FJC was represented by two other administrators, John S. Hansen, the administrative dean, and Archie Bradshaw, the dean of students, who is the association's secretary.

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

Restrictions For JC Athletes Surveyed By Administrators

Three proposals have been considered at a meeting of administrators of the Central California Junior College Association which will make major changes in junior college athletics in California if they are adopted.

President Stuart White said administrators from all the state's junior colleges will vote on the plans at the annual meeting of the state association at Ahwahnee Hotel in the Yosemite National Park Oct. 29 to 31.

These three provisions are included in the sample ballot:

A. ZONING: A student whose legal residence is in a free area; that is, an area without a junior college, may be eligible for athletics in any junior college in the county of his residence or in any adjacent county. In the event there is no junior college either in the county or adjacent county, the geographical area will be enlarged to such an extent that the student will have a choice of three junior colleges to attend.

B. OUT OF STATE STUDENTS: Out of state and out of country students shall be ineligible for athletics for one year except in the case of a bona fide change of residence. Exception may be made for junior colleges that draw students from adjacent out of state areas.

C. FOOTBALL PLAYOFF: A one game state playoff will be made starting in 1958. One team will be chosen by the state athletic committee from the northern four conferences and the other from the southern four conferences. The game is to be played on Thanksgiving weekend in Bakersfield as the Shrine Potato Bowl Game if the Potato Bowl board of management wishes to host the game under the conditions that will be outlined. Should the management refuse, the game will be played at a suitable stadium in Southern California.

Rams Outplay Taft JC, Win Game Easily, 20-0

The Fresno Junior College Rams ended a three year jinx by posting a 20 to 0 victory over the Taft Junior College Cougars last Saturday night in Ratcliffe Stadium before a crowd of

The Ram's first score came late in the opening period as a result of a blocked punt by Fres. no's Bill Herron, Don O'Berg, and Walt Miller. Quarterback John Lujano went over from the three for the touchdown. Halfback Alex Kobzoff added the extra point.

Lujano intercepted a Cougar pass on the Taft 30 to set up the next Ram score. It took Fresno four plays to hit pay dirt with Lujano throwing to halfback Henry Stennis for the score. Kobzoff's conversion attempt was wide and the halftime score was 13 to 0.

Rams Drive Offensively

Fresno scored again early in the third quarter when the Rams took the kickoff and drove 72 yards in six plays with Lujano throwing to Kobzoff for the final tally. Kobzoff, who was aided by a key block by Fred Raco added the extra point to make the final score 20 to 0.

Lujano completed eight out of 13 passes for two touchdowns and 122 yards. He passed to halfback pass; Kobzoff, 37 yard pass-run. Ken Pipes for several large gains. Conversions: Kobzoff, 2.

Coach Hans Wiedenhoefer cleared his bench in the third and fourth quarters. Fresno threatened to score twice in the final quarter but both drives were halted by penalties. The Rams had a total of 17 penalties totaling 100 yards.

Ram Statistics

Fresno now has a Central California Junior College Association record of one win and one tie. The Rams gained 293 yards, 124 by rushing and 169 by passing as compared to 68 yards for Taft, 36 on the ground and 32 through the air.

Only once did the Cougars get inside the Fresno 30 yard line but they never seriously threatened to
