Building Bonfires For Rally Keeps Committee Busy

Building two bonfires, one more than they had contracted for, and preparations for the serpentine and after-game dance kept rally committee members busy over the past weekend.

The original bonfire, which took four days to build, was burned Friday afternoon by "unknown vandals." The only clue to their identity was a bundle of College of the Sequoias newspapers found on the scene of the burning.

More than twenty cars decorated with red and white streamers and appropriate signs took part in the afternoon serpentine which proceeded noisily through downtown Fresno. John Mullins drove the lead car, followed by a truck carrying the Fresno Junior College band and the rally girls, who waved their pom-poms in time to the music.

It was during the serpentine that the bonfire was burned. As soon as the "crime" was discovered. rally members set out to rebuild the

Further confirmation came today of the identity of last Friday's bonfire burners. A letter from Jack Hansen, publicity director at College of the Sequoias, enclosed a picture of the original bonfire.

Mr. Hansen reports that the picture and a note explaining it were placed on his desk by a person or persons unknown to him. He said he has no idea who was responsible for the "dastardly deed."

Let's give the team a good send-off for the Taft game Friday. They leave at 1 Friday afternoon from in front of the school.


And let's do more than just give them a send-off; let's go with them, if possible.



Hygiene Classes Hear Of Drug Evils

Hygiene classes are now enlightened as to the dangers of indulging in drugs in any form after hearing a talk by Mr. Fred L. Stemm, from the State Narcotics Bureau. The point that Mr. Stemm stressed is the harm that can come from the use of drugs.

Marijuana, although not a habit forming drug, seems to enable the user to exert an unbelievable amount of power and to endure

Opium and its derivatives, which are habit forming, are the seditive type drug and are very seldom curable. The emotions become uncontrollable and the brain cells begin to deteriorate after continued use. The cost to support this habit is usually about \$25 a day, and the addict will go to any means of securing more dope.

Mr. Stemm urged everyone never to accept any kind of a narcotic, not even "just for the thrill" or out of "curiosity." The consequences could be very damaging, he warned.

The battle for the football championship crown will take place tomorrow night as the Fresno Junior College Rams travel to meet last season's champs, Taft Junior Col-

Taft, who bested the Rams 27-20 last season, will be all out this game to do it again. Both teams are undefeated in league play with wins over the College of Sequoias. The winner of Friday's game will become the champs in the western division of the Central California Junior College Conference.

Fresno's injuries have been minor and few in past games, but early this week they have struck hard.

Tom Beldon, who has played an important spot for the Rams in the guard position, will be out for the remaining season, due to a pulled tendon in the back of his

Ara Arax, the Rams starting center, will also be missing from the Fresno roster because of an injured ankle.

SLIGHT HURTS.

Others injured are, Boot Edmonson and Jim Stout. There is a chance these men will be able to get into action tomorrow night.

On the brighter side, Ward Longueville, who has been out of action with a concussion, is expected to aid the Rams in tomorrow's tussle with Taft.

Taft, according to Johnston, has a big, strong team with plenty of die hard spirit.

EARLY SEASON OUTLOOK.

In looking at Fresno's chances to bring home this title, observers will look back at the Ram's chances at the beginning of the season. Despite the fact the locals began the season stripped of many of their key men by the draft and graduation, the diligent drilling and training by Coach Stoney Johnston and his competent assisting coaches, have put on the field a team which any student body and faculty would be proud to claim. Fresno Ends Sequoia Mastery By Crushing Giants, 36 To 20

The Fresno Junior College Rams humbled the College of Sequoia Giants Saturday night to the tune of 36-20, giving the Giants their first defeat in three years by FJC.

The Giants, the only Junior College to claim two wins over

the Rams, just could not hold back+ the driving power of the fighting cellent speed throughout the game Fresnans.

Both teams battled back and forth well into the second quarter FULLBACK BULLS OVER. before either was able to score. Just before half-time, the Rams's hard hitting game began to pay off, and the COS defenses weakened as the Rams moved into the

This was the second league game loss for the Seguoia eleven and leaves the Rams with a clean record in league games to date.

TOOMAJIAN'S TOE TERRIFIC.

The first scoring came after Pete Toomajian, Ram right half, booted the first of several beautifully placed kicks which was declared dead on the Sequoia one yard line. Paul Galloway, COS halfback, in an attempt to kick the ball out of the end zone, backed up too far and stepped out of the end zone. This gave the Rams an automatic safety and two points.

The Fresnan's second scoring came as a result of another well placed kick by Toomajian to the three yard line. The Giants kicked to Joe Spino, in the safety position for the Rams, who took the ball on the COS 46 and ran it back to the Sequoia's two yard line before being stopped. Spino showed ex-

Rams hold a good chance to cop the two remaining games.

The fighting Rams will be all out to bring home that crown for themselves and the school; and if the student body shows that allimportant support as they did in the COS game last Saturday, it will take a mighty powerful opponent to take away the Ram's crown



as he chalked up 146 yards on punt returns.

Continuing from the two, Ron Chapanian, Ram fullback, bulldozed his way through for a touchdown. Lyman Ehrlich, right end, booted the ball between the uprights, making the score 9-0.

With one minute left in the first half and after holding back a Fresno threat to score, the Sequoia Giants advanced the ball to their own 14 yard line where they fumbled. Fullback Hubert Beasley recovered for the Rams.

Winston Beasley worked the ball to the 5 yard line; Spino pushed to the two, and with less than 10 seconds remaining in the first half, Chapanian again scored for Fresno just as the gun went off. Ehrlich made good his second straight conversion with the first half ending,

The second half of the game proved to be a mad race for points as both teams rolled up 20 apiece. PASSES PAY OFF.

Toomajian, on excellent drives, ran up a 6.5 average as he carried the ball for 77 yards in 12 tries. The additional passing offensive of quarterback Bod Rodgers to end Ehrlich for 56 yards, greatly aided the final outcome of the game.

Rodgers claims one score on a quarterback sneak and also aided in another as he sent a short toss to Ehrlich in the end zone.
