Sophomores Learn How To Graduate

College officials have predicted FJC will have a larger graduating class, when the FJC holds its fourth annual commencement next June, since its re-establishment in 1948, than the 1951 record of 60.

The prediction was based on a list of 82 sophomores who were invited to a meeting yesterday. The officials explained the requirements for the associate of arts degree, to be conferred during the June, 1952 graduation.

A temporary class chairman was elected to appoint an election committee for spring semester organization. Student Body President Ward Longueville presided until the chairman was elected.

J. P. Collins and Miss Meriam Tervo, class advisers, with the assistance of Miss Willa Marsh, dean of students, made arrangements for the sophomore meeting.

The associate in arts degree is conferred on students who have completed 60 units of college work with at least a 1.0 grade point average, who have a major of at least 20 units in a specified field, and who meet other state law requirements, said Miss Marsh. At least 16 units must be earned in the FJC in order to establish academic residence for graduation.

Miss Tervo said the list of 82 prospective candidates for the degree is tentative and will be changed during the spring semester by the failure of some students to meet the requirements or by new enrollment of qualified transfer students.

Casaba Rally Set Tomorrow

FJC will turn from football to basketball tomorrow at 10:15 with a rally in the south gym. Ken Wright, rally chairman, has invited Ed Hennessey, Fresno entertainer, to be master of ceremonies.

Coach Paul Starr and his casaba squad will be on hand to explain why they think they can defeat the FSC JV's tomorrow night at 6:30 p.m. in the Roosevelt High gym.

Hennessey, who produced "Fortune Favors Fresno" last year, is bringing two entertainers from his troupe, including a singer and a pianist.

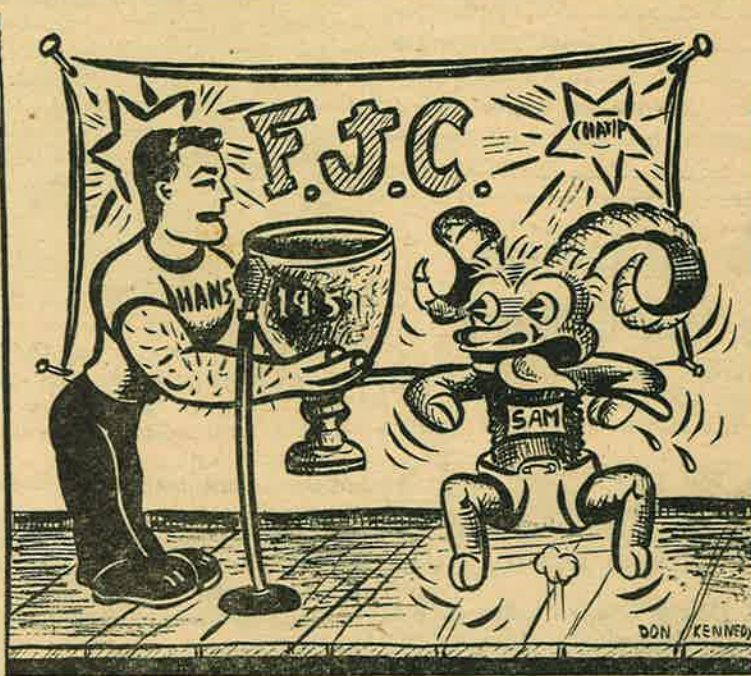

Blakely Explains To PTA Junior College Functions

Thomas A. Blakely, president of the Fresno Junior College, explained the functions of California junior colleges to the quarterly meeting of the Eleventh District Congress of Parents and Teachers Friday.

Blakely spoke at the afternoon general meeting at Roosevelt High School to 150 delegates from 114 associations in the district's four counties, Fresno, Madera, Merced and Mariposa.

The Fresno Junior College president was introduced by Mrs. T. E. Dunshee, the Eleventh District president. Arrangements for Blakely's address were made by Mrs. Eilef Rue, chairman of the district's parent education committee. Mrs. Dunshee and Mrs. Rue live in Fresno.

Mrs. Rue said the 150 delegates would make reports to the 27,039 members of the 114 associations of Blakely's explanation of the functions of the junior college in general and of the services provided by the Fresno Junior College in particular.

Blakely stressed the importance placed upon vocational or terminal education in the state's junior colleges. He told the PTA delegates that between 50 and 90 per cent of junior college students end their formal education in the junior college.

"Because of this fact, it is essential for the junior college to prepare its students for immediate entrance into employment when they leave the school or graduate," Blakely said.

The FJC president also explained the services of his school and other junior colleges in providing lower division training for students who plan to transfer to four-year colleges or universities.

"More and more of the training in the freshman and sophomore years is being done by the junior colleges," Blakely declared.

The FJC president told the PTA representatives that junior colleges, including FJC, are increasing their services to students in counseling and guidance fields.

Requel Cardenos will be in charge of the music. Miss Nancy Webster and Francis Svillch are the faculty advisers of the group.

Fresno Lions Club Presents \$500 Loan Aid Fund

The Fresno Lions Club today was to present Fresno Junior College officials with a check for \$500 as an initial grant for a FJC loan aid fund.

The presentation will be made to Thomas A. Blakely, FJC president, and Archie Bradshaw, dean of men, by Jack W. Hammel, Lions Club president, and Clarence Harris, chairman of the club's scholarship and student loan committee.

Other members of the committee are Erwin A. Dann, Paul Staniford, and Warren Tinkler.

Bradshaw, the chairman of the college's scholarship and student loan committee, said that the fund will be used to make loans up to \$50 to students who are unable to pay for their student body fees, books, and supplies.

"The loans will be given to help needy and worthy students enrolled in a full-time academic or vocational program of studies," Bradshaw said. "They must also have a good past record; our other criteria for loans will be need, objective and ability."

Other members of FJC's committee are Willa Marsh, dean of students, and James E. Welden, chairman of the trade and industrial division.

Bradshaw said applicants must have attended FJC one semester. Applications will be accepted two weeks before the start of each semester.

Election Procedures Start Soon

Fresno Junior College's student council will begin its spring semester election procedures Monday, announced Bea Ciesielska, chairman of the FJC election committee.

The prospective candidates for eight student body offices may apply between Monday and Friday. The committee will reconvene December 17 to approve or reject applications.

Miss Ciesielska said the approved list of candidates would be released December 18 in preparation for FJC's nominations assembly January 4, when the approved candidates will be introduced by Ward Longueville, student body president, and when Longueville will then accept additional nominations from the floor.

January 10 and 11 is the date set for the spring semester election. The committee decided balloting would be secret in booths to be established in one location in the main wing.

If a revote is necessary, it will be held January 15 and 16. The constitution of the FJC student body requires a majority of eligible votes for election.

President, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, and four representatives at large are the officers the students will vote for. The president appoints other student body officers.

Miss Ciesielska said prospective candidates would be required to secure eligibility slips from Mrs. Irene Stewart, FJC registrar, after December 9 and before December 15.

She explained the student body constitution requires that candidates for office present three qualifications:


- 1) Membership in the student body organization;
 - 2) Attendance at FJC for one semester, including the current one, except that candidates for president and vice-president must have attended two semesters;
 - 3) Candidates must be carrying at least 12 units with a "C" average.
- After the registrar certifies a candidate is eligible, the student will be required to secure 35 signatures of student body members on his petition for office. The completed petitions will be filed with Miss Ciesielska by the December 14 deadline.

Election committee members are Miss Ciesielska, chairman; Leonard Bartell, Barbara Daniels, and James Price. Advisers are Willa Marsh, dean of students and two instructors, Noel Frodsham and Floyd Quick.

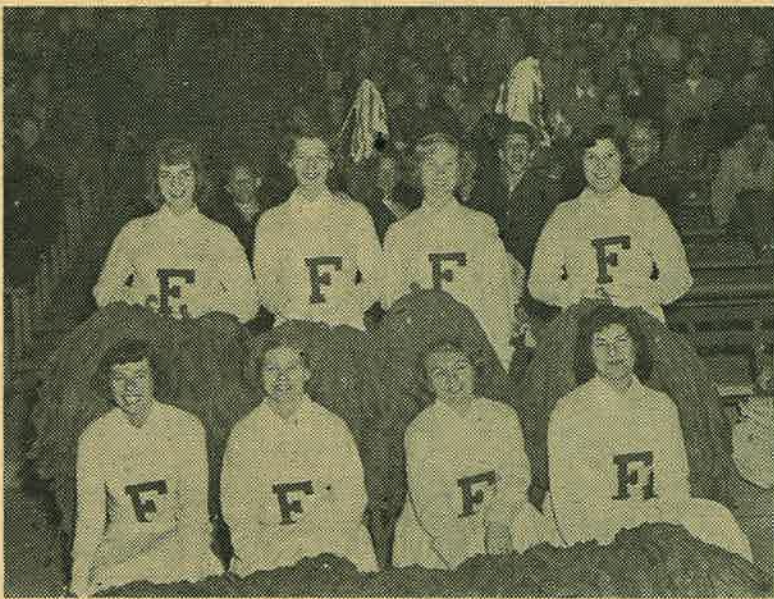
Basketball Squad Starts Season Friday

Rally Men Help Navy Cadet Team

FJC's rally committee turned from "whooping it up" for the football team to stimulating FJC's interest in the war emergency yesterday.

Ken Wright, the chairman, said his committee assisted a United States Navy aviation cadet recruiting team here at FJC. The team, which came from the U.S. Naval Air Station in Oakland, may also be present during the day today.

Wright said the committee set up a booth for the navy recruiters in the hall outside the student body office in the basement of the main wing. The team was interested in interviewing sophomores or other men who have completed 60 semester units in any accredited college.

Joe King is the rally committee adviser. He and Archie Bradshaw, dean of men, assisted in making the arrangements.

New Business Courses Will Begin On Monday

Ethel McCormack, chairman of the business education division, recently announced the Fresno Junior College would begin six week classes in filing and in the operation of PBX board Monday.

Miss McCormack also stated the college will also offer two other six week courses in advanced machine duplication and in voice writing machines, which will begin Monday on a "by arrangement" basis.

Miss Nancy Webster will be the instructor for the four new courses. Miss Webster announced she will teach the six week courses several times during the spring term when the second semester of the FJC will begin in February. She will also begin a new semester course in advanced duplication.

The filing, PBX, voice writing and duplication courses which begin Monday will meet daily for one hour and will each provide one unit of college credit.

Full information may be secured from Miss McCormack, whose office is on the first floor of the north wing of the FJC building, and from Miss Webster in Room N-34.

Miss Webster stated the college plans to install a new master switchboard for the PBX class. It will have eight student phones and one for the instructor. Other equipment includes two other switchboards and 12 practice boards for simultaneous practice.

"At the outset most students in the class do not know what 'PBX means,'" stated Miss Webster. "The initials stand for 'private branch exchange'."

Miss Webster announced the college provides three different types of duplicating machines for students to become proficient with, including the mimeograph, ditto machines and standard duplicators. The advanced students also learn to work with mimeoscopes and styluses, which reproduce hand writing and drawings. Miss Webster said its full description includes the following:
