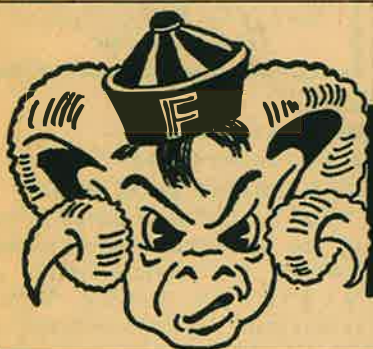

King Says 346 Make Reservations A Record

Fifty-four junior colleges have made reservations for student and faculty delegates to attend the California Junior College Student Government Conference today through Saturday at the Californian Hotel. Fresno Junior College is host.

Joe King, FJC student council adviser, said 346 individual reservations have been made, including 69 advisers, 250 students who will stay at the hotel and 24 other students who will commute between Fresno and Visalia and Reedley.

'Feeler' Sent To Rams About Bowl Contest

FJC's Rambling Rams may play in a post season game. Paul Starr, the athletic director, reported yesterday that FJC has received a "feeler" from the Vallejo 20-30 Club, which sponsors the annual Gold Dust Bowl. The game would be played December 1.

The club wanted to know if the Rams would be available if invited. Starr replied they would. Coach Hans Wiedenhoefler said the squad is in favor of playing a bowl game.

The Gold Dust Bowl annually features a leading Northern California team pitted against an out-of-state or Southern California jaycee eleven. Santa Rosa Junior College defeated San Diego JC last year in the post season tilt.

A caravan of decorated cars, led by Sam the Ram II, will meet at Fruit at Olive at 7 p.m. to parade through the main streets of Fresno.

"We have secured a public address system through Jack Shiefer, to be mounted on top of a car, which will tour the city from Friday noon through Friday evening and during the day Saturday — advertising the FJC-Taft game," rally committee chairman Ken Wright announced.

A police escort, then the public address car, and Sam the Ram II will lead the parade prior to the kickoff time.

Wright adds, "Let's talk this game up with your friends and get them all out to show the people of Fresno that old Fresno Junior College spirit!"

The eight pep girls and three cheer leaders will work jointly with members of the rally committee creating pep Barry Bergersen said.

Win Will Give FJC 2nd Title

The FJC Rams close a highly successful football season Saturday night in Ratcliffe Stadium as they play the potent Taft Junior College Cougars for the CCJC conference championship. The Rams are favored to win.

With the kickoff scheduled for 8 p.m., the struggle will be a repeat of last year's epic clash between the two teams, when the Rams slaughtered the West Side pigskinners, 33-12, to win the championship.

In 1949 the two schools also met for the championship, with Taft winning, 27-20.

TIE BREAKER

Saturday's game will be in the nature of a tie-breaker, then; Taft won in 1949 to grab the conference crown, which the Rams secured in 1950 by beating the Cougars.

Coach Hans Wiedenhoefler said his men are currently suffering "no injuries and I intend to keep it that way, without any more scrimmages." Taft has a 34-man traveling squad, only 15 of which went to Taft High School. Six are from Michigan, one is from Nevada, and 12 from other California towns. The Rams have won from Reedley, 26-0 (two quarters as part of the Football Carnival); Palomar, 47-0; Hartnell Salinas, 32-0; Porterville, 32-7; Monterey, 44-12; Stockton, 20-19; and College of the Sequoias, 33-13. The only loss was to Menlo JC, 14-18, after the Rams had two touchdowns called back.

TAFT'S RECORD

The Cougars can almost match the Rams' 7-1 record, with a 6-2 mark. They have lost only to Monterey, when plagued by injuries, 6-29, and to L. A. Harbor, 13-34. Wins by Taft were over Pierce, 34-19; Pt. Mugu Naval Base, 47-14; Hartnell, 27-26; L. A. Valley, 13-0; College of the Sequoias, 47-20; and Coalinga, 20-6.

Wiedenhoefler said Taft Coach Noah Curti was bringing a tough team to Fresno.

FJC Defeats COS 33-13 At Visalia

The FJC Rams rallied in the second half to swamp the College of the Sequoias Giants, 33-13, Saturday night at Visalia.

At the half, the score was tied, 13-13, after the Rams had scored two quick touchdowns in the first quarter to chalk up a 13-0 lead.

COS, aided by breaks and penalties, fought back in the second quarter to tie up the struggle, 13-13, at the half. The Rams held for downs on the two-yard line as the half ended.

In the second half the Giants could never put together a sustained drive, while the Rams blazed to two T.D.'s in the third quarter and one in the fourth.

FIRST SCORE

The Rams scored their first marker early in the game when Bob Williams took a handoff from Bob Rodgers and dashed 45 yards to score. Despite frequent penalties, the Rams scored again before the quarter ended on a pass down the middle from Rodgers to Jim Stout. Williams' made the conversion.

In the second quarter the Visalia college boys came to life, aided by highly questionable officiating. Lew Florence scored one touchdown; the conversion attempt by Harold Silvani was blocked by Ram guard Kieth Tucker. The score was then 13-6.

COS SCORES

Later in the second quarter Silvania looped a pass into Fresno's end zone. Francis Weddle made a spectacular catch to give COS a T.D. Silvania booted the conversion this time, and the half ended, 13-13.

The second half was all Ram — from the small mascot on the sidelines to the plunging of Williams, Ron Chapanian and company on the field. Chapanian set up a scoring chance by a knife-like dash to the five; then Williams took it over. Williams kicked the point to give FJC a 20-13 lead.

In the same quarter Chapanian scored another T.D. and Williams converted, to run the margin up to 27-13.

Midway in the fourth period the Rams took over on their own 49-yard line. With Winston Beasley and Chapanian doing most of the ground gaining. Williams finally took the ball over for his third touchdown of the night.

FJC's hard charging forward wall, though outweighed, turned the tie at halftime into a big victory by stopping the Giants all during the final half.

Tucker, Pete Belden, Stout, Jerry Halvorsen, and Orv Crane were standouts for FJC in the line.

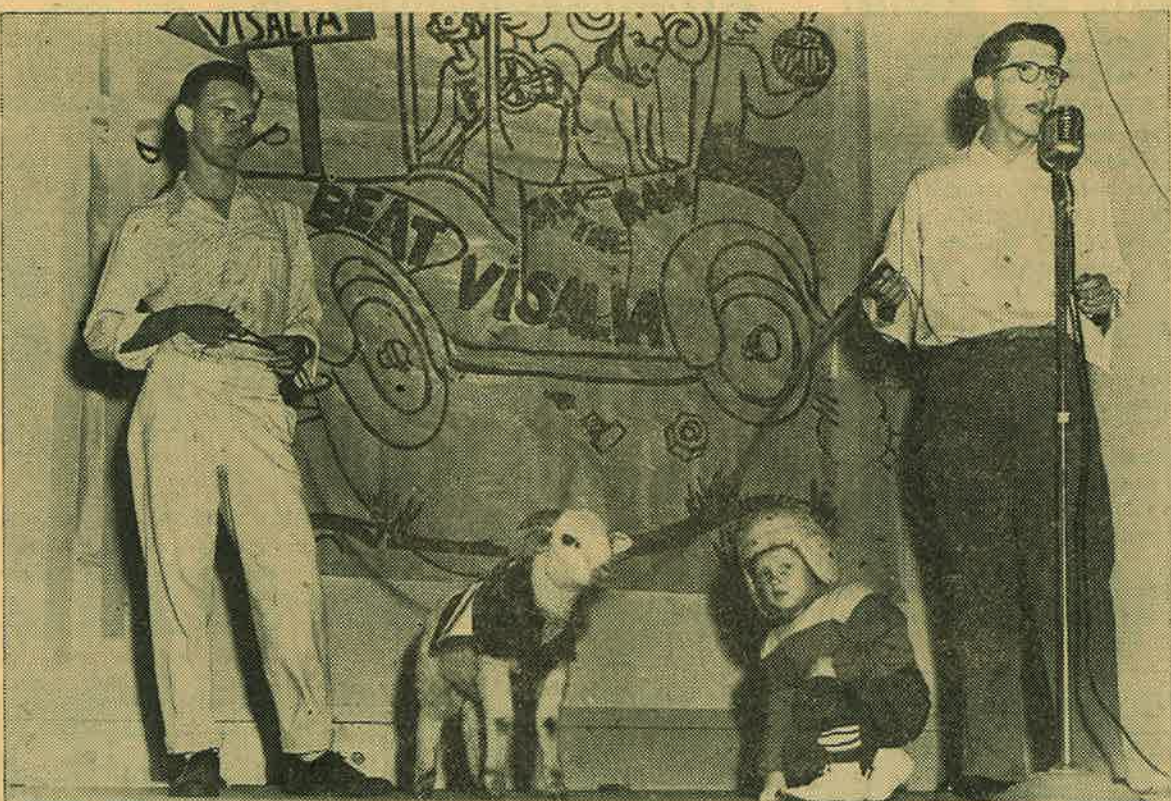
