Students Urged To Complete Spring Pre-Registration

To insure enrollment in the classes desired for the spring semester, students are urged by division chairmen to complete pre-registration with their faculty advisors before Friday, January 13.

Schedules of classes for the spring semester were made available this week through the Rampage distribution boxes.

Before enrolling for next semester each student currently attending the JC must complete a study list of courses he intends to take during the spring semester. This study list, when signed by the faculty advisor, shall be presented at registration time.

FILE A DUPLICATE

The student shall also file a duplicate copy of the study list agreement with his advisor.

Students who are uncertain as to the identity of their faculty advisor may secure this information from their division chairmen in N-12 or from Mrs. Doris Loughran, registrar, in the office.

"Pre-registration is held," according to Mr. Maurice Reetz, dean of instruction, "so that students may be assured of admittance to classes of their choice."

BETTER OPPORTUNITY

Pre-registration also gives division chairmen an opportunity to open additional sections of classes which show early large enrollments.

Faculty advisors will submit recapitulations of enrollments by classes and hours following the last day of pre-registration, January 13.

Pre-registration procedures outlined above apply to 12th graders as well as to 13th and 14th year students.

Appointments with faculty advisors should be made so that the students are assured of sufficient time to arrange their program.

Mr. Joe Woodman, auto shop instructor and co-sponsor of the Associated Men Students, declared today that there would be no AMS elections until the organization has made more definite plans.

Mr. Woodman reasoned that the students should have time to decide on what they want in their constitution, and since the group is still young, things would be better if elections were carried over to next June.

FINISH IN JUNE

"Students seeking offices should make definite plans to finish school in June," declared Mr. Woodman, "because of the difficulties that arise in the event of an office vacancy before that time."

The constitution will also be set up to govern the body of members and to provide for the election of officers. "Last year's council," remarked Mr. Woodman, "considering the newness of the officers and the fact they had no official constitution, carried through all right and did a fairly good job."

LACK OF INTEREST

Campuses Of High Schools Declared 'Out Of Bounds'

A warning to Junior College students to stay away from high school campuses during the school day was issued this week by high school officials. A more strict enforcement of the law which prohibits lingering near schools is to be practiced in the future.

The section dealing with loitering at school campuses follows:

"Every person who loiters about any school or public place at or near which children attend, is a vagrant, and is punishable by a fine of not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500) or by imprisonment in the county jail for not exceeding six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment."

Wine Analysis Students To Experiment With Valley Soil

Mr. Jim King, head of the science department, revealed that the wine chemistry students are working on soil analysis, the second phase of the class studies. The Industrial Analysis class is a part of the science department's offerings in terminal education.

The work is divided into three parts:

1. Testing of the sugar-acid ratio in the grape. In doing this, explained Mr. King, the student actually learns how to make the tests himself, and better learns the process of making other tests common in the wine industry.

2. Soil analysis, which includes various tests of the soil and fertilizer. Two methods of making the tests are the Lamotte color process which entails the process of using indicators or dyes which under certain conditions turn certain colors. These colors are then compared with a chart which reveals the density of the soil. The second method is the photo-metric system which measures the intensity of the light which passes through the soil. The Lamotte methods is a little faster than the photo-metric, according to Mr. King, but not quite as accurate.

3. Dairy analysis tests which include the routine tests on milk, cream, butter, and ice cream. These tests are made to determine butterfat and bacteria content.

Considerable work in this class next semester will be spent on the methods of inspecting and assaying gold and silver samples. The work will be conducted on a new assay balance purchased recently by the school. The balance will weigh as little as three cents worth of gold to a ton of ore.

The students in the class will also do a little metallurgical analysis which is commonly performed in a foundry or steel mill. The work will determine the chemical content of impurities in common metals such as cast iron, steel, brass, bronze, and aluminum.

The reward to the winner of the contest is to be a new Parker pen and pencil set.

Science Professor Tells About Wonders Of Physical Science

After the Rampage editor breezed in the other day and asked me if I would write a physics story for the Rampage, I began to wonder what you, as students, would be most interested in hearing about. It seems to me the most logical questions in your minds would be: what is physics, what does it do, why study physics?

The answers to all these questions would require much time and paper, but a few general statements should be worth a little thought.

Physical science includes chemistry, physics, astronomy, etc. The beginning of physical science probably had its origin with primitive man's experience with fires started by lightning. He learned that fire would keep him warm, cook his food, etc., but he knew not where fire came from. These phenomena must have seemed like miracles, indeed, and little wonder then that he established in his mind the existence of a "God of Fire."

REACHES HIGH LEVEL

Science in the form of astronomy and mathematics reached a high level of attainment in the ancient Greek civilization but scientific research died out about the time of the beginning of Christianity and was resumed only in the latter part of the sixteenth century.

The strides of progress since that date are tremendous and in the last sixty years are remarkable indeed. This means more when we realize that only sixty years ago such things as X-Rays, air-brakes, atom bombs, jet planes (or airplanes of any kind), automobiles, vacuum cleaners, pneumatic tires, and adding machines were unknown.

WHO'S RESPONSIBLE?

To say that physicists or chemists alone or jointly have been responsible for all these developments would be sheer folly, for one of the primary figures in atomic theory, Dr. Albert Einstein, is primarily known as a mathematician. But the fact remains that they have contributed a major share in the development of most of our modern developments.

A big question is, "has all this improved the lot of mankind?" We have developed automobiles which slaughter people at a rate in excess of that during the last war. We have radios which are used to broadcast quack remedies. We point with pride to the marvelous progress of the airplane, all the while ignoring the fact these developments have been spurred on by the military in preparation for defensive or offensive use in the event of another war.

ANSWERS QUESTIONS

Obviously progress is being made but we are not utilizing to the fullest possible extent all the possibilities at our doorstep today. These are questions which you as an individual must answer for yourself, to fit your own philosophy of life and its purpose. We all hope that science and religion jointly will lead civilization to a better understanding and appreciation of the potentialities of life.

One major purpose of physics is to offer scientific explanations for many things which at one time seemed a miracle or impossible. Even more basic and practical is the direct study of the workings of much of our commonplace machinery.

Physics offers much to the student who wants much from his study. It all "boils down" to about the same as any other subject. The student will receive as much or as little from the course as he invests in the form of work and study.

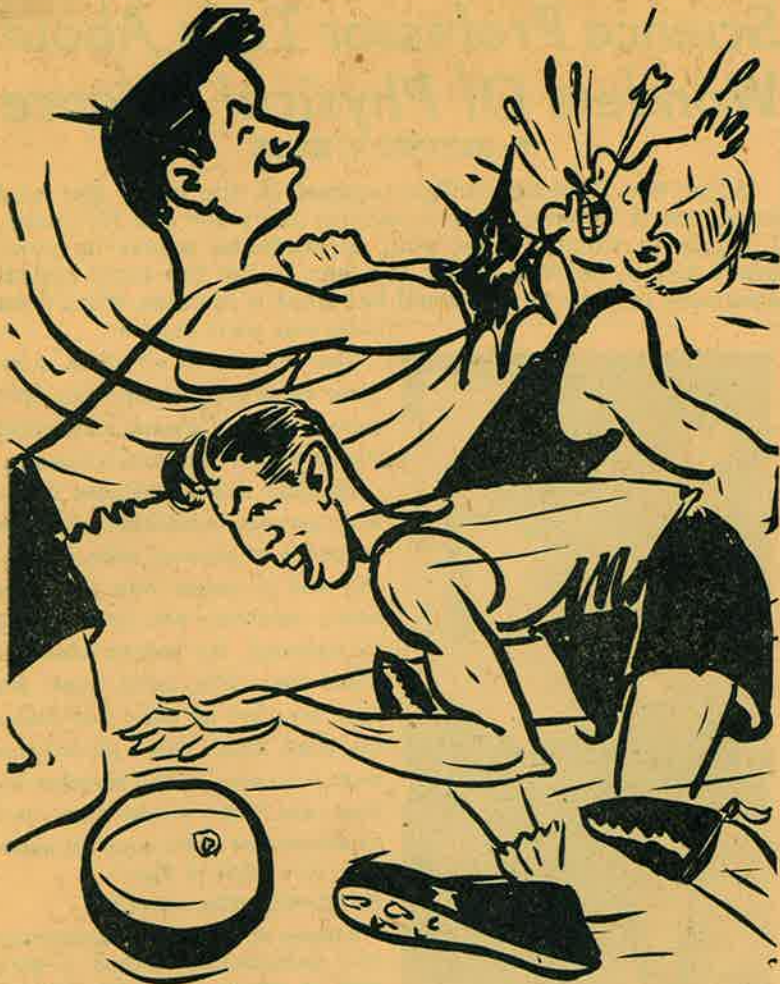

TODAY'S TILTS

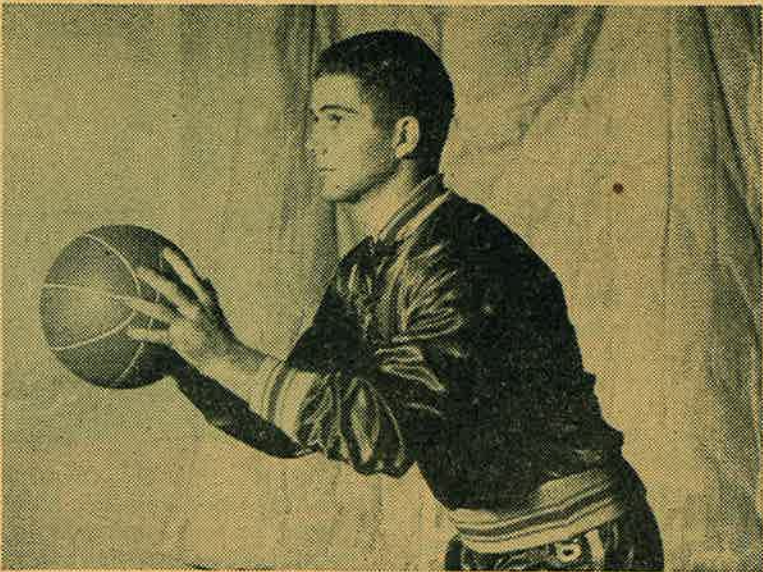
Today's games will pit the College of Sequoias against Napa, Reedley and Menlo, Pasadena and Yuba, and Long Beach and Placer.
