'Skyfodder' To Be Play Given By JC In Radio Contest

The Fresno Junior College radio production class will present "Skyfodder" in the sixth annual radio tournament on the Fresno State College campus tomorrow afternoon. The tournament is sponsored by the FSC speech department and Radio Station KFRE.

The Fresno Junior College entry copped first place in the junior college division last year and under the direction of Mr. Joe King will try to make a repeat performance and bring another cup to FJC. The other junior college entered in the tournament is Bakersfield. High schools from the entire San Joaquin Valley also will compete for honors today and tomorrow.

The runnersup in each division will have their show broadcasted Thursday and Friday evenings over KFRE. The winners will broadcast their show Saturday and Sunday evenings.

FJC ENTRY

Fresno's entry "Skyfodder" is a story of two business men and a pilot whose plane crashes in an equatorial jungle. The characters are bothered much by snakes, insects, and other jungle evils. The pilot, Rogers, a rough and tough, self-centered person is played by Bill Thomas. Maurice Fitzpatrick is featured in the role of Neal, a nervous wreck who is on the road to insanity, and Art Margosian plays the part of Drew, a patient and understanding business man.

Sound for the play is under the direction of Howard LuAllin and Leon Kasparian. Avis Chilingierian Ken Kafeyan, and Ray Bradley have prepared the sound effects for the production.

Nish Michelian will be the announcer.

COSTS ITEMIZED

If the student has no student body card for either semester, the charge is \$4.00.

If the student has one \$8.50 student body card, the additional charge is \$2.00.

If the student has both the fall and spring \$4.50 card, the additional charge is \$2.00.

If the student has one \$4.50 student body card, the charge is \$3.00.

Although the office will keep an accurate account of deposits made on the yearbooks, Rambler editor Louis Ingraham warned that students should retain their receipts.

GROUP PHOTOS SCHEDULED

Arrangements for group pictures of student committees and organizations are being made this week. Dates and times for the different photos will be released to committee chairmen and to club presidents who in turn will relay the information to members.

"Individuals in the group photos must be prompt," Ingraham warned, "as the schedule for taking pictures is crowded and delays because some individuals are late will not be tolerated."

Saturday night the Rams will be out for revenge when they travel to Reedley to meet the second place Reedley College Tigers.

Both the College of Sequoias and Reedley defeated the Rams in their first engagements. COS dumped the Rams 55 to 42 and Reedley edged the Fresno Junior College 59 to 53.

RAMS MUST WIN

The Rams have to win both games to keep in contention for the league title. The COS Giants must lose another game in order to enable the Rams to gain a first place tie.

Tomorrow's tilt should furnish much excitement for spectators. COS will be trying to maintain their unblemished record while the Rams, who beat the Giants last year when they were playing non-conference ball, will be fighting to knock the Giants off their throne.

Since losing to the Giants in the first round, the Rams have copped five games while losing only two. At present the Rams boast a four game winning streak. The addition of hustling Ernie Slade to the Ram roster should help the FJC cause much. Slade has played in six games massing a total of 49 points or an average of better than eight points a game. (Slade has not played a great deal in any of the games.)

HEAVIN LEADS

The Ram offense is led by flashy Lloyd Heavin who has compiled a fair average of 18.7 points a game, scoring 465 points in 25 tilts. Heavin leads the CCJC conference in individual scoring with 202 points in eight games for an average of 25.3 points a game.

Defensively Otis Harris, Joe Ybanez, and Warren Wright have come a long way and should give the Giants double trouble. "Gunner" Willie Perry, who has massed 230 points, is reckless with his two hand push shot.

COS features an eye-catching fast break on offense. In previous tilts the Giants have caught the opposition napping and snowed them under with quick consecutive baskets in the opening minutes of the game. By the time the op-

One factor which makes difficult the task of setting the budget is the seemingly, mystified actual amount of money the students have to work with. Next, the students getting the budget ready are not well enough informed on student body operations.

One thing which could help future plans for budgeting is having the same budget committee for a full year. One semester is needed to get students acquainted with the financial set-up of the school; the second semester gives the members a chance to actually put their knowledge to practical work.

Another solution would be to appoint students to the budget committee who have a generalized viewpoint on the actual necessities of the school.

Student council members take heed. Formulate a workable budget, a budget which will benefit all students, in the best manner. Make revisions where necessary, but get a suitable budget.

Among those talked to was Larry

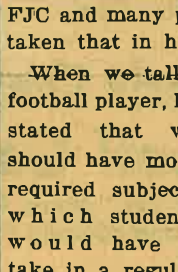


DeCarlo, former prexy, who said that he thought German, French, Anatomy, Survey of Western Culture, Quantitative Analysis, and zoology, should be

A large scale program to acquaint high school seniors from valley schools with educational opportunities at the Fresno Junior College began this week under the direction of Dean of Students Willa Marsh.

The first group of visiting seniors, from Riverdale High, toured classrooms at the JC Tuesday. They were informed of general college requirements by Dean of Instruction Maurice Reetz. Following the general meeting division chairmen conducted question and answer sessions.

LATON WILL VISIT

On Tuesday, February 28, Laton High School will send 27 seniors to the junior college for an afternoon session.

Scheduled visitations will be made through the spring semester and will include groups from Parlier, Tranquility, LeGrand, Clovis, Kerman, Fowler, Washington Union, Kingsburg, Central, and Hanford.

Also scheduled are assemblies to be given by JC students at Selma, Caruthers, Madera, and Central Union High Schools. Mr. Joe King and Mr. Lowell Spencer, of the faculty, are in charge of these assemblies which will feature student entertainment.

HELPERS WANTED

Student organizations have been called on to provide host groups for the visitations, Miss Marsh said, and JC students from the guest schools will be contacted to greet their former classmates.

To further enlighten high school graduates as to opportunities at the junior college, the Recruitment Committee, under Miss Marsh, is preparing a series of pamphlets on the different divisions of the school, and on student activities.

Tentative Budget Proposed At First Council Meeting

The athletic department of the Fresno Junior College was allotted \$2,340 as its share of the budget for the present semester as the student body council had an important meeting last Tuesday night, February 14 in the Ramble Inn.

The proposed budget for the semester was discussed and tentative figures were set for each individual activity. The budget is as follows:

Baseball	\$1,500.00
Basketball	440.00
Track	400.00
Yearbook	1,430.00
Entertainment	50.00
Oral Arts	48.00
Student Conferences	200.00
Ramblers' Day	150.00
Reserve	200.00

Student body card money amounts to \$4,070.88. If the budget were to stand as it is the student body would have a deficit of \$347.12.

The yearbook amount will have to come down due to signups for reserved editions for students who do not have student body cards. Entertainment pertains to the committees in charge of bringing high school students to FJC for enrollment next year. Refreshments and other incidentals are in the amount.

The state-wide conferences to be held by the various junior colleges necessitates FJC's entry in such activities. The \$200 total will take a drop, however.

The money allotted for "Ramblers' Day" will definitely be cut and expenses will be met by the AMS and AWS. On top of all activities allotted, the council decided to have a reserve of money left over if possible.

The council held a meeting this morning and made arrangements for necessary revision of the budget and the various committees.

Radio Studio Takes Shape While Class Prepares Play

Fresno Junior College, not to be outdone by other local colleges, has an organized radio speech class and is anticipating their production of "Skyfodder" in the FSC Radio Tourney Friday.

Under the direction of Mr. Joe King, speech instructor at the school, the class is now awaiting the completion of facilities for further advancements in this field. A plan has been submitted for the type of studio desired and after deliberation with chief engineers and technicians of local radio stations, a few minor changes have been made. Stated Mr. King, "Our principal objective is to avoid a studio which would be cubistic. The acoustics must be as near perfect as possible to secure a balanced production."

School authorities recognize that it is commendable to have organized a class of this kind in so short a time. Fresno Junior College further realizes that such programs will be of value not only for the experience given to the members of the class for future vocations, but also to extend publicity about the school.

The difference between actual stage plays and the radio productions is that in radio such things as voice control and sound effects have now become an integral part of the formula for success of the programs. In radio, these must be more distinct, in order to convey the full meaning of the plot to the listening audience.

Coach Paul Starr's hustling Rams knocked over the FSC Frosh, Porterville, and the Coalinga College Falcons on three consecutive nights last week. Flashy Ram forward Lloyd Heavin paced the Rams in the three tilts racking up 66 points.

In the first game the Rams came from behind to edge the Frosh 42 to 41. The win was the Fresno first in three games with the Bullpups this season. The Frosh had a 20 to 18 lead at halftime and the second half saw the two teams matching each other almost basket for basket.

FROSH LEAD

Johnny Chalfant, tricky Frosh forward, and Fred Bartels, former Fresno High star, came through with two quick buckets in the waning moments of the tilt to give the Bullpups a handsome 41 to 39 lead. With seconds to play scrappy Ram guard Willie Perry was fouled and countered a free throw to make the score 41 to 40.

The Frosh desperate to hold their lead started to play the Rams tight on defense and in doing so Heavin was fouled. Heavin missed both free throws but came back in a few seconds to play a hero's role by tanking a bucket just before the final buzzer sounded.

Heavin led the Ram scoring with 12 and Perry was close on his tail with nine. Ernie Slade, a newcomer, contributed eight to the FJC cause. Bartels, with 17 points, was high point man for the Frosh.

PORTERVILLE NEXT

The next night the Fresnoans moved on to Porterville and handed the Pirates a 67 to 55 beating. Again Heavin tanked 26 points to lead the FJC attack. Heavin also did some fine ballhandling, working the ball into center Otis Harris who potted 13 points.
