## Student Council Members Attend COS Conference

Student representatives from Fresno Junior College will conduct a section meeting on the present draft law and its effect on junior college students tomorrow at College of Sequoias in Visalia, where the Central California Junior College conference is being held.

Purpose of the regional conference is to draft plans and suggestions for the state conference to be held in Long Beach in May.

Eight students and one faculty member are attending the student government conference to represent FJC.

Student officers attending are John Mullins, student body president; Joe Spino, vice-president; Rowena Campbell, secretary; Louis Ingraham, treasurer; Ward Longueville and Sid Wilson, representatives at large; Beatriz Ciesielska, AWS president; and Jim Telegan, AMS president. Joe King is the faculty advisor.

Section meetings will be followed by dinner tomorrow night in the Mirror Room at the Hotel Johnson and a dance at the COS gym.

Saturday morning representatives will have breakfast at the Wagon Wheel and attend more section meetings and a general assembly. Luncheon in the college cafeteria will close the conference.

## FSC Offers 150 Scholarships To Valley Students

Approximately 150 scholarships to Fresno State College will be offered to outstanding high school and junior college graduates, and to students presently enrolled at FSC, for the 1951-1952 school year.

Scholarships are awarded on a competitive basis with consideration given to scholastic attainment, financial need, character, and promise. Purpose of these scholarships is to enable students with ability and sincere purpose, but with limited means, to secure a college education.

Special scholarships have been set up for students in specialized fields of home economics, agriculture, speech, athletics, music, medicine, criminology, journalism, science and elementary school teaching.

Other scholarships open are awarded with preference to students according to race or place of graduation, with many San Joaquin high schools specifically mentioned.

Interested FJC students should contact Miss Willa Marsh, Dean of Students, for scholarship application forms and procedure. Applications must be made not later than May 1, 1951, for the academic year beginning in the fall semester. Miss Marsh should be contacted well in advance of that date, in order that all applications may be received at the state college before then.

## College Military Training Is Goal Of AAJC Heads

"Junior colleges all over the nation are endeavoring to provide new facilities and expand existing ones," reported Fresno Junior College President Dr. Thomas Blakely upon his return Monday from a meeting of the American Association of Junior Colleges held in Des Moines, Iowa.

"Since Universal Military Training seems to be a necessity," he continued, "junior colleges are promoting legislation which would enable young men to render military service while attending college."

Resolutions approved by the Association will be presented to joint committees of Congress when they consider draft bills now in the Senate and House.

Emphasis is being placed on making junior colleges eligible for ROTC units in all branches of the armed forces. In an address to the assembled junior college directors, Dr. Eugene Chaffee, President of the AAJC, cited several reasons why he believes education and military training should be combined.

One reason, according to Dr. Chaffee, is that colleges can provide trained instructors because there are instructors in the colleges who have had military service in World War II. Conducting military training in conjunction with college education would make available to the armed forces in addition to the services of trained instructors, the use of present physical facilities and use of efficiently functioning organizations.

An added reason for providing education and military training at the same time is that it would eliminate at least a part of the expense to the government of paying for education of servicemen after military service.

## Faculty Enroll In First Aid Course

Fresno Junior College faculty members are enrolled or planning to enroll in courses in First Aid now being taught at FJC. The first group started their instruction Tuesday, March 13. Classes are held from 3-5 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays. Mrs. Hilda Martin, Red Cross instructor, is conducting the classes.

Two other sections will be organized later in the semester to offer the course to the remainder of the faculty. One will be held from 4-6 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays; the other will be open 7:15-9 p.m. Mondays and Wednesdays.

### 'AA' CANDIDATES TO GRADUATE JUNE 7

AA degree candidates at a noon meeting yesterday decided to hold the June 7 Graduation ceremony in front of the FJC building next to the administration office and near the north wing. Graduates will wear white caps and gowns with red and white tassels.

In the words of central committee chairman Louis Ingraham, "The committee for restoring order is a very important one, because persons on this committee will have charge of 'operation clean-up' on Saturday morning following the carnival." ## Congress Works On Draft; House, Senate Differ

Draft bills now under consideration by Congress differ in some particulars, but both agree on one point important to college students. Both provide for deferral of regularly enrolled college students until the end of the current school year; both will allow deferred students to choose the branch of service they wish to join.

Differences in the bill concern drafting of 18 year olds. The Senate bill calls for the draft of 18 year olds but makes provisions for calling all available 19-25 men before any younger men are called. The House bill specifically excludes all men under 19. Both provide for civilian control of the draft.

Present draft laws now allow students to obtain deferments until the end of the year, according to press releases from Washington. Deferred students may also choose any branch of service when the deferral has expired.

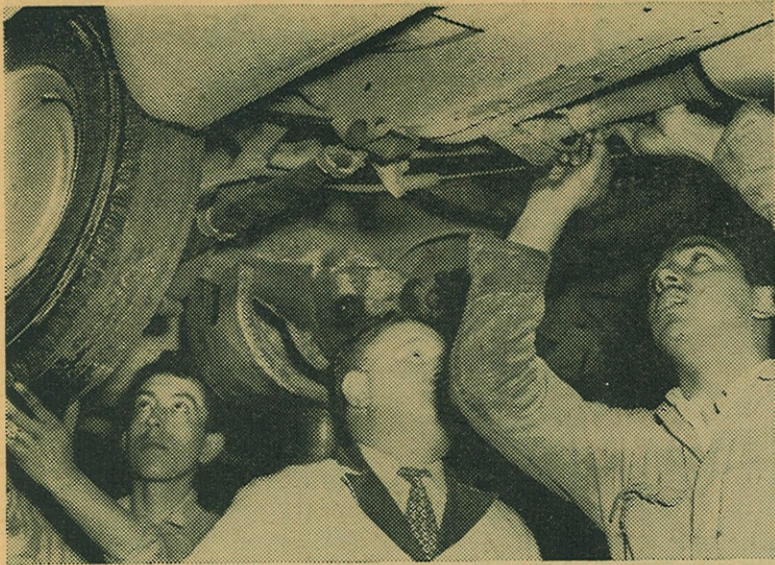

## Specialized Training In Auto Mechanics Offered At FJC

The Fresno Junior College offers specialized training to the men of Central California in modern America's largest business, the automobile industry. Classes in automobile mechanics are open to those people who are now attending high school, junior college, and to people who are working in the trade, which includes both apprentices and journeymen.

"The opportunities in this vast and far reaching industry are unlimited, and the person who is preparing himself for a vocation in this field is taking a step in the right direction," says Mr. Joe B. Woodman, head instructor of the Fresno J. C. auto shop.

In a recent interview, Mr. Woodman said, "Have you ever stopped to think what would happen if there was no one to repair the motor vehicles in and around Fresno? The mail would not be delivered, nor would the bread; and the groceries, meat, and farm produce could not be taken to places of market. These few examples stress the fact that our everyday life is built around the motor vehicle."

Seventy-five students are enrolled in the regular day classes which are held from 8 to 11 and 1 to 4 daily. Thirty-five people are currently enrolled in the night classes, and eighty apprentices meet one night a week for four hours.

Says Mr. Woodman, "The fields in which the men are instructed include bus mechanics, auto mechanics, heavy duty mechanics, auto parts and accessory salesmanship; also, specialty mechanics, such as test and diagnostic, tune-up technicians, carburetor and electrical, transmission, and many other interrelated fields which require special training."

On Mondays the classes receive three hours of related instruction, such as lectures, demonstrations, and movies. During the two year course students are required to cover five text books, which deal extensively with the finer technical aspects of the trade.

This should reveal the fact that the field of auto mechanics is extremely specialized and highly competitive. It is no longer a haven

for the unqualified person who wants to pick up a quick dollar.

Over forty graduated students were placed last year, and latest reports indicate that these former students are doing a job which would be a credit to any institution.

It requires at least four people to maintain each automobile from the time it leaves the show room, until it finally reaches the junk pile. There is a bright future for anyone planning a career in the automotive field.

Mr. Woodman was graduated from the Fresno Technical High School in 1930. He was employed with H. E. Jaynes & Son for ten years, and during the last war he was an aircraft electrician at Hammer Field. He attended summer sessions at the University of California for four years.

### Ex-FJC Pitcher, Bob Hill Plays Baseball For Army

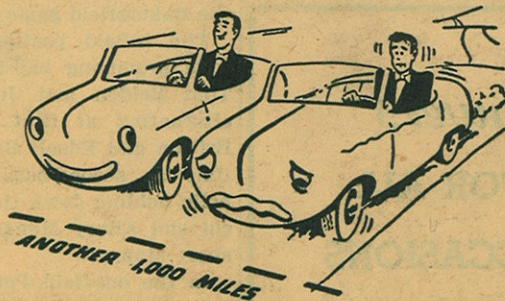
Bob Hill, former FJC student leader and athlete, is now serving with the USAAF and is stationed at Keesler Field, Biloxi, Miss.

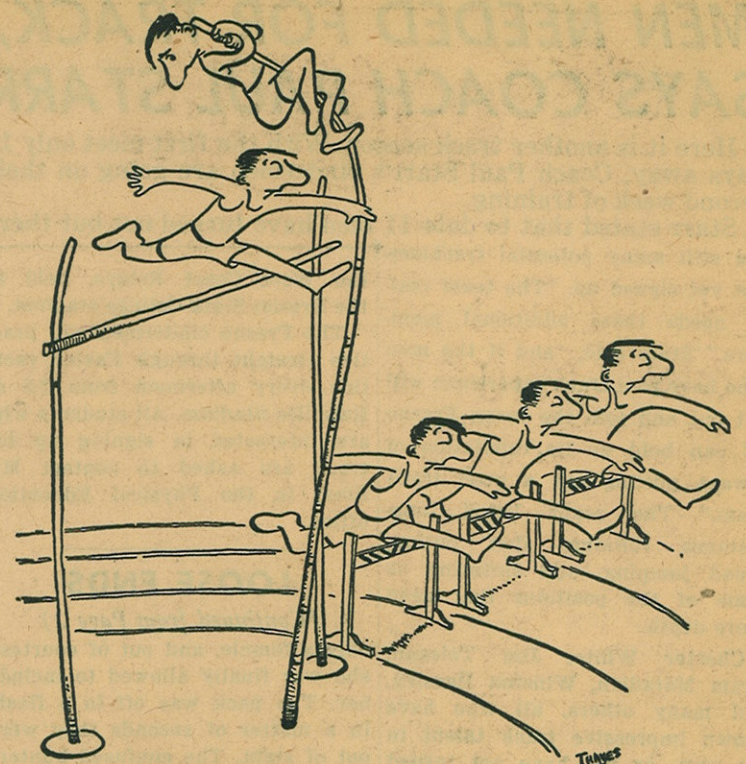

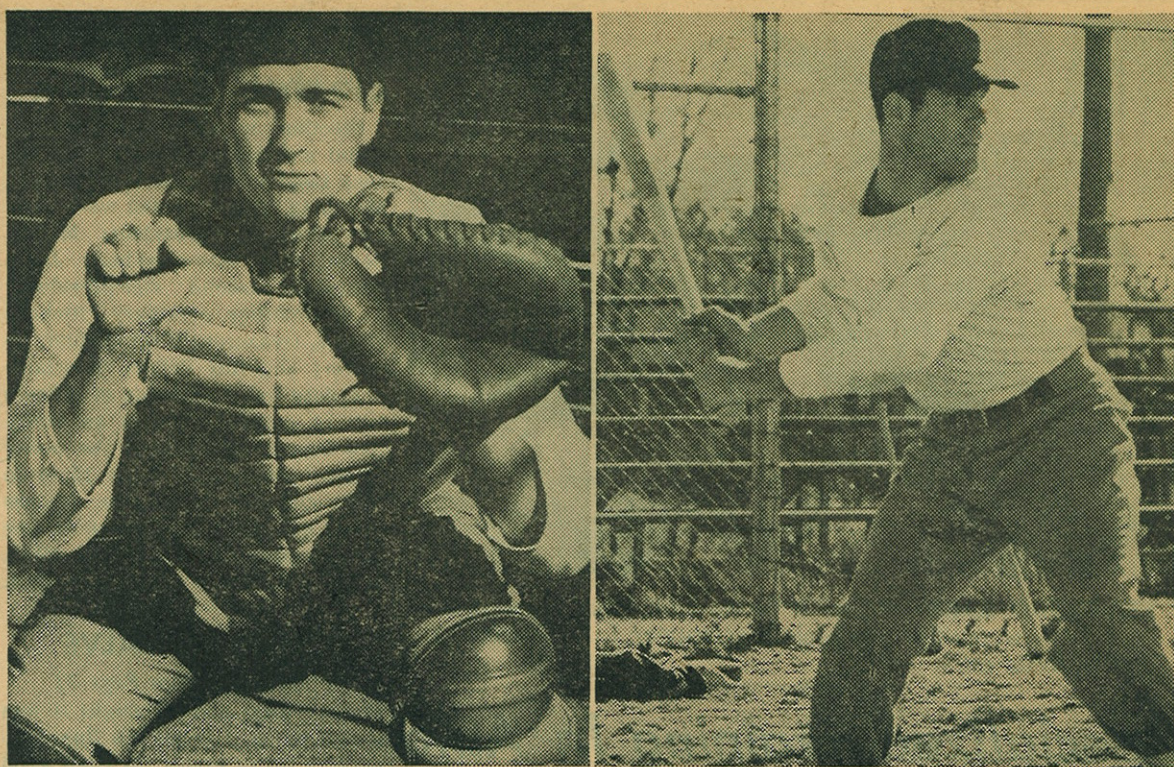

## Rams Lose 9-7 Lead In Last Frame, Fresno State Junior Varsity Win 11-9

The Fresno Junior College Rams suffered their first loss of the 1951 baseball season last night when a last inning barage of hits by the Fresno State College Junior Varsity brought them from behind with four runs and an 11-9 win.

Going into the second half of the last inning, FJC held a 9-7 lead. The Frosh JV's caught on to Ram pitcher Yoe Ybanez, and rolled up four quick runs on three hits and two errors
