## Latest Ruling On Draft Call Is Reviewed

the American Council On Education of the Selective Service bulletin on draft status of junior college students reached the school

The bulletin states that postponement of induction of a junior college student "is based solely upon actual enrollment in school at the time the call for induction comes and satisfactory progress in thé courses."

Rank in the upper 50 per cent of the class is not a requirement for postponement, the interpretation states.

Though postponement of induction of enrolled students may not be denied by local selective service boards, deferment at the end of the school year may be denied.

Previous rulings on deferment of students who received a postponement during their first year follow: all three conditions must exist and be certified by the college to the

1. The registrant has completed at least one academic year of fulltime course of instruction at a col-

2. The college at which the registrant last completed an academic year of a full-time course of instruction certifies that the registrant's scholastic standing placed him among the upper half of his class.

3. The registrant had made arrangements prior to August 1, 1950 to enroll in a full-time course of


