Athlete SB Cards Being Considered In Student Council

A hotly-contested issue regarding student body cards for athletes will be decided by the student council at their next meeting a week from today. Some athletes now competing have not purchased student body cards and their eligibility for awards has been questioned.

The Fresno Junior College Athletic code definitely states that an athlete must have a student body card to become a member of a team in any sport.

Last semester the student council voted to allow all athletes to purchase full-privilege student body cards and have half the cost refunded to them at the end of the season.

Some student council members feel that, since a large share of the student body fund goes to support athletics and buy letters and jackets for athletes, the athletes should have student body cards even if they weren't required by the athletic code.

A final decision on the matter is expected next Thursday. The student council meeting will be open to all who wish to attend and the time and place is 11 a.m. in M24.

New Class In Duplication, Voice Writing To Start

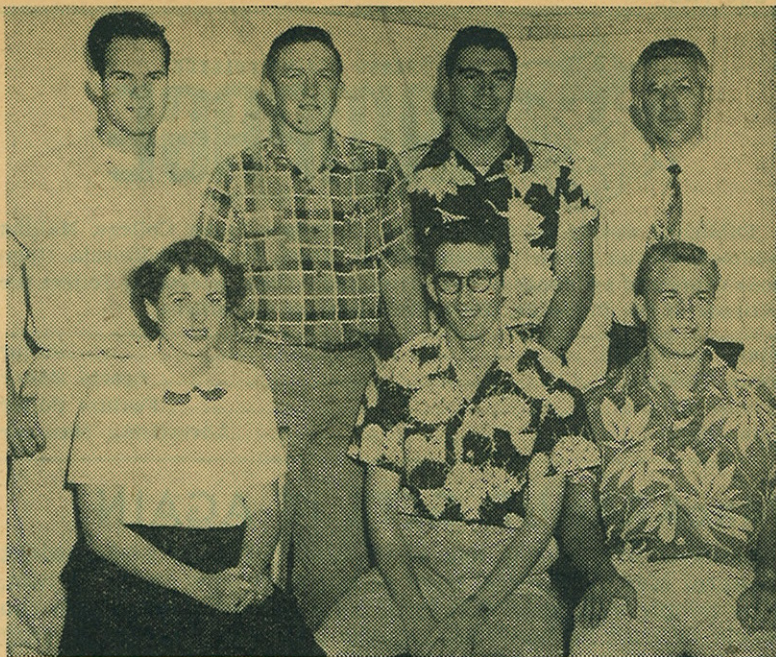

MacARTHUR GETS IT AGAIN

Almost everything has been said both for and against General MacArthur and most people seem now to be for him. Few people will deny that he is an outstanding figure in the world or that he has been a great general. But, he is a very convincing talker and a smooth rationalizer.

He explained to Congress and to the Amerilan people over a nation-wide hookup that he didn't really do anything he wasn't authorized to do — it only looked that way. Maybe he didn't go against orders; maybe he merely interpreted them somewhat loosely. Is that good?

For a general with "no political ambitions," he seems to be quite active in politics. Some Washington newsmen think he deliberately brought about his dismissal in a manner that would attract the most attention.

If the "MacArthur for President" people have their way, the whole country may find out that Harry Truman isn't the worst thing that could happen to the United States. Maybe "old soldiers never die; they just fade away" — the thing to make sure of now is that this old soldier doesn't do his fading away in the White House.

WHERE ARE THE CANDIDATES?

Three people are running for eight offices. It ought to be an exciting election. And the voters have so much choice, too. What's the matter with FJC students? Surely, out of all the student body, there are more than three people who would make good officers.

Any first-semester student can run for the offices of secretary, treasurer or representative at large, if he has a C average at the present time, is carrying twelve or more units, and has a student body card. Any second-semester student who has the same qualifications may run for the offices of president and vice-president.

Now is the time for all students to take an interest in office holders. No one can vote for the right man if the right man isn't in the running, and voter responsibility doesn't start at the polls; it starts with selection of candidates.

There is still time today to get petitions signed and returned. If it should be impossible to get that done, there is time between now and May 2 to find some good candidates and nominate them from the floor. Everyone, including those who have taken out petitions, will appreciate it. No one likes to walk into an office just because no one else wants it and everyone likes a good race.

Awards Go To Typists In Contest

Honor pins were earned by six students by taking the Gregg Competent Typist Test for March, 1951. Ten other students won the Gregg Competent Typing Certificate.

Gregg Typing Test, which is given every month, is a ten-minute speed test. To win a pin, a student must have a net rate of 50 words per minute for 10 minutes with 5 errors or less. A certificate is won by typing a net rate of 40 wpm.

Ruby L. White won first place with 60 words per minute and one error. Irene Elter followed with 55 wpm. and no errors.

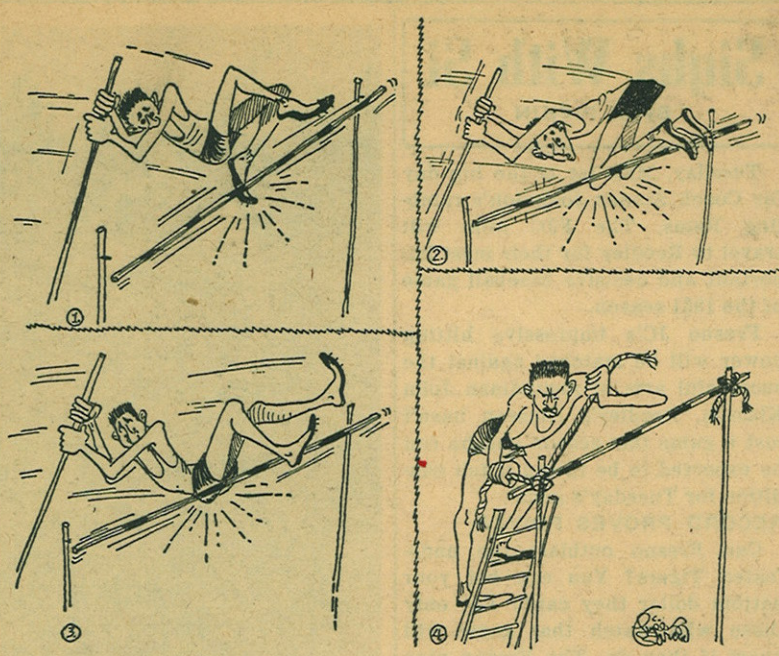
FJC Nine Defeats Pirates 19 To 8 For Fourth Win

The Fresno Junior College baseball nine pounded out a 19 to 8 decision over the Porterville Pirates last Friday afternoon in Porterville in a league contest.

The Rams raked three Pirate pitchers for a total of 18 hits in the eighth inning game; the game was called at the end of the eighth inning because of darkness.

The Rams did not score until the second inning, while the Buccaneers from Porterville picked up two runs in their half of the first inning. In the second inning the total aggregation combined three hits, three walks, two errors, and a stolen base to shove across 7 runs. Joe Spino led off with a walk and stole second; Pete Belden skied out to left, Gerald Manfredi to right; then Jerry Halvorsen, Ram catcher, walked; Louie Gambello pushed both Spino and Halvorsen across with a line triple to the outer gardens.

Chucker Ellery Mendes reached first on an error, Gambello scoring; Norm Britton walked; Tom Belden singled; Ben Yano also gained the initial sack on another error by the Pirate shortstop, Britton scor-



ing; Spino, up for the second time this inning, promptly drilled a long triple to centerfield scoring T. Belden and Yano; P. Belden then fanned to end the inning.

The Pirates were set down in their half of the second inning. In the third inning the Rams picked up another run on singles by Manfredi, Gambello, and Britton. Again the Pirates were put down in their half of the third inning. The score

FJC Cindermen Beat COS With Eight Men; Evans Stars

An outmanned but fighting Fresno Junior College cinder-team rallied to the occasion last Saturday afternoon by capturing second place in a three-way meet between College of Sequoias, San Jose State freshmen and FJC. The well-manned SJ Frosh took first place.

Fresno, out-manned four to one, overcame these terrific odds as all eight Ram tracksters came through with points. FJC captured five firsts while the 25-man COS squad's best performance was a first place tie in the 440 yard dash. San Jose's team captured the remaining firsts.

BILL EVANS GETS 3 FIRSTS

FJC trackster Bill Evans emerged as the individual star for the day by placing first in the 220 low hurdles, the broad jump, and the high jump. Evans also placed third in the high hurdles.

Ram hurdler Clinton Wheeler also placed first for Fresno with a performance time of 16.1 in the 120 high hurdles. Wheeler also copped a third in the 220 low hurdles.

COS TIES FJC IN 440

Fresno netted more points on Willie Berry's creditable first place tie with COS in a fast 440 yard dash. The winning time was clocked at 52.2 seconds.

The spirited Rams copped four second-places as Ward Longueville placed number two in the 100 and 200 yard dashes, and Gene Li-

kens scored two more in the high jump and pole vault.

Other all-important performances were made by Frank Brunoli with a third place tie in the pole vault, Don Halderman with a fourth in the half mile and Orville Crane with a fourth in the mile.

The Rams totaled 42 points, COS 41½ and SJS 67½. Coach Paul Starr remarked that the students can be rightfully proud of their team performance, especially when they consider the disadvantages the Rams had to overcome. 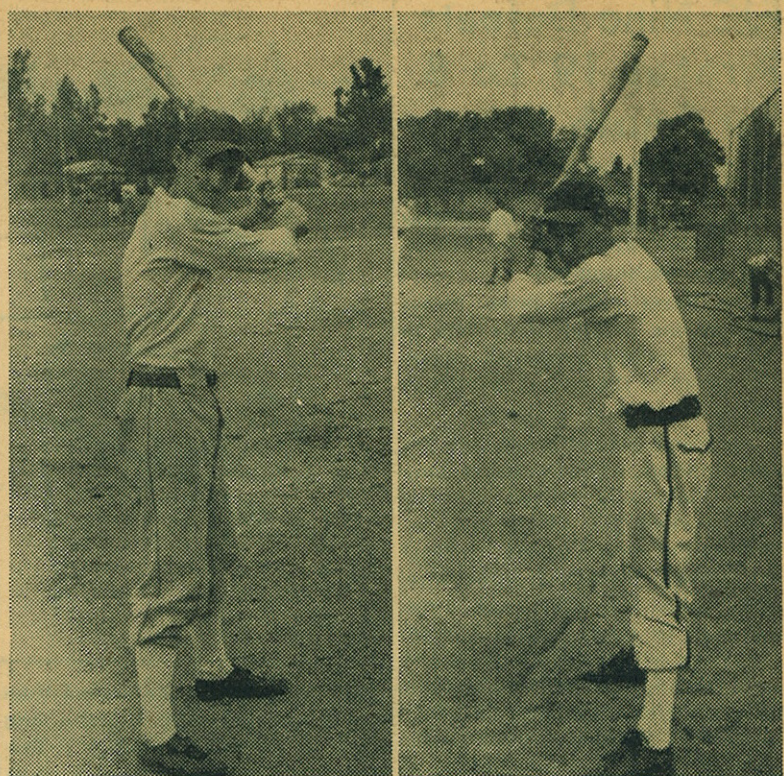
Fresno's hurdler Bill Evans took individual honors against all 60 participants with three first places and a third. CONGRATULATIONS, EVANS!
