RAMS CLASH WITH PIRATES

Yell Leaders, Pep Girls To Cheer FJC

Kickoff Time Set For 8 In Ratcliffe

The Rams, with an impressive victory over the Hartnell eleven, will clash on the Ratcliffe gridiron with a stubborn Porterville squad tonight at 8.

Being edged last week by the College of the Sequoias, 25-27, in a well-played game, the Porterville Pirates will be out to give the Rams a bad time. The Rams can expect a lot of trouble throughout the night from the Pirates.

The Porterville team, capable of exploding at any time and having a well-coached backfield, will be a tough squad to crack. Halfbacks Steve Gilwitz and Gary Hill and fullback George Rosales will be the big guns for the Pirates.

Gilwitz, having great potentialities in the backfield and being very agile, could and might ruin things for the Rams.

Still hampered by a few injuries, the Rams hope several of the injured men will be ready and in shape for the game tonight with Porterville. Having the sights set, Coach Han Wiedenhofer's squad is looking for win number four.

FJC TO START SIX-WEEK CLASSES IN BUSINESS

The Fresno Junior College will begin six-week classes in machine duplication and on voice-writing machines Monday, Ethel McCormack, chairman of the business education division, announced.

Miss McCormack said the classes will meet at 2 p.m. and end at 3.

They will convene daily, Monday through Friday, for six weeks.

Another course in operation of PBX boards is planned tentatively to begin the same day at 11 a.m., Miss McCormack said. It is also a six-weeks course which meets daily.

A similar class in filing will begin December 10, and another course on

the PBX boards is tentatively scheduled to start the same day.

Miss McCormack pointed out that her division offers particular educational opportunities to working people and other adults who want one or more specialized or refresher courses.

In addition to the six-week courses, the college provides many other business training classes which may be available for late registration during October, she announced.

Enrollment may still be made in beginning, intermediate or advanced typing; intermediate or advanced dictation, transcription, office training, business correspon-

dence, and English, machine calculation, machine bookkeeping, introduction to business, business mathematics, personal development for men or women, clerical training, filing, bookkeeping, vocabulary building, penmanship and spelling, and business arithmetic.

Part-time students may also register for refresher courses in such specialties as shorthand, typing, office machines, accounting and bookkeeping, business English, and penmanship and spelling.

Miss McCormack explained that the refresher courses are designed to accommodate employed men and women who desire to improve their skills, to qualify for new positions

at a higher salary level, or to prepare for civil service examinations.

Of the approximately 250 students enrolled in day classes in FJC's business division, more than 100 are over 21 years old. Miss McCormack said students who take refresher courses may concentrate on one subject several hours daily or may work on several courses simultaneously. Many employed office workers attend FJC classes during vacations to brush up on their scheduled abilities.

The college maintains an active placement program. Miss McCormack said there are always more jobs available than there are trained students to fill them.

Nominations for officers will be made from the floor. Charles Coffman, shop instructor, and Miss Ethel McCormack, head of the business division, are the class sponsors.

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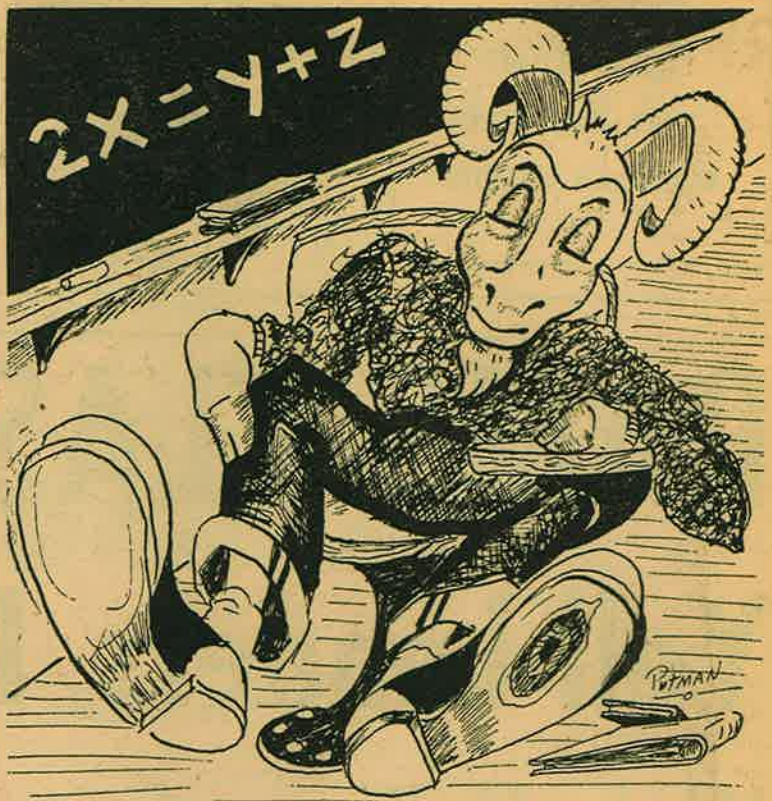

Library Gives All The Data To Students

Many students are unaware of most of the information to be found in the school library.

Your library is equipped to enable you to locate details on facts, persons, places, and things of almost every description and period. For instance, the library contains encyclopedias of many kinds, in addition to the basic Encyclopedia Britannica and Encyclopedia Americana. There are books for looking up authors, scientists, great leaders, people in the news, politicians, and many other famous personalities.

The library also contains reference material on "firsts" — that is, who was the "first" to invent something, or when was the "first" time this or that happened.

Statistics galore are provided by various manuals in the library, including such outstanding sources as the U.S. Statistical Abstract, World Almanac, Information Please Almanac, and the California Blue Book.

The key to all book materials in the library is the card catalogue. Basically, any book may be looked up in the card catalogue by three ways, namely: (a) If you know the author's name; (b) If you know the title of the book wanted; or (c) If you know the subject of the book, i.e., what the book is about.

Any student who is in doubt about the use of the card catalogue should not hesitate to call on the librarian, Howard Kaston, or his assistant, Miss Darlene Horch. They will do their best to help you.

Rams Down Hartnell JC In Salinas

FJC's Rams handed Hartnell College its worst licking, 32 to 0, Friday night in Salinas.

The Rams, burning from last week's loss to Menlo J.C., crushed and slashed the Panther's forward wall to shreds. FJC's eleven handed the Panthers their worst defeat this year. With fast charging and vicious tackling, the Rams kept the opposition off balance.

It took Coach Hans Wiedenhofer's squad 16 plays to score after it marched 62 yards down field, with Bob Williams capping the drive into the end zone. Williams missed the conversion.

Halftime score: Rams 6, Panthers, 0.

In the third quarter Winston Beasley scored on a 43-yard run around end. After his teammates spotted him 30 yards on a pass from Quarterback Bob Rodgers to Ram End Jerry Halvorsen, Williams tallied again by crashing through the Panther wall from the five-yard line.

Ronnie Chapanian added to the cause with a T.D. on a drive up the middle, with Bob Williams booting the extra point.

With good blocking by the Rams and agile speed, Beasley scored the last T.D. of the evening. Williams was smothered in his attempt to boot for the extra point.

Hartnell had a lone threat, reaching only FJC's 12-yard line. The Panthers were pretty much confined in their own territory.

Fresno JC made 20 first downs to eight for Hartnell College. FJC chalked up 438 yards from passing and rushing, while the Panthers made a net of 131 yards.

Hartnell had lost three close games before the game with the Rams. Taft Junior College defeated the Panthers, 27-26. Fresno plays Taft November 17 in the last game of the season.

Porterville Junior College's Panthers, who play the FJC Rams tonight in Ratcliffe Stadium, lost to the College of the Sequoias last week by a close score, 27-25.

The COS Giants had knocked off the tough Bakersfield College Renegades in an earlier game, and are considered one of the powerhouses of the valley.

Ram Coach Hans Wiedenhofer's comment on the COS-Porterville result:

"I was feeling good until I picked up the paper and saw where the College of the Sequoias nosed out Porterville Junior College, 27 to 25. We will play Porterville here Thursday night and it will be rough."

The coach's remarks were made Monday noon at Goodfellow's Grill, where he and other Fresno area coaches "put on the crying towel" every week in defense against Monday-morning quarterbacks.

The Visalia jaysee football squad

clashes with the Rams November 10 on COS's home field.

In the game with Porterville the COS squad won after a hard-fought, knockdown, "no-holds barred" fight.

The COS Giants clinched the ball game in the final minutes of the game, marching 65 yards on a drive climaxed by a one yard plunge by quarterback Harold Silvani of Visalia. Silvani then added the un-needed counter by kicking the conversion.

COS fullback Bob Line plunged over center from the one yard line to put the Giants ahead early in the first quarter. It ended an 80 yard drive, with Fran Weddle, halfback, and Lew Florence sparking the ground drive. Silvani's conversion was good.

George Rosales, Porterville fullback, skirted his right end for 10 yards to climax a 40 yard march to make it 7 to 6. Don State missed the conversion try.

moved further ahead when Silvani dashed 23 yards, untouched, through a big hole in the middle of the Pirates' line. Wally McFall's attempted placement was blocked, making the score 13 to 6.

Shortly after came the most spectacular play of the evening, Steve Gilwitz, Pirate right half, spun 53 yards for an equalizer behind the solid blocking of guard Paul Bergin and Phil Snow, a halfback. Stote made the kick and it was a 13 all ball game.

Just before the half Gilwitz scored again, plunging from the three after a Porterville march from the Sequoias' 31 yard line. Stote failed on the kick and the halftime score was Porterville 19, COS 13.

Minutes later, Duane Blackwell of Tulare, COS tackle, snatched the ball from Pirate quarterback Tony Prandini, attempting to pass, and rambled to the Porterville 21. Weddle and Silvani made it to the five in two plunges, and Line went the rest of the way to make it 19 all. Silvani's conversion put COS ahead, 20 to 19.

Porterville went to the fore again by recovering a COS fumble on the home club's 27. The Pirates drove over in four plays, with Rosales scoring. Stote missed again.

Next week the Rams tangle with Stockton College on the Ratcliffe Stadium turf. The game will be played Thursday night, October 25, at 8 p.m.

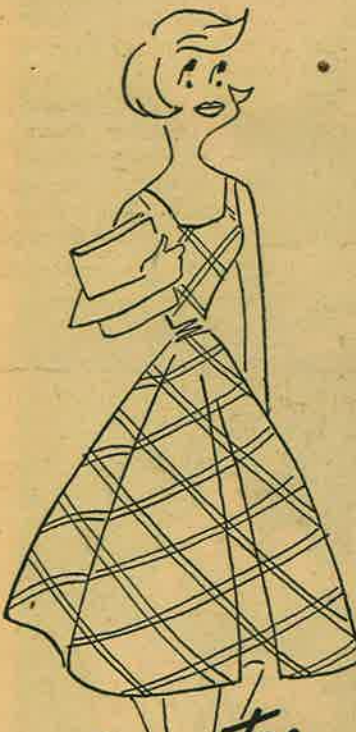
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Orientation Class Assists Students
