### JC Leaders Pass **Draft Resolution**

A resolution favoring postponement of induction of junior college students enrolled in terminal education was passed by the California Junior College Association of Administrators at their meeting in Yosemite last week.

Present selective service policy grants postponements of induction to all regularly enrolled students satisfactorily pursuing a full time course of study, but the American Council on Education is on record as favoring postponements only for students enrolled in curricula leading to a baccalaureate degree.

Dr. Thomas Blakely, Fresno Junior College president, introduced the resolution at Yosemite.

"Junior college leaders feel that students preparing for jobs in business and industry should be permitted an uninterrupted pursuit of their education," Dr. Blakely said.

Failure to grant postponements to these students will seriously jeopardize many curricula designed to meet the community needs for qualified leadership in business, industry, and other vital fields, the resolution stated.

#### **Enrollment Tops** Last Year's Peak

Fresno Junior College enrollment for the attendance period ending November 7 shows an increase of full time students of one, Harold Sanderson, in charge of attendance accounting, revealed this week.

Last year on November 7 full time students numbered 648; this year the total is 649.

"This increase might be considered small by many persons, Maurice Reetz, Dean of Instruction, said, "unless it is viewed in comparison with the nation wide trend toward smaller enrollments."

Reetz quoted a summary in the October issue of College and University Bulletin which stated that overall enrollment in colleges and universities has declined an average of 8 per cent.

Though locally the Korean situation is blamed for preventing many from enrolling in college, the publication states that a primary factor for the general decrease in enrollment can be attributed to the lower birthrates in the 1930's.

#### Vets' Widows, Children May Receive Educational **Benefits From State**

The State of California provides an educational assistance program for unmarried widows and children of veterans who died as the result of war services, Maurice Reetz, dean of instruction, announced today.

Eligible students are paid \$20 a month while attending high school and \$40 per month while enrolled in a school beyond the high school level.

Survivors must have lived in California five years before applying for assistance. It is not required that the veteran parent ever have been in California.

A copy of the application for enrollment form under this state plan is on file with the registrar, Mrs. Irene Stewart.

#### TEAM MAY GET California State **Vets Education** Plan Explained

The number of World War II jacket awards was made by the veterans who have received State assistance in completing their education has now passed 20,000 and is increasing rapidly, it is reported by D. J. Callaghan, Jr., California Director of Veterans Affairs.

> Callaghan said that while complete figures for Fall term enrollment under the State aid program had not been compiled, it was certain that it would exceed 5,500, as compared with 3,790 for the Fall term in 1949.

"The explanation is simple," ne added. "More and more studentveterans are exhausting their entitlement to Federal assistance under the GI Bill of Rights. They are turning to the 'Cal-Vet' program to complete their studies, usually in professional and graduate fields."

Eligible veterans may receive payment for tuition, books and supplies, plus a subsistence allowance of \$40 a month under the State program. The maximum expenditure for any one veteran is \$1,000.

State educational aid may be granted to a veteran who is a native of California or was a resident of this state at the time he entered military service, and who had at least 90 days of active duty





The Fresno Junior College Rams, in a two-fisted battle for the championship crown, defeated the Taft Junior College Cougars Friday night, 33-12.

Taft, the 1949 CCJC conference champions, fought bitterly to the very end to stop the Rams, but were forced to give


