

George C. Holstein, principal of Fresno High School, will be the dean of admissions and records of Fresno Junior College. J. Philmore Collins, FJC instructor, will be dean of instruction.

Holstein has been in the Fresno City Schools since 1937. He spent most of his time in the Fresno High School except a year, 1942-43, when he served on the Roosevelt faculty. Holstein taught five years at Washington Union High School and two years at the Visalia High School before coming to Fresno.

Graduated From FSC
Holstein graduated from the Fresno State College in 1930 and did graduate work in the University of California and University of Southern California and the University of Idaho. He has a master's degree from USC.

Jack Mulkey, now vice principal of the Roosevelt High School, will succeed Holstein as president of the Fresno High School.

Collins, who has been a biological science instructor since 1950, will assist White in the supervision of the school's instructional program.

Former President

Collins is a former president of the FJC Faculty Club and was selected as an outstanding member for the Fresno Lions Club award two years ago. He is a sophomore class adviser.

Collins has been in the Fresno city schools system since 1943. He taught in the Hamilton Junior High School from 1943-44 and the Fresno High School from 1944-50. He previously taught for seven years

Miss Mann, who was presented with a trophy for her winning the women's singles title in CCJCA play, has shown an extreme ability in the game.

Every track fan should know of Fiorentino, who has broken various records at the track meets attended by the track team. Johnson, who broke all FJC scoring records in basketball, was chosen as the most outstanding player in the state basketball tournament held in Fresno.

Flores, who was voted the most outstanding Fresno JC sports player, needs no introduction. He was a leading member of the football and baseball teams.

A lot of credit should go to the coaches, Joe Kelly, Ray McCarthy, Hans Wiedenhofer, and Dean Larsen, for their fine work also.

Stanford Graduate

Collins was graduated from the Stanford University in 1926 and received his master's degree from the Pacific School of Religion in 1936. He did graduate work at Stanford, the College of Pacific, and the University of California.

In 1935-36 he accompanied an archaeological expedition of the Pacific School of Religion to Mizpah in Palestine, seven miles north of Jerusalem.


Stuart M. White, the FJC president, said the new position has been established because of the junior college's rapidly increasing enrollment and the need for an administrator to study and evaluate the courses of study in order to improve curricular offerings.


Start M. White, the president of the Fresno Junior College, announced the men's physical education department staff for the 1955-56 season.

Two new coaches, Clair Slaughter and Richard Handley, were added to the Rams' athletic department.



Handley, assistant football coach at Edison High School, will teach men's basketball and track and field. Slaughter will be assistant football coach and track and field coach.


