## 1034 REGISTER HERE; 656 ARE DAY STUDENTS

Fresno Junior College's 1951 registration totalled 1034 yesterday with additional students enrolling daily.

The total includes 656 day students and 378 evening students in apprentice training and pre-employment trade classes.

Twenty FJC students are from outside California and more than 100 live in California communities other than Fresno. There are students from Iran, Finland, China, Hawaii, Mexico, and Japan. States represented include Vermont, Wisconsin, Kansas, Iowa, Georgia, and Alabama.

## Librarian Urges All Students To Sign Roll Every Hour

Howard Kaston, librarian, would like all students to please sign the library roll which will be passed around every hour.

Library hours are from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. It is open to all students and faculty members. Books and other library materials (except “reserve” items) may be checked out for two weeks, upon presentation of I.D. cards when signing for books. The library remains open for use and study during 12:00 noon-1 p.m. lunch hour.

“Reserve” books and magazines may be used in the library and checked out for overnight use at noon. But they must be returned to the library by 9 a.m. the next morning.

Newspapers regularly received by the library such as the Fresno Bee, San Francisco Chronicle, and Sunday's New York Times will be on display for student use.

Over 50 popular and technical magazines are taken by the library. All but current issues may be checked out.

A special table is now set up for encyclopedias and unabridged dictionaries. There is also a special rack for atlases and maps, gazetteers and pictorial folios.

## RADIO STATION KFJC IS ON THE (IMAGINARY) AIR

"Radio Station KFJC is on the air!"

That may be the call letters that may be broadcast on the Fresno air waves sometime this year through the facilities of one of the city's regular stations.

Fresno Junior College has a radio broadcasting "station" on the top floor in M-46. At the cost of some \$1800 a completely equipped sound booth has been built and it is adorned with red letters, "KFJC."

Joseph King, the instructor, said that all that is needed is to hook up the various parts of the equipment and "to plug them in."

The college, of course, will not try to broadcast independently since that would require licenses from the Federal Communications Commission, but the college "station" can be piped into a Fresno station and then "on the air."

The radio broadcasting class meets Tuesday and Thursday from 1 to 3 p.m. It is designed as Speech 40A. A year course, the class carries three-units credit per semester.

King said the course was designed to develop an appreciation of radio as an oral medium together with actual practice in the appreciation of oral techniques to the radio situation.

### General Van Fleet Writes Bradshaw

Expressing his gratitude for "all the wonderful support from the home front," General James A. Van Fleet, the American commander in the field in Korea, has written to Archie Bradshaw, Fresno JC dean of men.

Bradshaw was a lieutenant colonel during World War II and served under Van Fleet in 1934 as a lieutenant in San Diego.

The general wrote Bradshaw that "we have had two good fights with the Commies since my arrival and I am hoping he will give us the opportunity of a third round."

"I am of the opinion that he is hurting for peace but he certainly talks a big brand of bluff, insolence, arrogance and stubbornness at the peace talks. Perhaps what he needs is a little more relentless pressure by Eighth Army."

General Van Fleet is the commander of the Eighth Army.

## 1951 Crusade For Freedom Comes To Jaysee Campus

The Crusade for Freedom came to the FJC campus yesterday.

Orville Crane, chairman of the student committee conducting the campus campaign, spearheaded his group into 10 a.m. classes yesterday to collect donations for the 1951 crusade.

Crane was assisted in arrangements by O. D. Carter, faculty representative, and Miss Willa Marsh, dean of students.

The money raised in Fresno and elsewhere in the United States will be used to build a large radio station in Asia, to be part of the propaganda battle of democracy against communism.

Federal officials have designated September as "Crusade for Freedom" month. Fresno City School District is cooperating in the campaign, as it did last year, with representatives from Fresno Junior Chamber of Commerce.

## FJC Vocational Nursing Students Get Uniforms

Vocational nursing students enrolled at Fresno Junior College and Fresno hospitals will wear a gray pinafore uniform, including a white blouse, gray cap and white shoes and stockings. The standard uniform for vocational nursing students has been approved by the advisory committee, according to Miss Myrtle Rapp, secretary.

Miss Violet Eleazarian, one of the junior college instructors in vocational nursing, said a mental aptitude test will be given to each applicant and that a physician's health report will also be required.

In addition to subjects in related fields, FJC has scheduled eight vocational nursing courses, including related science, foods and nutrition, oral and written English, mental hygiene, ethics and personal hygiene, nursing procedures, clinical practices and home nursing. The college charges no tuition, but students are asked to buy a minimum amount of books and supplies, and nursing students will pay for their own uniforms.

Dr. Thomas Blakely announced that the college will still accept a limited number of late registrants in the vocational nursing program, since some of the applicants who had been accepted were unable to enroll in the curriculum.

### Dean Of Men Lists Lowdown On Draft

Archie Bradshaw, Fresno Junior College dean of men, reported that according to all available information there are no immediate plans by the armed forces to call up college men who are in the higher-grade bracket.

"While there is no guarantee that such status will continue indefinitely," Bradshaw said, "college men who are maintaining good grades will probably not be called to the service unless the war situation becomes suddenly more acute."

Selective Service policies are influenced by several factors, Bradshaw explained. He quoted Daniel Omer, general counsel for the nation's draft organization:

"Larger draft calls and fewer deferments for other draft eligibles are inevitable, and military manpower is the scarcest wartime commodity in the United States."

Omer said that the present rejection rate of men called to the service for physical and other reasons is about 60 per cent, which Omer considers "very high."

"It all boils down," Bradshaw said, "to the cold fact that there will be an urgent need for men in the armed forces. Fresno, not having war industry of any consequence, does not offer deferments in that line. The best bet is to stay in college and get the best grades possible."

Bradshaw also said that an announcement by the American Council on Education has helped clear the draft picture for college students. In a special statement to the council Mrs. Anna Rosenberg, assistant secretary of defense, said there is "no prospect or plan to abolish student deferment. It may be necessary, however, to decrease the number of student deferments next year (the fiscal year 1952-53)."

# FJC Goes Into Its 4th Year

Fresno Junior College began its fourth year since it re-establishment in 1948 September 12 after registration September 7 and 11.

English entrance examinations were given by Paul Mueller, English department chairman, September 4. Pre-registration and student counseling were also conducted that day and next.

Dr. Thomas A. Blakely, FJC president, met with his faculty for the first time this semester at 8 a.m. September 5. All faculty attended an institute at Fresno High School and Fresno Air Terminal September 6. Some faculty members were taken on plane rides over the city.

After classes began September 12 the first social activity was a dance September 14 in the south gymnasium. The "Howdie Doodie Hop" was arranged by members of the student council, headed by Ward Longueville, student body president, and Beatrice Ciesielska, vice-president. Clint Wheeler was master of ceremonies.

First assembly of the semester was held the morning of September 12. Speakers included Dean James M. Malloch, president of the Board of Education; Edwin C. Kratt, city superintendent of schools; Dr. Blakely, Longueville, Wheeler, and Hans Wiedenhofer, head football coach.

Dr. Blakely introduced new faculty members and Longueville introduced members of the student council. Vocal solos were sung by Shirley Williams and Austin Hill. They were accompanied by C. Lowell Spencer.

"The purpose of education is to make you good, and the purpose of vocational education is to make you good for something," Dean Malloch declared at the assembly.

Kratt welcomed FJC students and told them he was proud of their college. Dr. Blakely said he was optimistic for a very successful school year and urged students to support extracurricular activities. He also advised students to attempt to secure a broad training by avoiding over-specialization. He explained the various purposes of junior colleges.

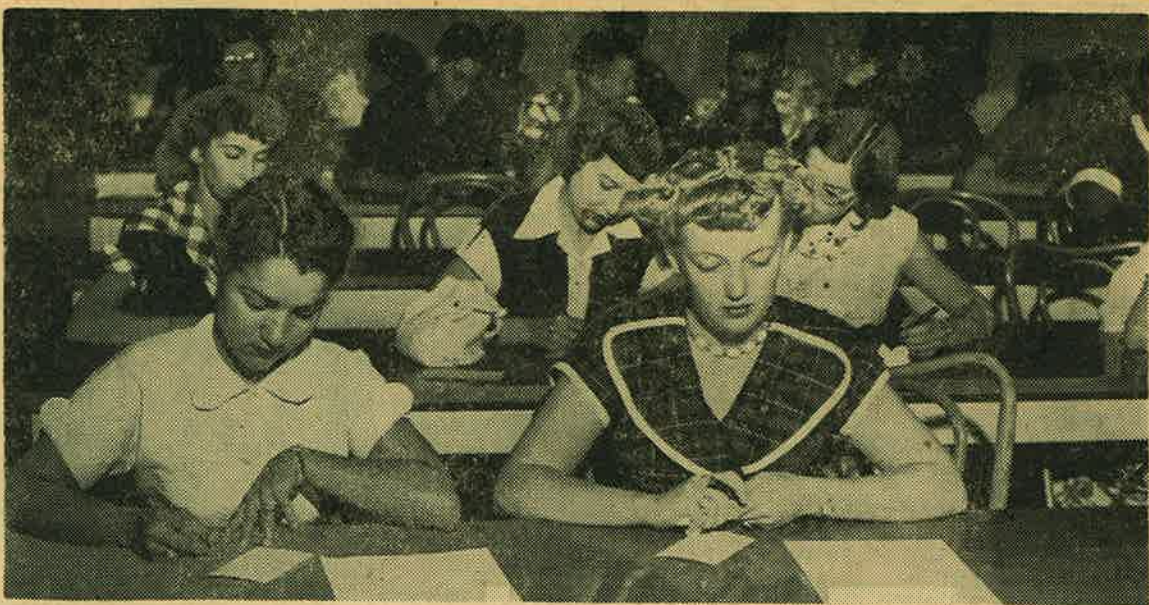
The assembly was arranged by Noel Frodsham and Mrs. Irma Flannery.

Hashem Ghusein, Francis Devian and Robert Happe. They signed the letter in English and in Hebrew. The letter was written in English.

Blakely has sent the students full information on Fresno Junior College and assured them they would be welcome as students here.
