## Ram Baseballers Travel To Coast For Two Big Tilts

Two games are scheduled for the FJC baseballers this weekend, one of which is a league game. The squad will leave Friday morning for San Luis Obispo to encounter the San Luis Obispo JC and the Cal Poly Frosh. The games will be played Friday night and Saturday afternoon.

The Rams have thus far had a very successful season, especially in league games, with a three win no loss record, and are pointing toward a league championship.

Included in the list of victims to taste defeat at the hands of the Fresno team are the Visalia Cubs, a professional team in the California League, COS, and Bakersfield JC.

### POTENT BATS

The keynote in these recent triumphs is the surprisingly strong offensive power. In early season games, the team's hitting had been poor and haphazard. The Rams have not been paced by one or two men, but the whole team has produced hits when needed. A few instances have been outstanding, such as a 400 foot triple blasted to deep left center field with two men on base by Jerry Anderson in the seventh inning of a game played with the FSC Frosh to tie up a seemingly lost ball game, and a line single by LaVerne Hughes in a pinch hitting role with bases loaded against the Visalia Cubs to break a scoreless tie in the sixth inning.

### SPARK AFIELD

Coupled with the hitting is a good infield and a strong outfield. Unusually good plays have been turned in by Lou Silva in the outfield and Jerry Anderson in the infield. The double play combination also has started to function with five double plays in two weeks.

The Rams are now conceded to be one of the better Junior College teams of the state and if the past is any indication of the future, they will have the best record in the young history of the school.

### BROADCAST ON KFRE

The program will begin with interviews with students and instructors of industrial education, business education, and general education divisions. One student and one member of the faculty in each of the departments will answer various questions asked by the nar-

rators, Bill Thomas, and Jeanette Suglian, Marilyn McKim and Ken Kafeyan, interviewers. Harold Lehr is the program manager.

### GUEST SPEAKER

One of the interesting parts of the program will be a discussion by A. G. Wahlberg, who was an instructor at Fresno Junior College in 1910. The purpose of this portion of the program is to prepare a basis for comparison between the school as it is today and as it was then.

Erwin Dann, assistant superintendent of schools, will also be on hand as one of those to be questioned. Mr. Dann will explain to the listening audience the many values of a junior college education. The interviews with students will be conducted in the shops and classrooms of the school.

Between the interviews, the chorus of Fresno Junior College, directed by Mr. Lowell Spencer, will sing various selections.

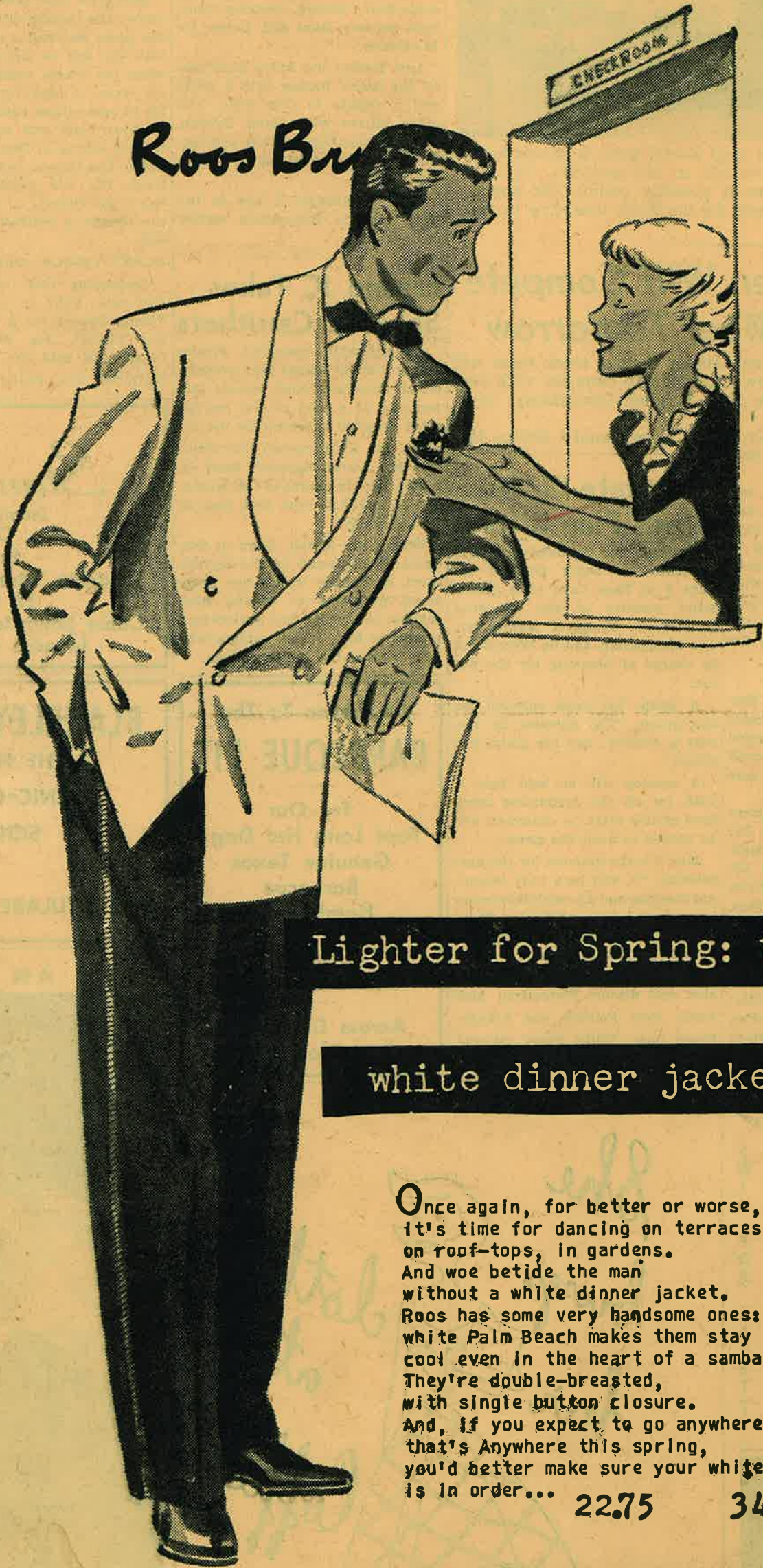
