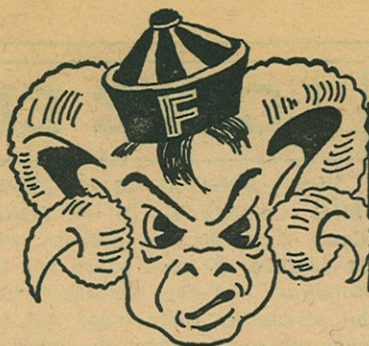

offer to those who wish to continue their education.

Spring Enrollments Increase Under Cal-Vet Program

Spring term enrollment of World War II veterans under California's educational assistance program will set a new record despite the return of a growing number of students to military service, State Director of Veterans Affairs, D. J. Callaghan, Jr., predicted today.

Although complete figures have not yet been compiled from the reports of the more than 200 participating schools and colleges in the state, Callaghan said the "Cal-Vet" enrollment for the current semester and quarter was certain to exceed 7,000. The enrollment for the Spring term last year was 5,790.

Callaghan attributed the continued increase in enrollment under the State program to the fact that many veterans have now exhausted their entitlement to Federal Government assistance under the GI Bill of Rights without completing their chosen course.

The State program provides for payment of tuition and fees for an eligible California veteran, and for a subsistence allowance of \$40 a month while he is in attendance at an approved educational institution. The maximum expenditure in behalf of any one veteran is \$1,000.

To be eligible, a veteran must have been born in California or have been a resident of this state at the time he entered military service. He must have had at least 90 days of active service in World War II prior to January 1, 1947.

Information on State benefits is available from county service officers, veterans service center directors or from offices of the Department of Veterans Affairs in Los Angeles, San Francisco, San Diego, Sacramento, Oakland, Long Beach, Fresno, Bakersfield, San Jose, Santa Barbara and San Bernardino.

The student council will be host to the visitors when they visit the Ramble Inn for refreshments following the musical program.

The grand total of visitors for the week is now 177. Students from Tranquillity number 42. They are accompanied by A. R. Everest of the Tranquillity High School faculty.

History Students Visit Ghost Towns

The locale of the gold rush days is the goal of the California history class when they trek to the ghost towns, and abandoned mines of Mariposa County Sunday, April 15. The class will take a one-day field trip to Mariposa, Bear Valley, and Hornitos.

Mr. Sam Zones, Mariposa High School teacher, will show the group through the Mariposa County Court House. Plans are made to visit Mt. Ophir Mint which in 1850 was making \$50 gold pieces. The John C. Fremont store in Bear Valley; the Masonic Temple at Hornitos, the only one that holds its meetings on the ground floor; and the ghost town at Hornitos will be on the agenda for the day.

Students plan to go in private vehicles and lunches will be packed. The group plans to leave at 8:00 a.m. from the Fresno Junior College.

FBLA Assigns Delegate Duties For State Meet

Richard Soares was elected as speaking delegate from Fresno Junior College at the meeting of the Future Business Leaders of America, April 10, for the state convention to be held at Rosemead, California, April 28. Marian Seiler will be the alternate speaker; Betty Gunderson and Tony Bustillos were chosen as the voting delegates.

The convention is held once a year and this will be the second time the 24 chapters have met.

There will be five work shops on finance, membership, how to organize a chapter, problems of officers, and sponsor problems. Dr. McKee Fisk, Fresno State College professor, will have charge of the sponsors' problems.

Problems that will be discussed are how to get more students interested in the group, problems of attendance, and ideas for the programs.

At the past meeting Jim Leach, Fresno State College student, spoke on his trip to Europe as a student-worker. His trip was sponsored by the YMCA and YWCA.

The group plans to leave April 27 for the one day convention.

'Used Books' Checks Must Be Called For In Person

"All students who left books in the bookstore to be sold must pick up their checks," announced Louis Ingraham, bookstore manager.

Some of the books have not been sold, but they may be left until inventory is taken at the end of May.

Checks, for sale of these used books, will not be mailed except to those who have left school to enter military service. All checks not picked up by the end of the year will be canceled and the money will revert to the student body bookstore fund.

'Over 21' Means Hard Work, Better Grades

Did you know that 44% of the 697 regular Fresno Junior College students are over 21? And did you know that the older students' grades compare just as favorably as those of the younger students and in some classes even higher? According to a recent survey conducted in various departments those facts were concluded.

According to many psychologists, people reach their learning capacity near the age of 20 years and then decline. Educators have found the "golden age" for learning is youth. How does the FJC survey affect these statements?

In interviews with five instructors, covering most departments, the majority of the opinions given favored the older students' performances. It was generally concluded that the older students, in most cases, showed more interest in their studies, have better attend-

ance records, and usually get the most out of their instructors' efforts. The main reason for this seems to come from the fact that the older students have been out of high school and involved in the outside world long enough to realize the importance of a college education. They know where and how their education is going to be used.

In mathematics the older students get more of the higher grades. According to math instructor Miss Meriam Tervo, most of the younger students fall below their capabilities because they lack the determination and "stick-to-it-ness" in solving complex mathematical problems. Miss Tervo stated that the older classmates realize the importance of mathematics in many outside situations and generally try to get as much out of the subject as possible.

English courses present a different problem. The younger group have an advantage because they are right out of high school and most of the English learned is still fresh in their minds. But again the older students tend to do superior work mainly because past experience has taught them that effective English is an essential tool to success.

Grades tallied up in science and commerce classes indicate that older students show greater interest because of their more immediate need of knowledge.

Even though the survey showed that the older age group put more effort into learning, all teachers interviewed agreed that if the teenagers can create or find a real sincere reason for WANTING to get an education, they can more than match the older ones' grades.



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LOYALTY OR CONFORMITY?

In recent years the term "Totalitarian Government" has become an American household saying. Seems as though every time we refer to a foreign government which advocates policies and teachings that are supposedly detrimental to our type of government we readily scream "Totalitarian."

The Merriam-Webster Dictionary defines Totalitarian as meaning, "Of or relating to a government controlled by a group that allows no representation to other political parties." Does this ring a familiar note? It should, because if you have read any material on the levering bills which have been submitted to the state legislature by some of our esteemed state senators, you will ascertain a slight relation between the bills and the Totalitarian type of government.

Let us closely scrutinize the contents of a few of the levering type bills that have been proposed by certain members of the state legislature. Here is Bill No. 2954 as suggested by Senator Chapel: "No person shall . . . distribute current campaign literature espousing any proposition or candidate for public office to pupils . . . or cause children to write essays . . . on current candidates or propositions." Such a law is clearly an attempt to prevent knowledge and discussion by pupils on current issues. SUCH A LAW WOULD BE A FLAGRANT VIOLATION TO THE FIRST AMENDMENT OF OUR CHERISHED CONSTITUTION.

Senator Chapel also proposed Bill No. 2616. This Bill states, "Agents of the Department of Justice will have free access to classrooms to check the utterances of teachers and will scrutinize the activities of principals and superintendents." In other words, public education will be regulated by police authorities, and teachers and other public school employees will be under the "thumbs" of certain police groups, outside the classroom.

These bills are only two of the many that have been proposed and it remains to be seen whether or not they are voted upon and passed as laws. However, as insignificant as these bills may seem now, they could very well be the undoing of this nation in the years to come. No doubt the men who are advocating such legislation are of sterling character, and they may believe that such action is necessary for the security of this nation. BUT IF SUCH LEGISLATION IS PASSED AS LAW, MORE WILL SURELY FOLLOW, AND SOON WE WILL BE SO CONFINED IN OUR THINKING AND ACTION THAT WE WILL CEASE TO EXIST AS FREE HUMAN BEINGS.

Loyalty to this great nation of ours starts with you and me as individuals and the levering bills are disgraceful insults to the dignity of you and me, our State, and our Nation.

Will we be the next to join the ranks of the "Totalitarian" governments of the world? Such legislation, if passed, would certainly qualify us for this type of government.

Ram Cindermen Place Second In Three-Way Meet

Last Friday afternoon the Fresno Junior College track and field team ended up in second place in their first track meet of the 1951 season. The three-way meet was between the Fresno State Junior Varsity, Reedley College Tigers, and FJC at the Ratcliffe Stadium.

The Fresno State JV's easily cinched first place with a total of 92-2/3 points. FJC pointed 30-1/3 and Reedley followed up with 17. State definitely outnumbered the JC teams with over twenty contenders compared to seven for Fresno and six for Reedley.

Ram hurdler and high jumper Bill Evans, captured double wins for the Rams with a first in the high jump and a first in the low hurdles. Other FJC placements were made by Gene Likens, 2nd place tie in the pole vault, 3rd place tie in the high hurdles, 4th place in the low hurdles; Clint Wheeler, 3rd place in the low hurdles, 4th place in the 100 yard dash; Halderman, 2nd place in the 880; Willie Berry, 1st in the 440, 4th in the broad jump.

The Ram cindermen will spend the next week concentrating on building up their team and improving their performances in preparation for their next track duel in Reedley April 18.

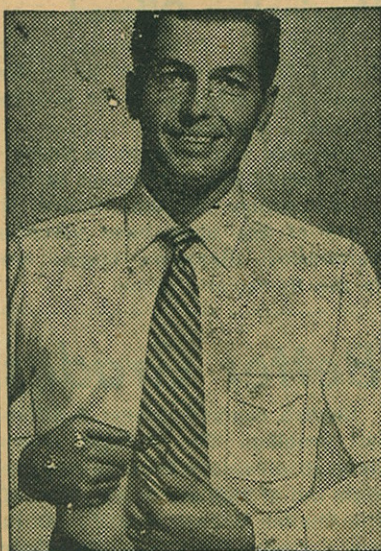

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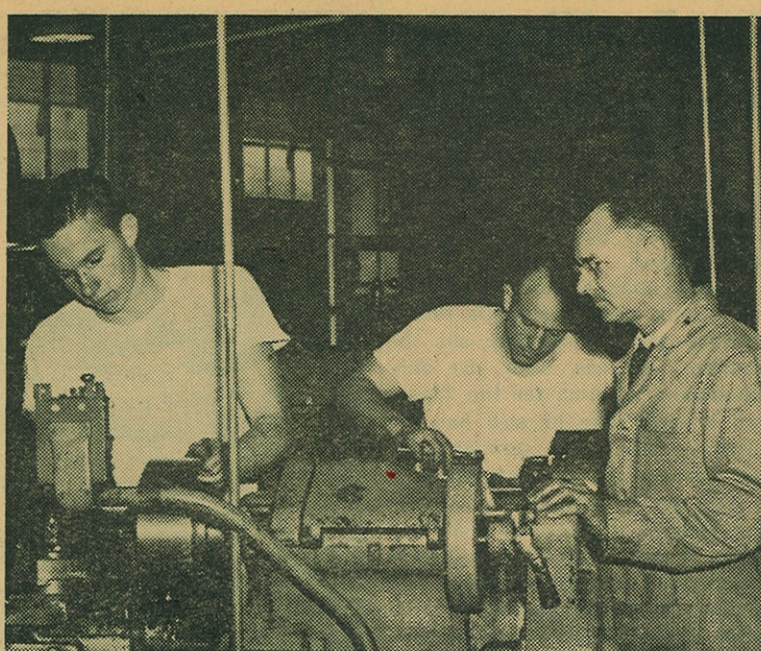

Miss Metzler, who auditioned with several other aspiring singers, was one of approximately fifty selected for the course work. During the month's probationary period, she will study the scores of operas to be sung this year and rehearse twice weekly. If she successfully completes her training, she will go on tour with the Opera Company this year.

San Francisco Opera Company auditions are held yearly in March. Those chosen at the auditions are paid a small salary while they study. Miss Metzler is directing a San Francisco church choir to augment her earnings.

STUDENTS MUST PETITION TO TRANSFER CREDITS

All students now attending Fresno Junior College, who wish to have their credits transferred to apply toward a high school diploma, must file a petition for transfer of credit with Mrs. Irene Stewart, registrar. Students who wish to graduate in June must file petitions no later than April 20.

Anyone who has not graduated from high school and who wishes to convert junior college credits to the Adult Evening High School may do so. After filing a petition with the registrar, the student should check with the Adult Education Office to be certain he is on the graduation list.

Shop Training At FJC Is Door To Employment Security

Students interested in practical training which leads to immediate employment in trade and industry may enroll in the course in Machine Shop. The class is held five days a week from 1-4 and has an enrollment of 18 students.

The Fresno Junior College facilities are capable of handling a class much larger than the present enrollment; it has had as many as 40. All equipment is the metal-cutting type and like that used in industry.

Machines in the shop include 20 lathes, for shaping round stock; 3 shapers, for cutting flats, angles and rectangular shapes; 2 milling machines, used to cut irregular surfaces, gears and key work, and slab cutting; a heat-treating furnace for tempering and hardening.

Other machines are a Doall, for metal sawing and filing; 3 drill presses; a large planer, used for machining flat stock and such things as automobile cylinder heads; a surface grinder, for precision grinding; 2 power hack saws, used for cutting metal; 3 bench grinders, for grinding tools; a 60-ton hydraulic press and a small cylinder grinder.

Instruction in the class is individual and the student may progress as fast as he wishes. Conditions, as nearly as possible, duplicate actual job situations.

Students are taught by doing, with reference books referred to when needed. Proper use and care of the shop equipment and observance of all safety precautions are a part of the course.

Trained workers who have mastered a trade are in demand today as the nation gears for defense production and machine workers are also essential to many industries in peace-time production. Well-trained machine workers receive good salaries; hours are regular and working conditions are good. Many jobs for machine shop apprentices are open now and demand for good workers is high.

E. J. Smith, machine shop instructor, has been at FJC for five years. He has had twenty year's experience in the trade and says his objective in shop training is to educate students to know what will be expected of them on the job and to carry it out.

Mr. Smith is married and has a son in junior high school. He and his family live at 1717 Harrison Street in Fresno.

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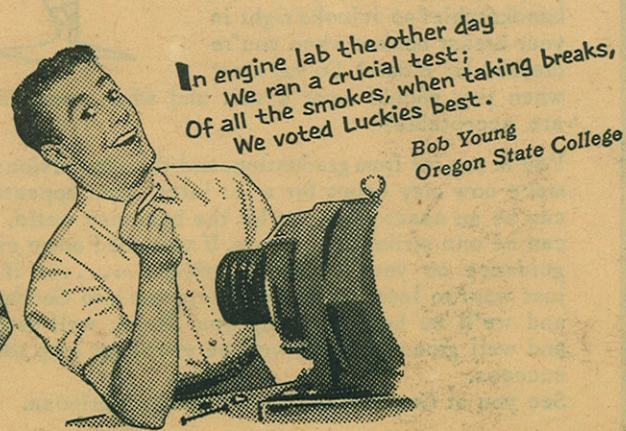

Rams Beat Falcons 7-5 Under Coalinga Lights

The Fresno Junior College Rams strengthened their reputation of being one of the most powerful JC baseball teams in the San Joaquin Valley last Saturday night by defeating the Coalinga Junior College Falcons 7 to 5.

The Falcons, whom some have picked as the number 2 team in the Central California Junior College Conference, got an early taste of the visiting Ram's intentions as

the Fresno nine let loose with a four-run rally in the second inning, and garnered a 5 to 1 lead.

FJC mound-man Joe Ybanez put out his best performance of the season by allowing the anxious Falcons only six scattered hits and one earned run. The spirited Rams co-operated by keeping the scoring well in hand to the very last inning.

The Falcons made a spirited attempt to recover from the Ram's four-run rally but had to settle for one tally in the 2nd, making the score 5 to 2.

The Fresnoans came back in the sixth with another run after three tight innings of pitching duels. Fresno's smooth team-work kept the Falcons away from scoring position for the next five frames. But in the 8th, the CJC nine capitalized on two FJC errors, and scored two runs. The 8th frame ended 6 to 4. Fresno moved ahead 7 to 4 in

Coach Stoney Johnston's rambling Rams ventured into professional baseball Tuesday night in an evening match with the Visalia Cubs at Visalia. The Cubs pulled through with a 8 to 6 win.

Playing under the arcs in one of California's most beautiful diamonds, the Rams and Cubs battled through a lively game full of wild pitches, pass balls, and errors. Almost every run scored was the result of either passed balls or errors, and both teams collected seven hits.

The Ram's starting flinger Ellery Mendes got into trouble from the very start and through walks, wild throws, and errors the charmed Cubs rolled ahead 7 to 1 in four innings. But the spirited Rams got away from their wildness and held the vulnerable Visalians scoreless for the next three frames. FJC began closing the gap and scored in four runs to make the score 7 to 5 in the top of the 8th. In the last of the 8th the quieted Cubs sneaked in their 8th and final run to lead 8 to 5.
