Hartnell College Is Ram Opponent Tonight At FHS

The Fresno Junior College Rams will meet the Hartnell College of Salinas tonight in the Fresno High School gym. The Rams will be gunning for their second win as they go against the oft-beaten five from Salinas.

The Rams won their first game last night over the Monterey Peninsula Junior College by a score of 48 to 32. Coach Paul Starr will have his crew up for the game, and is expecting plenty of trouble from the Hartnell five. So far this year the Rams have faced teams having a tremendous height advantage. The Salinas five averages six feet per man. FJC also averages around six feet per man.

COS DUMPS HARTNELL

Hartnell has lost two games to date, the last being a one point loss to the strong College of Sequoias. Fresno lost to a strong Modesto team by eight points last week which is a strong indication of the improvement of Ram cagers.

The leading scorer to date is lanky Lloyd Heavin with a total of 63 points, followed by guard Willie Perry who has 38. Heavin has dumped in 21 field goals along with 21 free throws. Perry has made 13 field goals and 12 free throws.

Next Wednesday the Rams have a tentative game with the Ventura Junior College from Southern California.

The most recent addition to JC's circulation list is the "Yuhigaoka," a paper from the Osaka Prefectural Yuhigaoka High School in Japan. The paper was accompanied by a letter written by Ichiro Tsujimoto, a staff writer of the English edition of the paper.

In the letter Ichiro mentioned the past war and how the Japanese youth were attempting to print English papers and to extend a welcome to the American people through circulating their papers through the American mainland.

QUOTE FROM LETTER

Ichiro's letter would arouse a feeling of friendship toward the Japanese in the hearts and minds of any American. Quoting Ichiro, "Loathsome few years of war has gone, and the Goddess of Peace is sending her blessings to our two nations. Here in Japan the bell for

freedom has been already rung, and we are opening our eyes towards a true democracy. We consider that it is we the young people of the world that can keep the world peace and true democracy thus making the things in the world better. We also think that the power which will make these things possible is the union of nations, especially the union of the young people."

ASKS FOR ARTICLES

Ichiro, apparently a very educated person because of his quick adoption to the difficult English language, asked that the staff of the Rampage contribute articles to his paper.

In asking that FJC exchange papers Ichiro stated, "We are endeavoring to make our pages better, and to help promote friendships between the youth of our two nations and thus we are very anxious to have your help. We shall be very much obliged if you will send us the paper you have in your school."

In closing, Ichiro asked that students of the Fresno Junior College write to him telling about the methods we use in our self-government, what are the most enjoyable events we have in our school life, and anything else concerning our daily life here in the United States.

EVERYONE HAS OPINION

Any plumber or street sweeper can tell you that big business has a strangle-hold on this country and is ruining it for the benefit of the vested interests.

Your druggist can take you on a tour into the horrors of socialized medicine, your doctor can back him up; then when you sit down to think it over your congressman will mix you up further by telling you over the radio that the doctors are befuddling the issue and that socialized medicine would be the greatest thing to hit this country since Mule Train.

The only conclusion you can draw from so many conflicting arguments is that with so many groups intent on ruining this country the end must be very close indeed.

AIM OF JC CLASS

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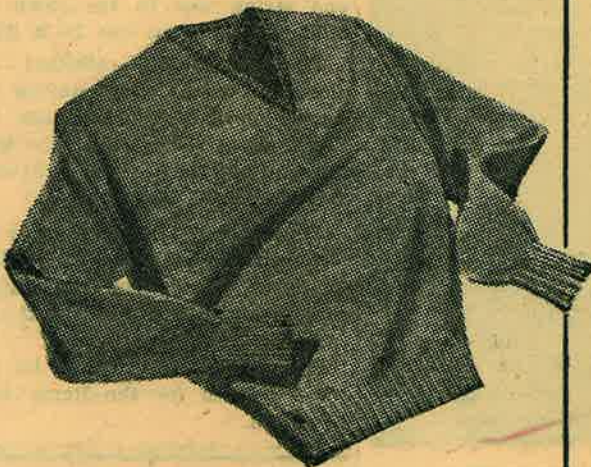

FJC Five 'Takes It On The Chin,' But Looks Better

Height plus more experience gave Stockton, Modesto, and Menlo junior colleges victories over the Fresno Junior College Rams last weekend.

Thursday night the Rams bowed before the giant Stockton College Mustangs, 55 to 27. The Stocktonites led all the way.

Stellar Stockton guard Lee Kaupke started the night's scoring with a basket and a foul shot to put Stockton ahead 3 to 0. JC center Otis Harris came back with a fast basket to make the score 3 to 2.

KING SHINES

Returning letterman Del King hit six points to pace the Mustangs to a 28 to 6 lead by the end of the first half.

Star JC forward Lloyd Heavin began to connect in the second half and helped the Rams move closer to the Mustangs. The Rams played a much better game in the second half compiling 21 points to the Mustangs 27.

Heavin paced the Rams with 10 points while King led the Stockton five with 14 points.

FJC IMPROVES

Friday night the Rams traveled to Modesto where they threatened throughout only to lose a close, 38 to 32. The score at the end of the first half was 21 to 14.

The cocky Modestans were surprised by the highly spirited Rams and had to go all the way to win the contest. Led by Willie Perry the Rams started chopping away at the seven point lead of the Collegians in the opening minutes of the second half only to have the Modesto center, six foot four inch Bill Hagen, and guard Jim Doan put the game in the bag with their top shooting.

Guard Perry led the Fresnoites with 18 points and Hagen and Doan sparked Modesto with nine and eight points, respectively.

LOSE TO MENLO

In their third game of the rough weekend the Rams were dumped by the Menlo Junior College Oaks to the tune of 55 to 39.

With Heavin, Joe Ybanez, and Harris doing most of the scoring, the Fresno JC quintet held the highly-touted Oaks to an 11 point lead in the first half.

The Oaks outscored the Rams, 28 to 23, in the second half to win easily by a margin of 16 points.

Heavin again led the JC scoring parade with 13 points with center Harris close on his tail with nine.

Rams Finally Win One; Beat Lobos

Breaking into the win column for the first time this season, the Fresno Junior College Rams defeated the Monterey Peninsula Junior College Lobos last night at Fresno High's gym, 48 to 36.

The consistent accuracy of Lloyd Heavin around the free throw circle was the tell-tale blow that overcame the Lobos who pulled to within one point of the Rams during the last five minutes of play.

Heavin looped 23 points during the evening in what was an extremely rough contest despite the calling of 32 personal fouls.

Fresno got off to a good start in the first quarter and shortly before halftime had the Lobos on the short end of a 16 to 5 count. During the last few minutes of the first half the Monterey forwards began to find the basket while the Ram second string was in the game. At halftime the score was 19 to 16.

The scoreboard reflected the closeness of the game during the second period, and although the Rams never relinquished the lead, they did find the score 35 to 34 with five minutes to play.

At this point the accuracy of Heavin along with buckets by Willie Perry, guard, and Otis Harris, center, began to pay off for the locals.

Perry followed Heavin in the score column for the Rams with 12 points.
