Fresno Bee Story Gets Fast Action

A testimony on the "drawing power" of a story in The Fresno Bee was made by Violet Eleazarian, vocational nursing instructor at the Fresno Junior College.

The Bee ran a six-paragraph story to report that the FJC vocational nursing class had adopted a new type uniform. The article mentioned that there were still openings in the program for more students.

Rams Beat Porterville JC

The Fresno Junior College Rams defeated the Porterville Junior College Pirates, 32-7, in

a hard-fought football game last Thursday night in Ratcliffe Stadium. The Rams and Pirates were in a nick and tuck battle in the early minutes of play. With

FJC receiving the opening kick-off, the game got under way. Winston Beasley fumbled the ball momentarily on the kick-off; this caused a little excite-

ment in the Rams' rooting section. Ronnie Chapanian plunged for six yards, only to be called back on a penalty. With three consecutive penalties and their backs to the wall, the Rams elected to boot.

With the ball on their own 40, the Rams started a drive which was never stopped until they hit pay dirt when quarterback Bob Rodgers scored on a bootleg play from the 18 yard line.

On the attempt for the extra point, Williams was stopped.

In the second quarter, defensive halfback Tom Crocker intercepted a Ram pass and went all the way. The Pirates conversion was good. They thus led momentarily in the second quarter.

On the kick-off the most spectacular play of the night game was executed when halfback Ward Longueville returned the ball for a T.D. to tally again for the Rams on a 95 yard sprint.

The Rams lashed out a ground attack that smothered the Pirates' forward wall, although the Porterville backfield was a constant threat to the Rams.

Gilwitz and Rosales were stopped effectively with a tricky defense set up by Coach Wiedenhoefer of the Rams. The FJC line, led by tackle Neville Crane and guard Kieth Tucker, aided by defensive halfbacks Halvorsen and Longueville, played a rugged game.

FJC Has 326 Veterans **Enrolled, Emmert Says**

Less than 30 per cent of the Fresno Junior College's 1150 students are veterans, Keith Emmert, veterans coordinator, said yesterday.

Emmert announced that the junior college has 326 veterans enrolled under the G.I. Bill and Public Law 16, the Rehabili-

school students, Emmert said, or less than 10 per cent of FJC's daytime registration. During the years immediately after the war the percentage was about 50.

Emmert said that 260 of the veterans were enrolled in evening class. the checks by December 7. es in the college's trade and industrial division, These include 80 in Three FJC Faculty Go To trade preparatory courses and 180 in the apprenticeship training program. FJC has no students enrolled under the California G.I. Bill.

The 66 day school veterans include 60 enrolled under the provisions of Public Law 346, the G.I. Bill, and only six under Public Law 16.
