful and wise for all of us to know how to think about ourselves and see ourselves in our relationships to others.

Psychology can probably best serve our needs in the Junior College here and we are studying with a view to a better adjusted life.

### TOPICS FOR STUDY

Under such an arrangement, the student who enrolls in psychology can expect to study such general topics as the following: personality danger signals, developing personality, the common qualities of successful individuals, how to think effectively, emotional maturity, foundations of personal efficiency, and how to get along with people. These are but a few of the possibilities for further learning open to the student of psychology.

In general, a psychology department should also make available various tests on vocational aptitude, personality adjustment, and general intelligence. It is our hope that the services and learnings of psychology will be a practical everyday aid to all students in helping them solve personal problems and in becoming mature, effective personalities.

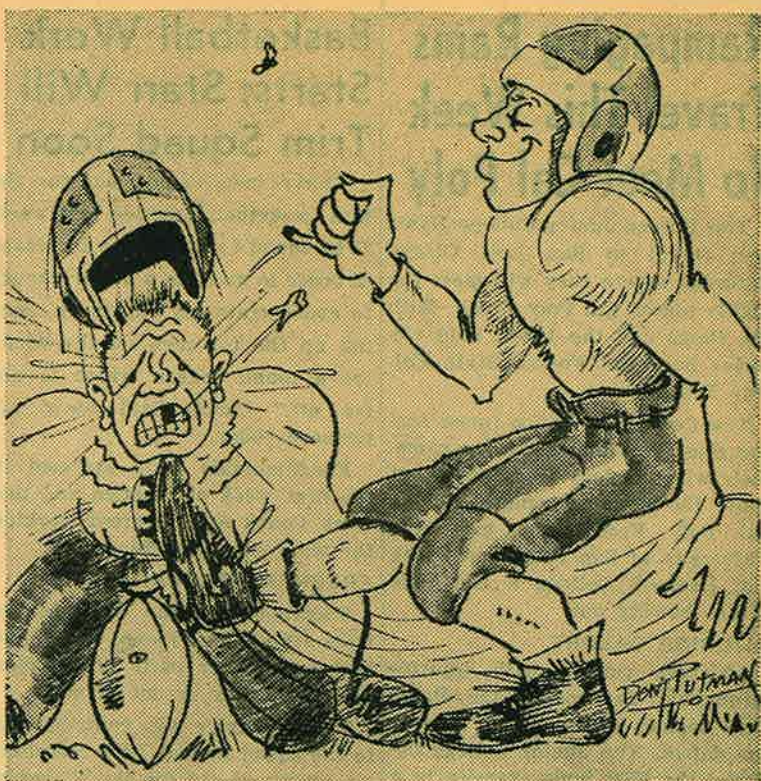
Ed Kashian, Don Putman, and Tom Cone have been working on the plans for the float for almost two weeks. Avis Chiligerian will direct the building of the comical float.

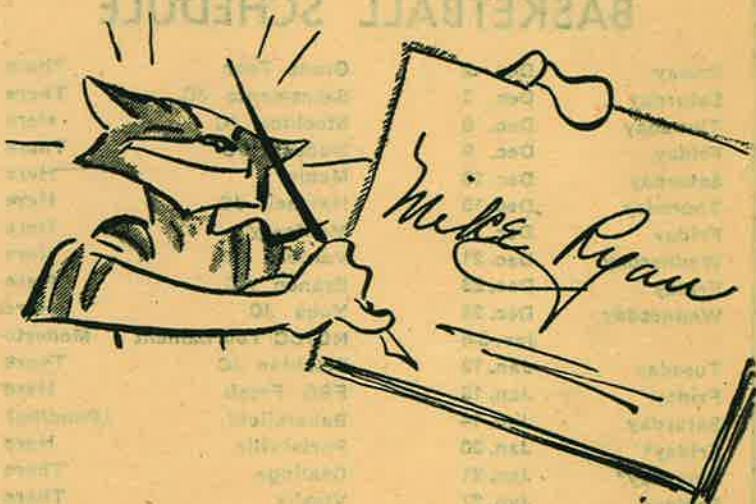

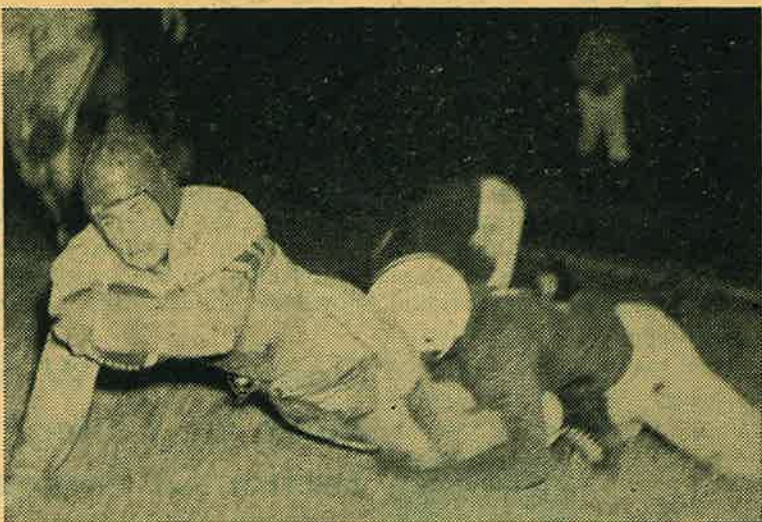

# FJC Shows New Strength By Swamping FSC Frosh 39-0

Paced by the fine play of Lyman Ehrlich, Bob Cobb and Maurice Fitzpatrick, the Fresno Junior College Rams lambasted the Fresno State College Frosh to the tune of 39 to 0 in the Ratcliffe Stadium last Friday. The win was number five for the Rams, while the Bullpups were left looking for their first victory.

The Rams chalked up three touchdowns in the first half and added three more in the second half to completely outclass the Frosh.

**FITZPATRICK GREAT**

Coach Stoney Johnston's revamped starting lineup didn't take long to start the ball rolling. After forcing the Frosh to punt out after the opening kickoff, Fitzpatrick's fine quarterbacking paced the Rams to the Bullpup 33 in ten plays. On the next play Fitzpatrick shoved the ball to halfback Mike Ryan who hit Ehrlich on the five yard line and the rangy end went into the end zone. Ehrlich's conversion attempt was wide.

A desperate Bullpup eleven immediately drove to the Ram 16 yard line on the next series of plays. The Ram defense stiffened and the JCers took over on downs. On the third play from scrimmage Cobb engineered his way through the Bullpup line and went 76 yards before speedy Ken Motley tackled him from behind. Piston legs Pete Toomajian scooted over on the following play to give the Rams TD number two. Ehrlich converted and the Rams led 13 to 0.

**RAMS THREATEN**

The Rams threatened to score again, when on the next kickoff Bullpup Don Hobson watched the ball while alert Boots Edmonson recovered to give JC the ball on the Frosh 22 yard line. The JC

assault failed to click and the Bullpups took over.

With time running out in the first half, the Frosh started passing but to no avail. Defensive star Al Mendoza intercepted a Frosh aerial in Ram territory and FJC went on the march again.

Penalties couldn't stop the determined Rams who, capitalizing on their fine passing combination of Fitzpatrick to Joe Ybanez, finally scored with Cobb crossing the goal line for his second touchdown. Ehrlich converted and the score stood at 20 to 0 at the half.

**The Frosh Kicked off to the Rams**

to open the second half and the Bullpups got a break, picking up a loose ball after two plays on the Ram 37. Bob Fries connected with a jump pass to Gil McClurg who was downed on the Ram four.

Ryan, who had been playing top offensive ball, helped the FJC cause by snaring a Fries' pass in the end zone to stop the Frosh drive.

With John Savona, Cobb, and Toomajian alternating carrying the ball, the Rams rambled to the FSC 24 yard line. After a completed pass, Fitzpatrick to Ehrlich, good for 20 yards, Cobb skirted into the end zone.

**JC RESERVES SHINE**

Coach Johnston rushed in his reserves.

The Bullpups could not budge the Ram reserves and had to punt out after the next kickoff. Ex-Edison high school sprinter Mel Wagner, Edesel Beasley, and Mendoza cooperatively shoved the Bullpups back ripping out large hunks of yardage every time. Mendoza then squirmed over from the four yard stripe and Ehrlich again converted.

In the waning moments of the contest Carlton Neely, Ram reserve end, recovered a fumble on the Frosh 41 yard line. On the next play Wagner zoomed the distance for the final Ram tally.

FJC's entire line, who completely outplayed the Frosh forward wall, stood up to their reputation and played heads up ball. A host of backs likewise sparked the Ram offense and defense.
