

A postponed meeting of the budget committee was held Tuesday, May 1, to accept budget requests for student activities for ring an unusually heavy write-in the 1951 fiscal year. PIES, PICASSO AND PULITZER

Three courses of study which seem to be neglected by students and their faculty advisors are Home Economics, Art, and Journalism. All three have many qualities to recommend them — even if the student is taking a specialized course such as business, science or shop.

Many women in the past few years have learned how to take dictation, spell and type, never thinking of the day when they would come face-to-face with a stove. All those bride's biscuits jokes must have some basis in fact. Even though many women will work in offices for a living, most of them will some day have a home to keep. Many will keep house and work outside the home, too. A little preparation now may save a lot of tears and trouble later.

Men, too, should not ignore home economic courses; because, by the time the second baby arrives, most husbands have taken a turn at housekeeping themselves. Wives get sick, break legs or go home to mother and some knowledge of how a home is run becomes suddenly very useful.

Both men and women can benefit from art courses. They are designed to fill the needs of all, from the talented who wish to train for cartooning, portraiture, landscape painting and photography to the person who wishes merely to learn art appreciation and that orange, red and purple are not good colors to wear all at once.

Journalism can be useful to anyone in any walk of life. It teaches observance of facts; recognition of important points; and purpose, organization and direction in thinking, speaking and writing. It affords valuable contacts with people of different personalities and gives students business experience in budgeting and managing.

A semester or two of any of these courses probably will not give any student the training he needs to make it his life's work, but the training may augment or increase his abilities in his chosen field. Think it over - it might be worth a try.

Thirty-six students from the Trades and Industrial shops of Fresno Junior College toured the new Pacific Gas and Electric steam assembly. plant in Bakersfield last Thursday,

Mr. Kelly Courtright, General Manager of the PG&E of Fresno, addressed the group. He explained the general relief map of the power plants in California. He went on to explain how the steam generator plants work.

The students, who toured the plant in groups of 12 with a guide for each group, saw the boilers that consume 184,000 barrels of oil a day. They also saw the generator machines that produce 230,000 horse power a day.

The new plant serves the south and west parts of the San Joaquin Valley, but could be converted to serve the complete valley if it became necessary.

Evans' record leap was recorded as one of the better performances of the meet. The old high jump record stood at 6 feet 1 inch, the new is 6 feet 2% inches. Evans also pointed third in the 220 low hurdles and fourth in the 120 high hurdles.

Clinton Wheeler copped another first for the Rams in the 220 low hurdles besides taking a second in the 120 high hurdles.

Other FJC placements were as follows: Gene Likins, third tie in the high jump, second tie in the pole vault; Ward Longueville, second tie in the 100 yard dash, fourth in the 220 yard dash; Willie Berry second in the 440 yard dash; Frank Brunolli second tie in the pole vault: Ron Chapanian, second in the discus; Willie Perry, third in the broad jump; Winston Beasley, third in the 220 yard dash; John Adams, fourth in the two mile; Don Davis, fourth in the 880 yard run; Aram Mooradian, fourth in the 100 yard dash.

Over 65 track and field men took part in the after-dark meet with 200 fans watching.


This win now gives the Rams six wins against two defeats, with two league games left to play, Taft and College of Sequoias, both home
