Dr. Frank Thomas To Speak At CJCSCG Convention

The Fresno Junior College will be hosts to 500 student delegates and faculty advisers from 60 of California's junior colleges.

After registration Thursday afternoon, November 15, the three-day convention will begin that night with a welcoming banquet in the hotel's Empire and Palm rooms, when Thomas will speak.

500 COMING

Joseph King, the junior college's student council adviser, said that all of the expected 500 delegates would be lodged at the hotel during the conference.

Philip Olsen, student chairman of the conference's social committee, said the convention's social activities would be highlighted by a dance Friday evening, November 16, in the Empire room, with Lou Monte's orchestra providing the music.

Monterey Night Tilt Set For 8

The Fresno Junior College Rams will host the Monterey Peninsular College Lobos tomorrow night in Ratcliffe Stadium. The game starts at 8.

There is very little information on the invading Lobos. They will bring a pack of 35 strong and ready Lobos.

With four wins and two losses, the Monterey pack will be out to seek the Rams as their prey. The Lobos' four victories are over Washington JC, Taft JC, Marin JC, and Grant Tech.

Taft, one of the conference teams, was defeated by the Monterey Peninsular squad. It was an easy victory for the Lobos in downing the Taft eleven by a score of 25-6.

TWO DEFEATS

One of the losses was to another conference squad COS, which gave the Lobos a roughing-up in the practice tilt.

The other set-back was to the strong Menlo JC, which sent back the Rams with their only loss of the season so far this year. Monterey downed the Rams in a practice tilt last year.

Coach Hans Wiedenhofer figures the squad has been over the toughest part of the battle, but the Rams must continue to keep up the good work in order to come out on top. Wins over Taft and COS should bring the Rams another conference championship.

REVENGE SOUGHT

The Rams will be out for revenge as they lost to Monterey College last year on the Lobos' home ground. The Rams as yet have a home game to lose this year. To keep their home record clean, they must down Coach Jim Tidwell's Lobos.

Coach Tidwell has several good men in his squad. Leading the pack are Larry Segovia, 165-pound scoring threat; Dick Gargiulo, who played first string halfback on the Stanford frosh in '49; Tom Enea, extremely fast 100 yard dash man in the backfield; and some outstanding linemen.

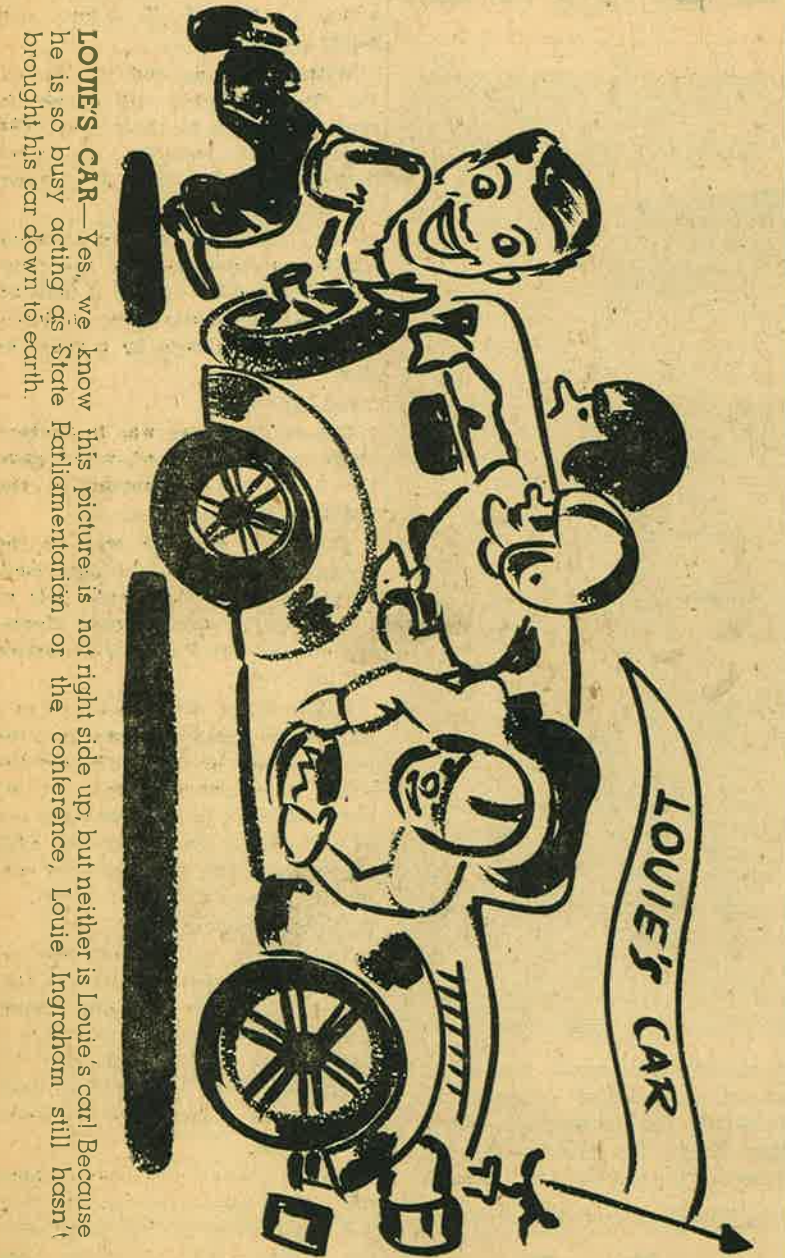
Mrs. Stewart To Go To Registrars' Conference

British Votes Gain Interest In History 20

The British election in England had its effect on Fresno Junior College students.

The History 20 class (Current Events), taught by Noel Frodsham, made various predictions on the Labor and Conservative parties of England.

Frodsham predicted the Conservatives would win by 20-40 seats in Parliament; Robert Dominci voted for Labor by 8-10 seats.

Jack Fiorentino favored the Conservatives by 30 seats, while Mrs. Thelma Andrews said 7-10 seats for the same party.

Marshall Colo picked the Conservatives by 20-30 seats, against Robert Hawkins' Labor majority of 8-10 seats. Sally Macias also voted for the Labor party by 8-10.

Joanne Pagnucci, another Conservative fan, took 8-10 seats; Robert Winston stated a Conservative win by 20-30 seats; and Ray Seiler also put 7-10 seats for the Conservative party.

The Conservative party actually won by an overall majority of 18 seats in the English Parliament, which is comparable to our Congress.

Rams Lick Mustangs 20 To 19

The Fresno Rams outlasted the Stockton Mustangs in a thrill-packed battle last Thursday night in Ratcliffe Stadium, to win, 20-19.

Going into the game, the Rams were a touchdown underdog. The 3,000 fans that were there witnessed one of the best games ever played in Ratcliffe Stadium.

In the battle of pigskin giants both teams played their hearts out. Neither squad refused to be beat; often the defensive became the offensive. Coach Hans Wiedenhofer's Rams were outweighed 10 pounds per man by the Mustangs, rated as the No. 1 junior college team in Northern California.

RAMS STEADY

The Ram eleven refused to fold under pressure. They pulled the game out of the fire by coming from behind and winning in the last few minutes of play.

Trailing 19-13 and having only six minutes to go, the Rams unleashed a ground attack which never stopped until they hit pay dirt.

It was an 89-yard drive which took five minutes and 14 plays and four series of downs. Quarterback Bob Rodgers called the plays; he slipped the ball to halfback Bob Williams, who crashed through the Mustangs' forward wall.

Williams tallied and followed with the much needed extra point as he booted the final point.

STOCKTON DEEP

The well-coached Stockton squad was deep in reserves which packed lots of the power that kept the Rams in trouble. Most of the first half was played between the 30 yard markers as bruising defensive action was featured.

Three minutes before the half Stockton's Tom Lacey recovered a Fresno JC fumble on the Ram 28 yard line, the major break of the game. Three plays later, halfback Roger Grantland plowed over from the eight yard line for the first Mustang counter.

Grantland scored all of the Stockton College points. Ace quarterback Veto Ramirez's passing was kept at a minimum as the fast and hard charging Rams repeatedly upset him on his attempts to pass.

The Rams got a break on one kickoff when Mustang back Don Hay fumbled and Ed Kilpatrick recovered for the Rams on the Stockton 22.

Paper Rushes Iranian News To Ali Moini

Ali Mohamad Moini, a student at Fresno JC, who is from Iran, reported that he keeps up-to-date on the condition of his country's oil dispute with Great Britain in the United Nations by reading a daily newspaper published in Tehran, capital of Iran, and flown to Persians all over the world.

Moini displayed copies of the newspaper printed in Arabic. He translated its name as Airmail News, and said that the five-day per week paper is published especially for Iranian foreign students in the United States, Europe and other continents. Moini also said it takes the newspaper, which is printed on tissue-thin paper for airmailing, four or five days to reach him.

Moini was able to find the complete text of Iran's Premier Mohammed Mossadegh's speech to the Security Council in New York only in the Airmail News, flown to him from Tehran, a few days after the speech was made.

The Iranian student, who is 25, said that since The Fresno Bee published an interview with him October 8 he has received numerous requests from service clubs and other organizations to explain Iran at their meetings. He has spoken to clubs in Fresno, Clovis, Selma,
