

STUDENT OFFICE SEEKERS MUST REGISTER PETITIONS BY THURSDAY, APRIL 26

The time for student body elections is approaching. Petitions for candidacy may be obtained from Mrs. Irene Stewart, registrar, beginning Monday, April 23, and all petitions must be returned by Thursday, April 26.

Eight offices are open: President, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, and four representatives at large. Qualifications for all candidates are a student body card, good standing in the Associated Students organization, and satisfactory completion of at least 12 units at Fresno Junior College with at least a C average. In addition, the president and vice-president must be second year students during their terms in office.

Student body officers transact all student business and control finances through the student council. They have the responsibility of forming and approving the budget for the coming school year.

In addition to the duties at FJC, officers represent the college at student conferences in the central district and at the state conferences held each semester. Delegates who have attended conferences in the past have reported many suggestions for improving student government and activities at FJC.

Candidates for all offices will be presented to the student body at an assembly on Friday, May 2. Campaigning may be done May 3-7 and the election will be held on Wednesday and Thursday, May 8-9. Installation ceremonies will be May 25.

Joe Spino, present vice-president, is in charge of plans for the election. Spino will have booths set up near the Ramble Inn and on the main floor on election day.

Parking Space For Students Enlarged

Have you noticed the change in the parking situation in front of the Fresno Junior College? Take a look! Additional parking space has been made available in front of the school.

Even though a two-hour parking limit still remains on the far side of the street, the added space on the FJC side of the street will greatly improve the student's parking problem.

Dr. Blakely, Fresno JC president, petitioned the change to Fresno's director of traffic, Robert D. Dier, who in turn informed the city commission. The city commission approved the change and the result was the repainting of the curb along the school side of the street.

The two-hour parking limit will still exist but Dr. Blakely stated that he hopes this situation can also be improved sometime in the future.

Treasurer Ingraham will serve as parliamentarian at the conference. He was elected to the office by delegates from Central California junior colleges at a convention in March at College of Sequoias in Visalia. Other junior colleges in the central section are in Porterville, Taft, Reedley, Santa Maria, and San Luis Obispo.

Delegates at conventions exchange problems and solutions of them and try to find ways of improving student self-government and student activities.

Veterans' Benefits Run Out July 25

In order to qualify for government assistance, all veterans who wish to enroll in college must be in training before July 25, 1951, or not later than four years after his discharge, whichever is longer.

Several late registrants have enrolled at Fresno Junior College and some classes are still open to late enrollees, announced Dean of Education Maurice Reetz.

He said that anyone who wishes to enroll at FJC for the remainder of the semester in order to qualify for veterans benefits should do so as soon as possible in order to get credit for work done this semester.

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GENERAL VERSUS PRESIDENT

One news commentator who came out in favor of General MacArthur after his dismissal reported that the general never received official word to the effect that he should let statements on foreign policy come from the state department. If this is true, General MacArthur should have listened to his radio, because everyone else knew about it.

Any foot soldier guilty of making unauthorized policy statements or attempting to make peace with the enemy without official sanction from higher-ups would probably have wound up on a rock pile at Leavenworth.

On the other hand, President Truman's summary dismissal of General MacArthur has brought about a great split of not only Congress, but the American people as well. Comment from both sides has been heated and extensive. Mr. Truman's enormous talent for doing the tactless thing has never shown more brightly.

At last General MacArthur has been invited to speak to a joint session of Congress, something that should have taken place long ago. The general has been too long out of the country and the American people have been too far from the fighting for either to understand the other. General MacArthur's far east policies seem to be slightly inflammatory; perhaps they aren't. Anyhow, everyone can soon find out more about the whole situation.

If the finding out is televised, the Kefauver investigation will fade by comparison. Americans who greeted General MacArthur on his return and those who didn't care to do so will all be watching and listening for the outcome of what promises to be the biggest show in the history of American politics.

Speaking of politics, the worst thing about the whole mess is that both major parties seem to be trying to make a political football out of the general's dismissal. Everyone knows that elections are coming up in 1952, but drastically splitting now on foreign policy seems a very risky business indeed. Furthermore, while Americans here are arguing the pros and cons of how far to carry the fight in Korea, Americans there are dying by the hundreds.

Former pilot with a rank of First Lieutenant, Jones saw active duty during World War II. He was stationed at various points in England, France, Belgium, and Germany.


Mr. Jones expects to be stationed at Mather Field for an indefinite period.


"Hey let me in on this," says Nick Elias, "I think it is the best time to break the ice and you can quote me on that." Thank you, Nick!!

The Fresno Junior College Rams captured their second straight win Tuesday afternoon in a tight, low-scoring dual with the Coalinga Falcons. The FJC baseballers won 3 to 2. Ram moundman Joe Ybanez and Falcon hurler Andy Andersen battled it out for the second time. Ybanez allowed two runs on three hits, and Andersen gave up three runs on four hits.

The Coalinga nine, out to revenge the Fresnan's previous 7 to 5 win, scored runs in the second and third frame and moved ahead 2 to 0.

Coach Stoney Johnston's nine started slamming long flies into the outfield only to have the Falcon fielders pull them down. But in the bottom of the third Andersen lost momentary control of his fast-ball and walked the first man up, Louie Gambello. Then Joe Ybanez reached first on an infield error and Gambello came around to score. CJC still led 2 to 1.

Both teams were held scoreless in the fourth, but in the fifth the spirited FJCers loaded the bases. First, Norm Britton struck out; then Tom Belden reached first on a single. Ben Yano made it two away on a long fly-out into center field. It looked like another runless inning for the Rams, but the Falcon hurler turned wild and walked Joe Spino and Pete Belden to fill the bases. Then big first baseman Jerry Manfredi blasted out the Ram's best hit of the game with a sizzling grounder through the in-

Fresno JC Team Drops Practice Tilt With Renegades

The Fresno Junior College baseball nine bowed to the Bakersfield College Renegades last Friday in an 18 to 11 slugfest in Bakersfield.

The Bakersfield team appeared to have had their hitting shoes on Friday; they put together a total of 18 hits, 11 walks, and 3 errors to push across 18 runs in the nine frames played.

The Rams collected 12 hits and received six free passes from the Renegade chuckers for a total of 11 runs. Kaylor, the catcher for the Bakersfield team grabbed hitting honors for the day with 5 hits for six trips to the plate.

Norm Britton, second baseman; Ben Yano, center fielder; Pete Belden, right fielder; and Jerry Manfredi, first baseman for the Rams, each collected two hits apiece. Jerry Halvorsen, Ram catcher, blasted a long home run in the third inning.

Friday's game was the second meet for these two teams this season. In the first encounter the game was called at the end of the eleventh inning because of darkness, leaving the score tied at 7-7.

The Central California Junior College baseball conference is nearing its half-way mark this week with the Reedley College Tigers still holding a firm grip on the first place position.

It is interesting to note how well-matched the conference teams are this season. Take the luck-less Coalinga Falcons for instance. Coalinga JC has a real potential ball-club and are quite capable of rolling over any of the CCJC contenders. But despite their potentialities the Falcons have dropped four heart-breaking games in five starts. Last week, in the Reedley-Coalinga game, the Falcons out-hit the charmed Tigers 9 to 4 but still Reedley ended up the victor.

Reedley's first three wins were all by a slim one-run margin, 2-1, 4-3, and 6-5. In addition the Tigers shut out Taft 3-0 and lashed the Porterville Pirates 13-6. The Tigers used the same pitcher in all of their first five games but in their sixth game, the PJC encounter, Richard Fry pitched. Fry did a commendable job by allowing only five hits. Reedley was behind 4-0 in the fourth inning but the Cougar hurler lost his grip.

The Fresno JC Rams have two very important games coming up in the next five days, the Cougars tomorrow afternoon here and the College of Sequoias Giants Tuesday, April 24 there. COS and Fresno both lost to Reedley by one run so the COS-FJC game should prove to be a real contest.

FJC Nine To Meet Pirates Tomorrow At Romaine Field

Baseball fans will get another chance to watch the Fresno Junior College bat and glove men try for their fourth victory in five starts tomorrow afternoon when the Rams play the Porterville Junior College Pirates at the Romaine Field. The game is scheduled to start at 3 p.m.

Holding two wins over the Coalinga Falcons 7-5 and 3-2 and an 11-5 victory over the Taft Cougars, Coach Stony Johnston's nine have only a 6-5 loss marring their 1951 season record. The Reedley College Tigers boast the Rams' only loss.


