## Radio Class Will Aid In Actual Local Broadcasts

Working in local radio stations will soon be possible for students enrolled in Principles of Radio Broadcasting. One local station has already pledged its cooperation by offering the opportunity of two hours a week work in the station as a part of regular class work.

Any student who shows promise in radio work may get his practical background while he is learning. The radio stations have furnished materials they use in broadcasting for use in class rooms. The materials include logs, sample transcriptions, commercials, and teletype copy.

Students may still enroll in the radio course. It is a three unit course offered from 2 to 4 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays. There will be one hour of lecture and three hours of radio lab a week.

Cooperation of the local stations has been invaluable to Fresno Junior College, said radio instructor Joe King. Station managers and technicians of KYNO, KMJ, KFRE, and KARM form the department's advisory board. They helped determine what equipment would be necessary for the radio room recently completed in M46.

Equipment is now being installed by Louis Kozub's radio class. A transcription library rack and tables for the turntable and monitor are now being constructed.

"I want the AMS to have more activities and larger membership. In other words, I want this to be a better school," said Jim Telegan.

## Cal-Vet Program Gives Assistance To 6000 Students

The State of California assisted 5,945 World War II veterans to further their college-level education during the past fall term, an increase of 57 per cent over the same period in 1949.

A total of \$1,469,855 was expended by the Department of Veterans Affairs during the fall quarter and semester under its educational assistance program for ex-servicemen.

The increase in the "Cal-Vet" education roster is directly due to the steadily growing number of veterans who have exhausted their entitlement to the educational benefits of the GI Bill of Rights before completing their courses, D. V. Callaghan, State Director of Veterans Affairs, said.

Since the enactment of the California Veterans Educational Institute program in 1943, more than 21,000 ex-servicemen have received state financial assistance in attaining their educational goals.

Benefits are in the form of payment for tuition and fees, books and supplies, and a \$40 monthly subsistence allowance. The maximum expenditure in behalf of any one student is \$1,000.

Veterans eligible for state educational assistance are those who were born in California or who were residents of this state at the time of entry into military service; and who served at least 90 days in the armed forces prior to January 1, 1947.

FJC President Dr. Thomas Blakely will preside at a general meeting at 1 in M36. Student Body President John Mullins will welcome the 107 students and three faculty members.

Dr. Blakely and Maurice Reetz, Dean of Education, will speak to the group, and division chairmen will be introduced. Chairmen will conduct discussion groups, and students will visit classes throughout the building.

Members of the Future Business Leaders of America will conduct groups of students on their tour of the classrooms, and teachers will remain in their rooms to explain the work done there.

Student Council members will be hosts to the students in the Ramble Inn following visits to classes.

## Council Undecided On Spring Budget

One special and one regular meeting of the student council and a special budget meeting have failed so far to produce a spring budget for the Associated Student Body.

At a special meeting of the student council on February 12, Treasurer Louis Ingraham reported that the student body was \$102 short of funds to meet appropriations made by that date.

The budget was discussed and its adoption recommended at a special meeting on February 20 in the social room. Student council members present said they would present it at the next regular meeting of the council.

Strong support for athletics developed at the regular meeting of the council, and the budget was not approved — partly because of proposed cuts in appropriations for athletics and partly because members felt they should have more information and further time to consider it.

## Purse Stolen From Show Case In FJC Main Hall

A green and brown leather purse was stolen from the Adult Education show case in the main hall sometime between 5 and 7 p.m. on Monday, February 26.

The purse was handmade by Fidencio Frutos, a patient in the tuberculosis ward of the County Hospital. Since the patient was able to work on the purse only an hour or two each day, he spent a great deal of time on it. The price of the purse was \$22.50.

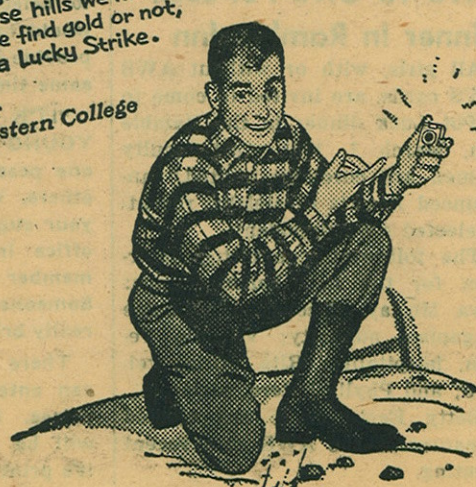

## Sighs With Si

Fresno Junior Colleges second CCJC basketball conference is drawing to a dramatic climax this week as the FJC Rams visit the Taft Junior College Cougars tomorrow night in the final conference game of the 50-51 season.

Last season, which was Fresno's first year of participation in the CCJC Conference, the Rams ended up with a six-win and four-loss record and held third place in the CCJC standings.

In comparing this season with last year's three differences stand out. For one thing, Coach Paul Starr started off the 50-51 season with only one returning letterman on his squad and the pre-season outlook showed only vague chances of a successful season for the Rams. But despite a discouraging pre-conference practice record of four wins and eight losses, Paul Starr guided the spirited Fresnans through the first half of conference play with a startling four-win and one-loss record and a first place tie with the much-favored College of Sequoias Giants.

Another outstanding performance, credited to the 50-51 Rams, is their claim to be the only league college to hold a win over the traditional powerful COS Giants in the last five years.

The third difference in season comparison is FJC's second place league standing compared to last season's number three spot. The second place standing is already cinched for the Rams, but, if the Fresnans lose to Taft tomorrow night, Reedley will move up to a second place tie with Fresno.

## Dressmaking And Interior Decorating Class Starts

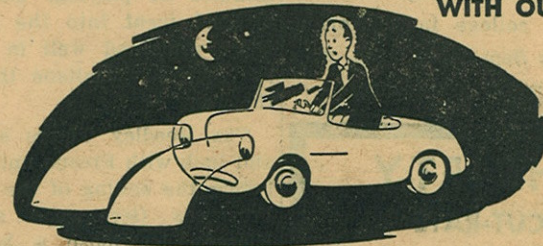

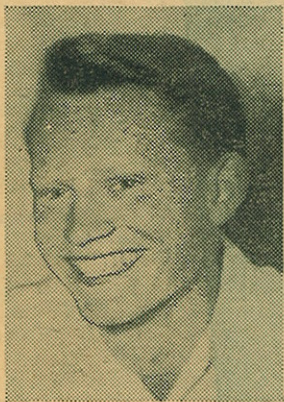

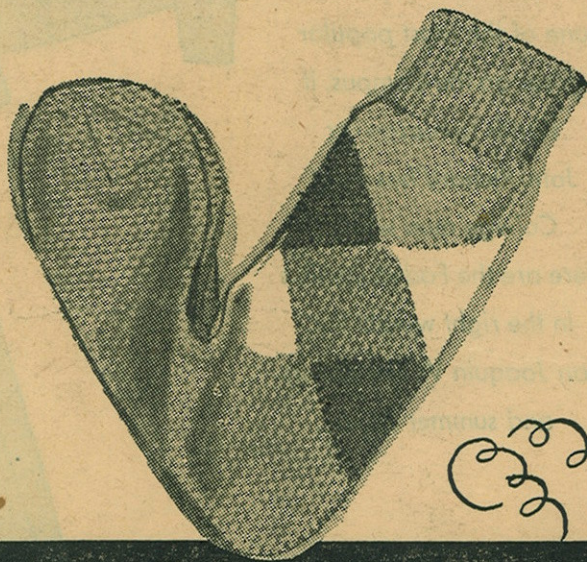
AMS PRESIDENT

I realize the importance of this office, President of the AMS, and if you back me, I'll back you.



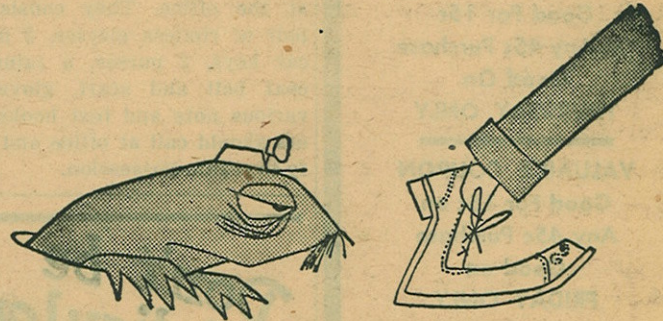

# Rams Meet Taft In Last Tilt, Need Win To Break Tie

The Fresno Junior College Rams will play their final basketball game of the season tomorrow night when they visit the Taft Junior College Cougars.

Two important factors will be decided from this game. One being that if Fresno comes through with a victory, the Rams will then hold undisputed possession of second place in league standings. A loss will put Fresno in a deadlock with Reedley JC for the number two spot.

Another factor to be decided in tomorrow night's game is who will be the high scorer in league play. Present standings show Don Davis of Fresno in the lead with 183 points and Ken Buck of Taft right behind with a 181 point total. Both players are capable high scorers and a real race is expected.

FJC had to come from behind to overpower Taft in their first duel. Fresno took that one 74-67, but the taller Cougars can be expected to give the battling Rams plenty of trouble tomorrow night.

Fresno Junior College was the first junior college in California. It opened in September, 1910, with an enrollment of 19 students.

# Rams Lose Pair; Drop To 2nd Place

The Fresno Junior College Rams saw their championship hopes slip away into infinity last weekend after losing to the College of Sequoias' Giants last Friday night and to the Reedley Junior College Tigers Saturday.

The Rams began weekend play with a six-win and one-loss record and also held a first place tie with COS for the Central California Junior College Basketball Championship. But, in Friday night's tilt, the Giants, playing on their own court and backed by a capacity crowd of Visalia fans, let loose a revengeful attack of outstanding ball playing and blackened the Fresno title hopes by running up a marginal score of 83-57.

Saturday night the visiting Reedley Tigers moved into a second place tie with FJC by outscoring the despondent Rams, 76-68.
