Draft Deferment To Be Based On Intelligence Tests

A college student who ranks in the upper bracket of his class, or who makes a score of 70 or better on the Educational Testing Service quiz is eligible for deferment from military service. The examinations will be of the intelligence quotient type, designed to determine the applicant's learning ability.

Colleges and universities will determine, by whatever means they choose, the rank-in-class of their male students. Colleges will then certify the names of students who have ranked in the upper 50 per cent of the male students in its freshman class, in the upper two-thirds of its sophomore class, and so on.

The Educational Testing Service will certify to local draft boards the names of persons who have made scores above the required cutting point. Any student who is in college is eligible for deferment if he has registered above the cutting score on the test or if he is in the certified list of his college.

All draft registered college students wishing to take the test may get application cards from their local draft boards after April 12. Four San Joaquin Valley schools have been designated as centers for the examinations, which will be given May 26, June 16, and June 30. Fresno State College is the testing place for Fresno Junior College students.

FJC Organizes Engineering Corps

The Fresno Junior College is sponsoring the organization of an army engineers unit, and FJC students are encouraged to sign up for this unit. Enlistment in the reserve units is also being encouraged by the services; members of the reserve are exempted from selective service.

Several other enlisted reserve corps units, both army and navy, are available in Fresno. Enlistment in one of these units is open to any male 17 years of age or over. Each unit meets one evening a week, for which each member receives one day's pay.

The vital part played by the reserve was emphasized by General George C. Marshall, as Chief of Staff, when he testified before a Congressional committee early in the last war. He said, "The most valuable single measure of national defense we had available was the Reserve Corps. It has been of more

Brush-up courses in business education skill subjects, offered from 5 to 7 p.m. have attracted over 100 people during the past six weeks. The Courses were designed to enable townspeople and office workers, who are occupied during the regular school day, to learn new skills or to refresh their abilities.

Reports from the students indicate that several who have taken advantage of these late afternoon classes have passed civil service examinations, and others have advanced their ratings in their present positions.

Mrs. Mildred Lang who has been attending these classes has obtained a position as secretary to the head librarian in the Fresno County Library. She was required to pass a civil service examination.

Enrollment figures show that 52 men and women took the typing courses, 20 learned to operate the PBX, and 38 people completed the machine calculation course.

During the last five weeks, April 30 to June, a review of shorthand, including dictation and transcription will be offered.

In the last edition of the Rampage there was a mistake in the FBLA story. Lois Tvede was elected president. The Rampage wishes to apologize to those concerned.

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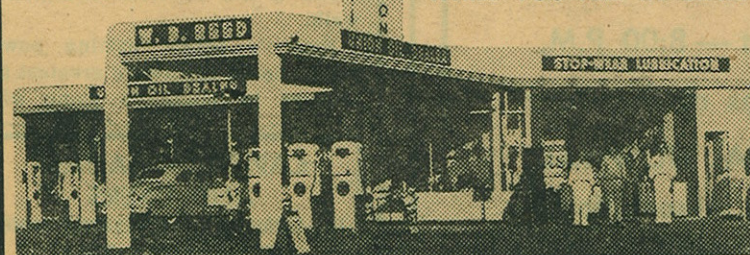
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Men's PE Classes Cover Wide Field

Both teams remained scoreless until the sixth inning, when the Rams rolled up four tallies to Taft's one. With the score 9 to 5, in the last of the eighth, Taft threatened to close the gap by filling the bases with only one out. But pitcher Ellery Mendes came through in the pinch with a strike-out and a fly-out.

In the last of the ninth the desperate Cougars made a "last chance" attempt to get back into the game by rolling up a single, followed with a triple, sending in one run. But the rambling Rams quickly snuffed out the Taftans hitting spree, to end the game victorious 11 to 5.

The twin hitting threats, Pete

and Tom Belden, led for the Rams in the batting bracket by rolling up a 4 for 5 or .800 per cent batting average. Tom Belden led, between the two with a perfect percentage of two for two. Pete settled with two for three. Veteran left fielder Joe Spino followed up with two for four.
